MINUTES [Draft]

Board Members Present: President Lori E. Lightfoot, Vice President Ghian Foreman, Eva-Dina Delgado, Michael Eaddy (via audio conference), Steve Flores, John P. O'Malley Jr., John H. Simpson, Rhoda D. Sweeney, and Andrea L. Zopp.

Board Members Absent: None.

Others Present: Chicago Police Department Chief of Patrol Fred Waller, General Counsel to the Superintendent Charise Valente, Civilian Office of Police Accountability Interim Chief Administrator Patricia Banks, Police Board Executive Director Max A. Caproni, and members of the public.

President Lightfoot called the meeting to order. She reported that Rev. Eaddy is unable to attend the meeting in person. Vice President Foreman moved to permit attendance via audio conference. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 1. Mr. Flores moved to approve the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting held on December 14, 2017. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 2. President Lightfoot stated that the schedule of the Board's regular public meetings for 2018 has been made available at this evening's meeting and has been posted on the Board's website.
- 3. President Lightfoot announced that the Board's next regular public meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, February 15, 2018, at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

Vice President Foreman moved to close a series of executive sessions of the Board for the purposes of considering litigation and personnel matters, as authorized by sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor

(Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 4. President Lightfoot stated that a report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month appears in the blue books made available at the meeting, and she noted that this report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website. She then announced that the Board considered in a closed meeting two disciplinary cases, and that the Board will now take final action on these cases.
 - Case Nos. 17 PB 2928 & 2929. Mr. Simpson moved to find Police Officer Jaime Gaeta and Detective Harry Matheos guilty of firing into a moving vehicle without justification, and to suspend them from the Chicago Police Department for a period of one year. The motion passed by a vote of 5 in favor (Lightfoot, Eaddy, Flores, Simpson, and Zopp) to 1 opposed (O'Malley). Mr. Simpson moved to adopt the written findings and decision and dissent that have been reviewed by all Board members who participated in the case. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Lightfoot, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, and Zopp) to 0 opposed. (Board Members Delgado, Foreman, and Sweeney recused themselves from this case pursuant to §2-57-060(c) of the Municipal Code of Chicago.)

President Lightfoot stated that the decision in the above cases will be entered as of today's date and will be issued to the parties, and that a copy of the written decision will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

- 5. President Lightfoot reported that pursuant to Rule 52, the Superintendent has requested the Board's permission to solicit funds from sponsors for two upcoming events: the Annual Police Recognition Ceremony and Luncheon to be held in May 2018, and the Major Cities Chiefs and International Association of Chiefs of Police conference to be held in 2019. Ms. Zopp moved to approve the Superintendent's requests, conditional upon an accounting of all funds received and expended being provided to the Police Board following the conclusion of this events. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 6. President Lightfoot announced that copies of the general orders and other directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during the previous month are listed in the blue books made available at the meeting and are accessible on the Police Department's website.
- 7. President Lightfoot noted that the next item of business is the Superintendent's report. Mr. Simpson moved that the oral presentation be waived, and that the report be received in writing. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 8. President Lightfoot called upon those members of the public who had signed up in advance to speak. (See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of each speaker's remarks.)
 - Kit Brennan and Michael Elliot spoke about the fatal shooting of Quintonio LeGrier and Bettie Jones by Police Officer Robert Rialmo, and demanded that Officer Rialmo be fired.
 - Pamela Hunt spoke about the issues of racism and discrimination in policing.
 - Trina Kim Townsend read a statement in which she alleged that from the age of 14 until
 she was 18 she was repeatedly raped by a Chicago police officer in the 1980s. President
 Lightfoot asked Ms. Townsend to meet with Chief Eddie Welch of the Bureau of Internal
 Affairs and COPA Chief Administrator Patricia Banks so that the allegations can be
 investigated.
 - Robert More spoke about a variety of matters.
 - Crista Noel spoke about the issue of sexual assault by police officers.
 - President Lightfoot called upon the following individuals and there was no response: Queen Sister.

President Lightfoot stated that all persons who had signed up in advance to speak had been called. Vice President Foreman moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed, and President Lightfoot announced that the meeting is adjourned.

POLICE BOARD CITY OF CHICAGO

Policy Regarding the Attendance of and Participation by the Public at Board Meetings

(Adopted 15 December 2005)

The Police Board values the attendance of the public at its meetings and the opportunity to receive comments and questions on matters concerning the Board or the Police Department. The Board will treat members of the public with courtesy and respect, and expects that the public will treat Board members and Department members in a similar manner.

Toward that end, the Board has adopted the following rules governing conduct at Board meetings:

- 1. An individual wishing to address the Board must sign-up in advance by contacting the Board's office by phone, fax, or in person no later than 4:30 p.m. of the day before the meeting.
- 2. When called upon to address the Board, each speaker is to identify him/herself and speak clearly so that all in attendance may hear and so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of the proceedings.
- 3. Due to time constraints, each speaker is limited to two minutes and must conclude when asked to do so by the Board member acting as parliamentarian.
- 4. Personal attacks, obscene language, fighting words, threats, conduct intended to disrupt or interfere with the meeting, and comments not related to matters within the Board's or the Department's jurisdiction, by a speaker or any person in attendance, are strictly prohibited.

Violation of any of the above rules may result in the removal of the violator from the meeting room, or in the immediate adjournment of the meeting; in addition, repeated violations may result in the violator not being permitted to attend or participate in future Board meetings.

PERSONNEL AND TRAINING

During the month of **January 2018**, **139** training blocks were conducted for Chicago Police Recruits, Metropolitan Recruits (including surrounding agencies) and In-Service Courses.

A total of **20,766** Department attendees received In-Service/E-Learning training, which included: Body Worn Camera, LEMART In-Service, Prescribed Weapons Qualifications, Procedural Justice and Legitimacy 1, POWER Test, Patrol Carbine Requalification A, TASER Qualification and Re-Certification, Force Mitigation, Decentralized Training Unit – Roll Call Training, Driving Unit In-Service, DUI Paperwork for Police Officers and Supervisors, Tactical Room Entry, Command Staff ASI Workshop CPD/CFD and In-Service Firearms Review Training 3.5 Hr.

A total of **762 Chicago Police Recruits** were in training along with **73 Metropolitan Police Recruits**.
