MINUTES [Draft]

Board Members Present: President Lori E. Lightfoot, Vice President Ghian Foreman, Eva-Dina Delgado, Michael Eaddy, Steve Flores, John P. O'Malley Jr., John H. Simpson, Rhoda D. Sweeney (via audio conference), and Andrea L. Zopp.

Board Members Absent: None.

Others Present: First Deputy Superintendent of Police Anthony Riccio, Deputy Director of CPD Legal Affairs Tina Skahill, Civilian Office of Police Accountability Interim Chief Administrator Patricia Banks, Police Board Executive Director Max A. Caproni, and members of the public.

President Lightfoot called the meeting to order. She reported that Ms. Sweeney is unable to attend the meeting in person. Vice President Foreman moved to permit attendance via audio conference. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 1. Vice President Foreman moved to approve the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting held on February 28, 2018. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 2. President Lightfoot announced that the Board's next regular public meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 19, 2018, at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

Ms. Sweeney moved to close a series of executive sessions of the Board for the purposes of considering litigation and personnel matters, as authorized by sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 3. President Lightfoot stated that a report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month appears in the blue books made available at the meeting, and she noted that this report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website. She then announced that the Board considered in a closed meeting one disciplinary case, and that the Board will now take final action on this case.
 - Case No. 17 PB 2937. Rev. Eaddy moved to find Police Officer Anthony Wilson not guilty of residing outside the City of Chicago, and to reinstate him to his position. The motion passed by a vote of 7 in favor (Lightfoot, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 2 opposed (Foreman and Delgado). Rev. Eaddy moved to adopt the written findings and decision and dissent that have been reviewed by all Board members who participated in the case. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

President Lightfoot stated that the decisions in the above case will be entered as of today's date and will be issued to the parties, and that a copy of the written decisions will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

- 5. President Lightfoot noted that a draft of proposed amendments to the Board's Rules of Procedure have been posted on the Board's website. Rev. Eaddy moved to amend the Rules of Procedure, effective immediately, as set forth in the draft that has been posted on the website and made available at the meeting with the following change: the last line of Section III-E shall read "...unless an Illinois statute or rule of evidence provides otherwise." The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 6. President Lightfoot announced that copies of the general orders and other directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during the previous month are listed in the blue books made available at the meeting and are accessible on the Police Department's website.
- 7. President Lightfoot noted that the next item of business is the Superintendent's report. First Deputy Superintendent Riccio welcomed the members of the public in attendance and stated that he looks forward to their comments, and he thanked the police officers working the meeting. (See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of First Deputy Riccio's remarks.)

- 8. President Lightfoot called upon those members of the public who had signed up in advance to speak. (See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of each speaker's remarks.)
 - Scott Clayton spoke about recent car-jackings in his North Kenwood neighborhood, and asked what he and his neighbors can do. First Deputy Riccio offered several suggestions in response to Mr. Clayton's concerns.
 - Kim Townsend, Shaina Landuis, Grace Patino, spoke on the issue of sexual offenses committed by police officers.
 - Jennifer No spoke about ordinances to reform police oversight in Chicago.
 - Lavonta Burke spoke about being the victim of police misconduct.
 - Ellen Corley spoke on a variety of matters related to police misconduct.
 - Queen Sister spoke about several issues, including her request for reimbursement for a gun she turned in.
 - Robert More spoke about a variety of matters.

President Lightfoot stated that all persons who had signed up in advance to speak had been called. Mr. Simpson moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed, and President Lightfoot announced that the meeting is adjourned.

POLICE BOARD CITY OF CHICAGO

Policy Regarding the Attendance of and Participation by the Public at Board Meetings

(Adopted 15 December 2005)

The Police Board values the attendance of the public at its meetings and the opportunity to receive comments and questions on matters concerning the Board or the Police Department. The Board will treat members of the public with courtesy and respect, and expects that the public will treat Board members and Department members in a similar manner.

Toward that end, the Board has adopted the following rules governing conduct at Board meetings:

- 1. An individual wishing to address the Board must sign-up in advance by contacting the Board's office by phone, fax, or in person no later than 4:30 p.m. of the day before the meeting.
- 2. When called upon to address the Board, each speaker is to identify him/herself and speak clearly so that all in attendance may hear and so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of the proceedings.
- 3. Due to time constraints, each speaker is limited to two minutes and must conclude when asked to do so by the Board member acting as parliamentarian.
- 4. Personal attacks, obscene language, fighting words, threats, conduct intended to disrupt or interfere with the meeting, and comments not related to matters within the Board's or the Department's jurisdiction, by a speaker or any person in attendance, are strictly prohibited.

Violation of any of the above rules may result in the removal of the violator from the meeting room, or in the immediate adjournment of the meeting; in addition, repeated violations may result in the violator not being permitted to attend or participate in future Board meetings.

PERSONNEL AND TRAINING

During the month of **March 2018**, **120** training blocks were conducted for Chicago Police Recruits, Metropolitan Recruits (including surrounding agencies) and In-Service Courses.

A total of **16,978** Department attendees received In-Service/E-Learning training, which included: Active Shooter, LEMART In-Service and Refresher CPR, Prescribed Weapons Qualifications, Procedural Justice and Legitimacy 1 and 2, POWER Test FTO and COPA, Patrol Carbine Requalification A, Force Mitigation, Decentralized Training Unit – Roll Call Training and Tour of Duty Training, DUI Paperwork for Police Officers and Supervisors and Command Staff ASI Workshop CPD/CFD.

A total of **757 Chicago Police Recruits** were in training along with **47 Metropolitan Police Recruits**.


