President Foreman called the meeting to order. He reported that Board Members Flores and Simpson is unable to attend the meeting in person. Vice President Wolff moved to permit attendance via audio conference. The motion passed by a vote of 7 in favor (Foreman, Wolff, Delgado, Eaddy, O'Malley, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 1. Board Member Eaddy moved to approve the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting held on February 21, 2019. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, and Simpson) to 0 opposed.
- 2. President Foreman announced that the Board's next regular public meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 11, 2019, at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

Vice President Wolff moved to close a series of executive sessions of the Board for the purposes of considering litigation and personnel matters, as authorized by sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and

- (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Foreman, Wolff, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 3. President Foreman stated that a report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month appears in the blue books made available at the meeting, and he noted that this report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website. He then announced that the Board considered in a closed meeting two disciplinary cases, and that the Board will now take final action on these cases:
 - Case No. 18 PB 2944. Board Member Delgado moved to find Police Officer Corey Maltbia guilty of leaving the scene of an off-duty traffic crash and filing a false official report, and to discharge him from the Chicago Police Department. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, and Simpson) to 0 opposed. Board Member Eaddy moved to adopt the written findings and decision that have been reviewed by all Board members who participated in the case. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, and Simpson) to 0 opposed.
 - Case No. 18 PB 2945. Board Member Delgado moved to find Police Officer Daniel Jones guilty of the use of excessive force, and to suspend him without pay from the Chicago Police Department for one year. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, and Simpson) to 0 opposed. Board Member Eaddy moved to adopt the written findings and decision that have been reviewed by all Board members who participated in the case. The motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, and Simpson) to 0 opposed.

President Foreman stated that the decisions in the above cases will be entered as of today's date and will be issued to the parties, and that a copy of each written decision will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

- 4. President Foreman provided notice that the Board plans to consider at a future public meeting amendments to its Rules of Procedure that govern its handling of disciplinary matters. He stated that a draft of the proposed amendments will be posted on the Board's website, and that questions or comments may be submitted to the Board's staff or made at the next public meeting.
- 5. President Foreman reported that that the Board received a request for permission to use the Chicago Police star on shirts to remember a police officer recently killed in the line of duty. Vice President Wolff moved to approve this request. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Foreman, Wolff, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 6. President Foreman announced that copies of the general orders and other directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during the previous month are listed in the blue books made available at the meeting and are posted on the Police Department's website.
- 7. President Foreman noted that the next item of business is the Superintendent's report. Chief Waller requested that the oral presentation be waived. Board Member O'Malley moved to waive the oral presentation and to receive the report in writing. The motion passed by a vote of 7 in favor (Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 2 opposed (Foreman and Wolff).
- 8. President Foreman called upon those members of the public who had signed up in advance to speak. (See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of each speaker's remarks.)
 - Zakiyyah Muhammad spoke about her complaint that a detective assigned to investigate a crime she reported is not being responsive. Chief Waller stated that he will speak with Ms. Muhammad after the meeting to address her concerns.
 - Octavia Mitchell followed up on her comments at previous months' meetings at which
 she requested DNA evidence from the investigation of the police-involved shooting of
 her son, Izeal Jackson. President Foreman stated that he has communicated with Ms.
 Mitchell and her attorney; President Foreman reported that he was informed that the
 request for the evidence needs to be made by Ms. Mitchell's attorney to the judge in the
 court case pertaining to this matter.
 - George Blakemore spoke about a variety of matters.
 - President Foreman called upon the following individuals and there was no response: John Catanzara and Helen Henning.
 - Robert More spoke about a variety of matters

President Foreman stated that all persons who had signed up in advance to speak had been called. Board Member Sweeney moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Foreman, Wolff, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed, and President Foreman announced that the meeting is adjourned.

POLICE BOARD CITY OF CHICAGO

Policy Regarding the Attendance of and Participation by the Public at Board Meetings

(Adopted 15 December 2005)

The Police Board values the attendance of the public at its meetings and the opportunity to receive comments and questions on matters concerning the Board or the Police Department. The Board will treat members of the public with courtesy and respect, and expects that the public will treat Board members and Department members in a similar manner.

Toward that end, the Board has adopted the following rules governing conduct at Board meetings:

- 1. An individual wishing to address the Board must sign-up in advance by contacting the Board's office by phone, fax, or in person no later than 4:30 p.m. of the day before the meeting.
- 2. When called upon to address the Board, each speaker is to identify him/herself and speak clearly so that all in attendance may hear and so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of the proceedings.
- 3. Due to time constraints, each speaker is limited to two minutes and must conclude when asked to do so by the Board member acting as parliamentarian.
- 4. Personal attacks, obscene language, fighting words, threats, conduct intended to disrupt or interfere with the meeting, and comments not related to matters within the Board's or the Department's jurisdiction, by a speaker or any person in attendance, are strictly prohibited.

Violation of any of the above rules may result in the removal of the violator from the meeting room, or in the immediate adjournment of the meeting; in addition, repeated violations may result in the violator not being permitted to attend or participate in future Board meetings.

PERSONNEL AND TRAINING

During the month of **March 2019**, **99** training blocks were conducted for Chicago Police Recruits, Metropolitan Recruits (including surrounding agencies) and In-Service Courses.

A total of **39,115** Department attendees received In-Service/E-Learning training, which included: Aux/Alt Weapons Qualifications, Decentralized Training Unit – Roll Call Training, Use of Force formerly Force Mitigation In-Service Training, LEMART and LEMART Refresher/CPR, Procedural Justice and Legitimacy I and III/Managing Implicit Bias, Patrol Carbine Requalification A, TASER Qualification and Re-Certification, TARA Gas Mask Training, FTO Training and Pre-Service Sergeant, Lieutenant and Captain Training.

A total of **499 Chicago Police Recruits** were in training along with **30 Metropolitan Police Recruits**.
