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1           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening,  
2 everyone. We're going to get the meeting  
3 started.

4                       My name is Lori Lightfoot, and I  
5 am President of the Chicago Police Board. I am  
6 calling the meeting to order.

7                       The first item of business is  
8 approval of the minutes of the Board's regular  
9 public meeting held on August 10th and the  
10 special public meeting held on August 25th,  
11 2017.

12                      Is there a motion to approve the  
13 minutes?

14           BOARD MEMBER SIMPSON: So moved.

15           BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.

16           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?

17                               (Chorus of Ayes.)

18           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

19                               (No Response.)

20           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes.

21                               Next regular public meeting will  
22 be on Thursday, October 19th at 7:30 here at  
23 Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

24                               At this time, I ask for a motion

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1 to close a series of executive sessions for  
2 purposes of considering personnel matters and  
3 litigation, as authorized by Sections 2(c)(1),  
4 (3), (4) and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings  
5 Act. Is there such a motion?

6 BOARD MEMBER SWEENEY: So moved.

7 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.

8 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?

9 (Chorus of Ayes.)

10 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

11 (No Response.)

12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: The motion passes.

13 A report of disciplinary actions  
14 taken by the Board during the previous month  
15 has been made available at this evening's  
16 meeting. This report and the Board's written  
17 Findings and Decisions are posted on the  
18 Board's website.

19 The Police Board, as authorized  
20 by the Open Meetings Act, has considered in a  
21 closed meeting two disciplinary cases. The  
22 Board will take final action on these cases.

23 Regarding case number 17 BP  
24 2925, the Superintendent filed charges to

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1 discharge Police Officer Clay Walker from the  
2 Chicago Police Department for possessing a  
3 controlled substance without a prescription.  
4 The Superintendent subsequently moved to  
5 withdraw the charges stating that he will be  
6 unable to prove the charges by a preponderance  
7 of the evidence.

8                   Is there a motion to grant the  
9 Superintendent's motion to withdraw the  
10 charges?

11           BOARD MEMBER FOREMAN:     So moved.

12           BOARD MEMBER SIMPSON:     Second.

13           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:     All in favor?

14                                   (Chorus of Ayes.)

15           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:     Any opposed?

16                                   (No Response.)

17           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:     Voting in favor are  
18 Board members Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores,  
19 O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney and myself. The  
20 motion passes by unanimous vote.

21                                   Regarding case number 17 BP 2934,  
22 the Superintendent filed charges to discharge  
23 Police Officer Michelle Bankson from the  
24 Chicago Police Department for making a false

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1 statement. The Superintendent subsequently  
2 moved to withdraw the charges without  
3 prejudice, stating that the officer has a  
4 serious medical condition.

5 Is there a motion to grant the  
6 Superintendent's motion to withdraw the  
7 charges?

8 BOARD MEMBER FOREMAN: So moved.

9 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.

10 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?

11 (Chorus of Ayes.)

12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

13 (No Response.)

14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Voting in favor are  
15 Board Members Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores,  
16 O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney and myself. The  
17 motion passes by a unanimous vote.

18 The Board's decision in the cases  
19 on which we took final action this evening will  
20 be entered as of today's date and will be  
21 issued to the parties. A copy of the written  
22 decisions will be posted on the Board's website  
23 as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

24 There's one additional

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1 disciplinary matter to announce.

2 BOARD MEMBER SIMPSON: Pursuant to Section  
3 2-78-130 of the Municipal Code of the City of  
4 Chicago, a civil member of the Police Board has  
5 considered a matter on which the Chief  
6 Administrator and the Superintendent of Police  
7 did not agree regarding the discipline of a  
8 police officer.

9 Case number 17 RR 06 involves  
10 allegations that Police Officer Dominic Merola  
11 unnecessarily pointed his weapon at the driver  
12 and passenger of a vehicle stop and detained  
13 and handcuffed the driver for an extended  
14 period of time without justification.

15 The Chief Administrator  
16 recommended sustaining the allegations and  
17 suspending the officer for 16 days. The  
18 Superintendent recommended classifying the  
19 allegations as Exonerated.

20 In my opinion, the Superintendent  
21 met the burden of overcoming the Chief  
22 Administrator's recommendation for discipline,  
23 and therefore the Superintendent's  
24 recommendation will be implemented pursuant to

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1 the ordinance.

2 A copy of the written opinion  
3 will be posted on the Board's website as  
4 required by the Municipal Code of the City of  
5 Chicago.

6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you,  
7 Mr. Simpson.

8 The general orders and other  
9 directives issued by the Superintendent of  
10 Police during previous months are listed in the  
11 books made available at this evening's meeting  
12 and are posted on the Police Department's  
13 website.

14 The next item is the  
15 Superintendent's report to the Board. We have  
16 First Deputy Kevin Navarro. Do you have a  
17 report?

18 FIRST DEPUTY NAVARRO: Good evening. First  
19 I'd like to say the Superintendent is doing  
20 well, and that he wanted me to reiterate that  
21 we are committed to making the Department  
22 better for everyone, staying true to our  
23 mission of protecting the City and its  
24 citizens.

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1           Reforms that we are putting in  
2 place, and we continue to do, center around the  
3 needs to provide better mentoring, support, and  
4 training for our police officers so that they  
5 are prepared to serve you all in Chicagoland.

6           The past year and a half we've  
7 done several things towards the steps for  
8 reform, including launching live scenario-based  
9 training, force mitigation, deescalation and  
10 crisis intervention, which our officers all  
11 liked those classes.

12           This year we released a revised  
13 use-of-force policy that is based on input from  
14 police officers, subject matter experts and for  
15 the first time citizens. We released it for  
16 public comment, two periods.

17           Happy to report that we are  
18 close to completing the first round of training  
19 on the policy for all officers.

20           By the end of this year, every  
21 officer on patrol will be equipped with a Taser  
22 and a body-worn camera.

23           We've also invigorated our  
24 officer training curriculum which now includes



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1 cultural sensitivity training at the DuSable  
2 Museum. Getting great reviews from everybody.

3 And our Community Policing  
4 Advisory Panel just finished three public  
5 meetings to review the drafting and  
6 recommendations. This will change how we  
7 police in Chicago, especially involving the  
8 community.

9 If you want to take out a pen and  
10 paper, we launched a website dedicated to  
11 tracking the progress of our reforms. It's  
12 [home.ChicagoPolice.org/reform](http://home.ChicagoPolice.org/reform). You can follow  
13 the progress of our reforms through that  
14 website.

15 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Can you repeat that?

16 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: Sure.  
17 [Home.ChicagoPolice.org/reform](http://Home.ChicagoPolice.org/reform).

18 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Excuse me. Can I get a  
19 chance to address the Board?

20 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: Let  
21 me finish.

22 We are optimistic and hopeful  
23 about the direction we're headed, but we're  
24 also realistic about knowing that there's much

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1 work ahead of us to make CPD a model agency.

2           The Superintendent and I will  
3 ensure that whatever agreement we put together  
4 and put in place with the Attorney General,  
5 that it will be put together with input from  
6 police officers, subject matter experts and  
7 people that we have sworn to serve you. So  
8 thank you very much.

9           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, First  
10 Deputy.

11           I will now call upon those  
12 members of the public who signed to speak in  
13 advance.

14           When your name is called, please  
15 step up to the microphone.

16           Again, we ask to limit your  
17 comments to two minutes in deference to people  
18 who will be coming behind you.

19           First speaker is Delphine Cherry.  
20 Good evening.

21           MS. CHERRY: My name is Delphine Cherry.  
22 I live in Hazel Crest, Illinois. I'm a Cook  
23 County resident.

24           For me, the topic is senseless

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1 and preventable, gun violence.

2           It hit too close to home, because  
3 I have lost two of my own children to gun  
4 violence in separate incidents 20 years apart.

5           In 1992, my daughter was 16 and a  
6 senior in high school. She was getting ready  
7 for college. She wanted to be a nurse. She  
8 was a smart, strong, young woman. And like  
9 young people do one night, she went to the  
10 movie with her friends. As she was leaving the  
11 theater, she was struck by a stray bullet and  
12 killed instantly. The bullet that fired -- the  
13 bullet that hit her was by a 14-year-old that  
14 was given a gun by an adult.

15           My daughter was not the target --  
16 was not the target of this horrible act of gun  
17 violence perpetrated by an illegal gun.

18           When she was killed, I was  
19 pregnant with my fourth child, my only son  
20 Tyler.

21           20 years later in 2012, December  
22 23rd, he, too, lost his life to an act of  
23 senseless gun violence. Tyler was like his  
24 sister, Tyesa, a good kid. Worked at Wal-Mart.

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1 He was going to school to be an occupational  
2 therapist, and he was target shot and killed in  
3 front of my home, in my own driveway. Tyler's  
4 murder still remains unsolved.

5 Since my children were killed, I  
6 have worked tirelessly to stop more parents  
7 from joining the worst club there is, to be a  
8 survivor of members who were lost to gun  
9 violence.

10 Through my struggles to stop  
11 senseless gun violence, I have come to support  
12 the work of everybody to pass the gun laws  
13 today here.

14 I've lost two of my kids to gun  
15 violence. We need to do something about the  
16 crime in Chicago. My daughter was killed in  
17 Chicago. My son was killed in Hazel Crest.

18 I work endless hours to try to  
19 find the way to stop this. I ask you guys to  
20 come up with a way, too. Thank you.

21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Ms.  
22 Cherry.

23 Next speaker is Irma Aragon. Ms.  
24 Aragon, good evening.

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1 MS. ARAGON: My name is Irma Aragon. I  
2 come from the north side. It is very hard for  
3 me to be here. But 2016, September 7th, my son  
4 was killed four houses close to my house, and  
5 -- and I'm here because I have a problem with  
6 the police. The police give false information  
7 to the funeral home that my son was gang  
8 related. It's not true. And I cannot bury my  
9 son in the place where we pray and everything,  
10 because all of this false information the  
11 police do it.

12 And my neighbor, they have more  
13 information than me, because they attended to  
14 the CAPS meeting. I attended, too, but I feel  
15 like -- I feel a little discriminated at this  
16 point, because they know more than me. And  
17 everything that they say about my son was not  
18 true.

19 I've attended to the police CAPS  
20 meeting, District 17, and I had to --  
21 confronted to the sergeant to ask him like  
22 that, why you give this information. He said,  
23 No, we did not. But I still hearing this  
24 problem with my neighbors, with the community,

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1 because they look different.

2 I need to work really hard on  
3 this. And I feel like it's not right when the  
4 police made these mistakes, because he was not  
5 in a gang like they say. And I'm here because  
6 I need help on the north side. North side have  
7 a lot of children, too. This is not only south  
8 side. And I feel like we don't have the same  
9 support like the south side.

10 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am.

11 Our next speaker is Elizabeth  
12 Ramirez. Ms. Ramirez, are you here?

13 MS. RAMIREZ: Yes.

14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Okay.

15 MS. RAMIREZ: Good evening. My name is  
16 Elizabeth Ramirez. I'm the cofounder for  
17 Parents for Peace and Justice.

18 October 23rd of 2011, I lost my  
19 son to the violence at his own birthday party.  
20 He gave his life for two other lives. The  
21 reason I'm standing is because I know there's  
22 too many cases and not enough detectives  
23 working on our children's cases.

24 I know that they're hiring more

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1 police officers, but why not hire more  
2 detectives to work on our children's cases.

3 We're not telling them to stop  
4 doing what they're doing and take care of our  
5 children's cases, because all children matter.  
6 All children matter. And a lot of us know our  
7 children, and because we're out there trying to  
8 get answers to our questions.

9 I'm a mother that's been out  
10 there. And I've gotten my answers to my  
11 questions. As I take the information to the  
12 detectives, to the captain and the sergeant,  
13 nothing has been done.

14 They had got a group of the guys  
15 that were involved in a gang except one, the  
16 one that's taking the credit. The one that has  
17 followed me. The one that has called me to  
18 tell me to stop.

19 You know, we need help. I'm not  
20 up here only for our children that are not here  
21 with us any longer, I'm here for the children  
22 that are still with us that deserve to live in  
23 a better city, a better community, because my  
24 group is for peace and justice.

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1                   Our children are here with us.  
2 They deserve to be able to play in a  
3 playground, be able to feel safe going to  
4 school or to a grocery store or to the store on  
5 the corner.

6                   We're losing too many of our  
7 children to this violence.

8                   And, again, I stand here not only  
9 for my child, but the moms that have lost their  
10 children, too, and the ones that are still  
11 here.

12                   I have two grandkids, 11 years  
13 old and 2 years old. My 11-year-old is scared.  
14 Why should she feel scared?

15           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am.

16           MS. RAMIREZ: Thank you so much. And God  
17 bless us.

18           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker is  
19 Rachel Oliver. Ms. Oliver, good evening.

20           MS. OLIVER: Good evening. Today I am here  
21 in my capacity as a member of the Progressive  
22 Baptist Church.

23                   As our pastor, Dr. Charlie Dates,  
24 stated some months ago, we are committed to



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1 working with the Department on efforts to  
2 improve community relationships.

3           It has been shown in numerous  
4 communities that personal interaction between  
5 officers and the communities that they police  
6 serves to humanize the civilian population,  
7 especially in regards to cross racial  
8 interaction.

9           Does the Chicago Police  
10 Department have any plans to encourage this  
11 policing style, specifically getting officers  
12 out of their cars to interact with the  
13 communities they serve? If so, how can the  
14 faith community be of assistance? After all,  
15 Jesus walked amongst sinners. Certainly the  
16 CPD can encourage some efforts for interaction  
17 between its officers and the citizens they  
18 serve. I look forward to your answer. Thank  
19 you.

20           FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: We  
21 do encourage our officers to interact with the  
22 community. It can be as simple as just getting  
23 out and saying hello, to playing basketball  
24 with the kids, jumping rope, getting as close

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1 as they can to the community.

2 I enjoy, myself, interacting.

3 And, yes, we do -- what district is your church  
4 in? Do you know what areas?

5 MS. OLIVER: We're across the highway, 35th  
6 and Wentworth.

7 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: You  
8 would be in the 9th District on that side, and  
9 they should have a faith-based committee. I  
10 can have them reach out to you if I can get  
11 your information.

12 MS. OLIVER: Thank you.

13 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO:  
14 Thank you for offering.

15 MS. OLIVER: Thank you so much.

16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am.

17 Our next speaker is Jeremy  
18 Odekerken.

19 MR. ODEKERKEN: Close enough.

20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I tried.

21 MR. ODEKERKEN: I appreciate it.

22 If I may lift this up. All  
23 right. I'm here as well with Progressive  
24 Baptist Church. I am sure you are aware of the

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1 events that transpired in St. Louis this last  
2 weekend with another miscarriage of justice  
3 once again.

4 Truly, we can all agree that we  
5 do not want to see this in our beloved Chicago.  
6 So we are here to tell you that we are with  
7 you, and we are here for you; however, we are  
8 going to provide persistent pressure and call  
9 you for accountability.

10 Not only do we promise that  
11 when -- if anything like this happens in our  
12 City, that we will peacefully and passionately  
13 protest where needed, but we desire to partner  
14 with you in whatever capacity for us to foster  
15 justice when rights and lives are threatened or  
16 trampled upon.

17 We cannot remain silent while  
18 another life is taken. So we plead with you  
19 now to please thoroughly investigate and  
20 unwaveringly pursue justice for all claims of  
21 police misconduct that come before you and land  
22 on your desks, especially in cases of officers  
23 that have a pattern of complaints of excessive  
24 force and race behavior.

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1                   There was a history of 17  
2 complaints regarding excessive force and use of  
3 racial slurs against Officer Van Dyke before he  
4 murdered Chicago teen Laquan McDonald. In each  
5 of these previous cases, no action was taken.

6                   I do not claim to know that he  
7 was guilty of every complaint lodged against  
8 him, but I do have to wonder that if action had  
9 been taken previously, whether or not something  
10 different might have happened that night in  
11 October almost three years ago. A life could  
12 have been spared, and there could be a future  
13 and hope for Laquan.

14                   This is all of our City, and we  
15 want to pursue peace with you. Because in the  
16 presence of peace, everybody, both police and  
17 civilians, can thrive.

18                   We want to be in a city which we  
19 all have a common conviction to find truth and  
20 justice that is spoken -- to find truth and  
21 justice where wrongs that are committed are  
22 being made right and the rights of all are  
23 respected and upheld. Thanks and God bless.

24                   PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.

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1 Michri Stewart.

2 Next speaker, Raphael Vargas.

3 MR. VARGOS: My name is Raphael. We are  
4 here on behalf of our daughter Alexandra  
5 Vargas. She was killed October 19th, 2014. It  
6 is an unsolved case. We have had to reach out  
7 to detectives. We are getting minimal response  
8 when we call. There are moments where they  
9 can't be reached or they don't call back. And  
10 unfortunately, they don't.

11 My daughter was sitting in the  
12 kitchen waiting for her brother, and she was  
13 killed in -- sitting in a kitchen. This is  
14 outrageous and out -- not unheard of, but it's  
15 just outrageous that something can  
16 happen -- she was going to college. She  
17 was -- she wanted to be someone. She wanted to  
18 give to society. And we have people out here  
19 with no conscience, easy accessibility to guns.

20 I know the Police Department is  
21 trying the best they can, but we need more  
22 help. She was killed in the Belmont Cragin  
23 area. There is a gang war going on in that  
24 area. It is about six shootings, people -- six

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1 deaths already this year alone. And we want  
2 something done.

3 We are here on behalf of our  
4 daughter. And we would like justice for our  
5 daughter.

6 We understand that the Police  
7 Department is overwhelmed with so many cases,  
8 but they need more detectives. They need more  
9 homicide detectives. They need more -- we need  
10 help in the City. The City looks beautiful on  
11 one side, on the other side there is blood all  
12 over the street. That needs to stop. We need  
13 to do something. We need to work together.  
14 The Police Department with the community, we  
15 need to work together.

16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.

17 Ms. Vargos, is there something  
18 you'd like to add, ma'am?

19 MRS. VARGOS: Yes. I'm the mother of  
20 Alexandra Vargos. That's her full name. At 18  
21 years old, like my husband said, she was a  
22 freshman in college and her goal was to be a  
23 social worker. That was what she wanted to do.

24 So, as parents, we're doing all

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1 we can so we could express our concerns and  
2 others that don't even realize what's going on  
3 out there, because you don't have to be  
4 affected or know someone that is affected by  
5 gun violence to proceed to help, because my  
6 daughter was taken away. Her innocent life was  
7 taken away. Her dreams were taken away. But  
8 as parents, we can't let her dreams be taken  
9 away.

10 So we're going to do all we can,  
11 but we want justice, and we want the support of  
12 everyone in the law system.

13 There's too many lives that are  
14 being taken away. And it's not fair for  
15 anyone. It's not fair for those that want to  
16 make a difference in the society.

17 We raised her right, and we've  
18 done all we can, and there has to be something.  
19 There has to be something in place. There has  
20 to be. It's too much. Too many young lives,  
21 older, elderly and young, and it's just too  
22 much. We want answers, please.

23 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Navarro, could  
24 you meet with the Vargos?

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1                   And also, Mrs. Ramirez, are you  
2 still here?

3           MS. RAMIREZ: Yes, I am.

4           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Both of these, this  
5 family and Ms. Ramirez are talking about  
6 detectives that haven't responded to them about  
7 the status of the investigation of their  
8 families, and I wonder if you could speak with  
9 them about that.

10          FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: No  
11 problem.

12          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Stay at the end of  
13 the meeting and go see the First Deputy.

14          MRS. VARGOS: Thank you.

15          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is  
16 Carolyn Ruff.

17          MS. RUFF: Thank you for -- good to see  
18 you. This is my first time here. But I do  
19 have a complaint.

20                   March 9th, there was a young lady  
21 that was abused at one of these chain Missha  
22 stores in Charlotte, North Carolina. I'm  
23 pretty sure if you have not viewed the video, I  
24 encourage you to go back and look up Missha,



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1 Charlotte, North Carolina, and view the video.

2 Well, since that, I organized a  
3 boycott here, because the owner of Missha in  
4 Charlotte, North Carolina, is also the owner  
5 here in Chicago. And they live here in  
6 Chicago.

7 Well, we've been boycotting that  
8 store for over 100 something days, and since  
9 then, I've been harassed, put in jail. I'm a  
10 70-year-old woman. And lies have been told on  
11 me. And the police on 51st and Wentworth,  
12 every time we call to explain to them that we  
13 are being harassed, this is a peaceful protest,  
14 they seem to take Missha's side.

15 I tried calling the alderman to  
16 have a meeting with her. She refused. And I  
17 want something to be done, because they are  
18 not -- they're abusing me as a woman, as my  
19 right to protest. And I would like for  
20 something to be done of a -- they gave me a  
21 restraining order, which I have not done  
22 anything to anyone out there, just boycotting  
23 peacefully, me and a couple more people. But  
24 we've complained about the people that work in

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1 this store. They've called us the B word.  
2 They called us KKK. They called us the N word.  
3 They threw pennies at us. You name it, they  
4 have abused us. They have abused me, and I  
5 wake up every night thinking that they put me  
6 in jail for no reason. No reason. And this  
7 happened August 8th.

8 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am.  
9 Just point of clarification. Have you filed  
10 any kind of complaint with IPRA or the Bureau  
11 of Internal Affairs?

12 MS. RUFF: No, I have not filed.

13 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I don't see anybody  
14 here from IPRA.

15 Chief -- I wonder if you can go  
16 around the column. The chief of internal  
17 affairs is here on the other side of the  
18 column, ma'am, and he'll be happy to speak with  
19 you about your concern.

20 MS. RUFF: Thank you very much. And I want  
21 to say to all the parents that have lost their  
22 loved ones, I'm fighting for justice for you as  
23 well. And my heart is bleeding for all the  
24 young people that have been killed in this

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1 community, and we got to do something. We got  
2 to do something. Thank you very much.

3 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Chief Welsh is in the  
4 back there.

5 Our next speaker is Pamela Hunt.  
6 Pamela Hunt.

7 MS. HUNT: I'm here. Good evening. Also  
8 I express my condolences to the parents who  
9 have lost children and to the families.

10 I guess my concern is, the  
11 easiest thing to do is follow up, a phone call  
12 with the parents. That's the easiest thing to  
13 do. And why detectives are not doing that,  
14 it's despicable. It is despicable. It goes  
15 against the very reform that is supposed to  
16 take place. The easiest thing to do is to call  
17 a parent. I'm just disgusted even thinking  
18 about that.

19 So I'm here before you today  
20 because I'm concerned -- attorney Lightfoot, I  
21 saw you on PBS, you and Shari Runner. And I  
22 saw the discussion with the gentleman -- I  
23 think from the Chicago Police Survivor. And  
24 I'm afraid that there are many officers

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1 currently on the force who take that same  
2 position, that people, unarmed citizens, are  
3 looking for a payday when they're being abused,  
4 or somehow that our stories about abuse aren't  
5 real, they're fabricated or they're  
6 overexaggerated.

7                   And the Fraternal Order of Police  
8 president, I don't know if you met with him,  
9 his mentality seems to be pretty much the same.  
10 So I'm going to the very beginning. I'm saying  
11 the issue is racism. And I'm asking what are  
12 you going to do about it? When you talk about  
13 cultural sensitivity, in my mind, it makes no  
14 sense to bring people onto the force and then  
15 try to induct them into cultural sensitivity.  
16 If they haven't come in contact with a Latino  
17 or a black person, it doesn't make any sense to  
18 have that person on the force.

19                   So I don't know what reforms in  
20 the hiring practices, I don't know how are you  
21 trying to rid yourselves of the racists on the  
22 force, or how you're trying to prevent further  
23 racist officers from being on the force.

24                   We have a president who is a

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1 white supremacist, and we have a DOJ head,  
2 Sessions, who is a white racist and KKK  
3 empathizer, and I am not going to back down  
4 from that statement.

5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you.

6 MS. HUNT: So I'm asking what are you all  
7 going to do about the racism?

8 Let me say, be the change, that  
9 campaign, all I ask is, what are you asking the  
10 white community to do to change?

11 And Pat Hill, I cannot stand up  
12 and not mention Pat Hill. That sister gave her  
13 life. She fought for the black community, and  
14 she exemplified what a police officer should do  
15 in terms of community policing and really  
16 trying to just help the community.

17 We're not trying to be  
18 adversaries, but we're not trying to be victims  
19 either.

20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you.

21 Our next speaker is Crista Noel.  
22 Ms. Noel, are you here?

23 Our next speaker is Queen Sister.

24 Good evening, ma'am.

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1 MS. QUEEN SISTER: Good evening. Can we,  
2 perhaps, have a moment of silence for Pat Hill.

3 (Brief Pause.)

4 Okay. This is real on this  
5 battle field. Okay. I want to say, regarding  
6 Carolyn, I was over at Missha in January, and  
7 we went through and did a license check for the  
8 establishment to find that they were violating  
9 City ordinance. The police were called, and  
10 when they arrived, the only thing they were  
11 worried about was arresting the black sister in  
12 the snow suit, and that was me, because they  
13 had been out there for two weeks bouncing  
14 around.

15 And that's just another problem  
16 we have among us as a culture of people.  
17 Everybody wants to play the game, but don't  
18 nobody want to take time to learn the rules.

19 So, naturally, I called, and I  
20 made the necessary complaints with the  
21 alderman. My sister knocked on the window and  
22 told Officer Schiller that a man was down the  
23 street waving a gun. He was ready to lock me  
24 up.

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1                   Now, when we say to you, I'll be  
2 over there this week, we're going to call --  
3 and I'm going to call you before I call the  
4 officers, because we want a -- we want you to  
5 do your job. We want you to earn your money.  
6 We want you to come to that establishment and  
7 violate them for not complying with the  
8 ordinances and enforce the law.

9                   Our babies are back in school. A  
10 lot of them took their summer funds to buy  
11 guns. Let's not act like how this goes.

12                   On top of that, we discovered  
13 that there's a young Caucasian with a --  
14 Caucasian teacher that was distributing guns  
15 and ammunition to the students. He represent  
16 at least ten. Back on the street.

17                   We've also discovered since the  
18 last time I've been here that the same guns  
19 that I told you was turned in end up back on  
20 the street as --

21                   PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sister, Sister, let  
22 me first say your time is up. I'm going to  
23 give you time to wrap it up. Don't lean so  
24 close to the microphone so we won't get the

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1 feedback.

2 MS. QUEEN SISTER: I ran into two young  
3 guys in the morning walking down the alley with  
4 guns because they're scared.

5 We had a system in place. When  
6 our community officer, who knew me, I'll take  
7 the guns and give him the guns, and he turned  
8 them in. He is retired. And that is no longer  
9 in play.

10 So where do we take these guns?  
11 I couldn't touch them, because I don't want my  
12 prints on them.

13 So who do we call to -- when we  
14 call 911, you don't show up because it is not a  
15 life-threatening emergency until after the  
16 trigger is pulled.

17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sister, I'm going to  
18 ask you to stop there, and maybe First  
19 Deputy Navarro can talk to you after the  
20 meeting is over.

21 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: You  
22 can call when you have guns for us to recover,  
23 call 911. I will guarantee you an officer will  
24 be there fast.



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1 MS. QUEEN SISTER: They document. We've  
2 done it twice this school year. School hadn't  
3 been in a month, and we made two calls, and  
4 it's a no-show.

5 And let me say this,  
6 Superintendent, while you are interim here,  
7 don't think for two seconds that you're going  
8 to deal with DACA and not deal with BLOCA.

9 I need you all to read Article  
10 4 -- Section 4 of the United States  
11 Constitution, and I want to point out this  
12 invasion and (Inaudible). That's all I'm going  
13 to say.

14 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: I want to address the  
15 Board.

16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sir, sir.

17 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Putting --

18 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sir, sir.

19 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: It ain't about --

20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Queen Sister, you  
21 made a very serious allegation about a teacher  
22 trafficking guns. I'm going to ask you --

23 MS. QUEEN SISTER: Calm down. We're going  
24 to talk.

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1           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:   Again, sorry to  
2   impose upon you again.

3                       I wonder if you'd like to make a  
4   report of that allegation against a teacher,  
5   specific details.

6                       Chief Welsh of the Bureau of  
7   Internal Affairs is here, and I'm sure he would  
8   be more than happy to take that report.

9           MS. QUEEN SISTER:    Thank you.

10          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:  Did you say the  
11   teacher was arrested?

12          MS. QUEEN SISTER:    He's been arrested.  
13   But we understand there was more than one at  
14   that particular school.

15          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:  Thank you very much.

16          MS. QUEEN SISTER:    Can we see what you're  
17   doing with the money?

18                       Can we see something about the  
19   budget in this blue book?

20          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:  Thank you, Queen  
21   Sister.

22          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT:  Our next speaker is  
23   George Blakemore.

24          UNKNOWN SPEAKER:    I want to address the

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1 Board.

2 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sir, if you'd like to  
3 speak, you need to sign up ahead of time.

4 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: I just want to --

5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Go ahead,  
6 Mr. Blakemore. Good evening.

7 MR. BLAKEMORE: To the citizens of our City  
8 and to Ms. Lightfoot, I told the mayor that I  
9 was going to speak about his appointment  
10 of him. He was forced to do that. We can't  
11 force these people to respect us. They have to  
12 respect our money. I'm not -- we can't  
13 legislate the law. No white man have to like a  
14 black man. He don't have to like me. I got to  
15 like me.

16 Racism has been here and gonna  
17 stay here. The only person that have to love  
18 you, you got to love yourself and respect  
19 yourself and make people respect you.

20 You have a political system here.  
21 It must work for you. You continuously call  
22 the same political people. Well, you put them  
23 there.

24 Nobody have to like me, but me.

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1                   Now, what about sanctuary and the  
2 negative effect that it has on the Chicago  
3 Police force. Bringing drugs into the country.  
4 Drug cartel. Create all type of crime. And  
5 not respecting the law of the United States of  
6 America when it comes to immigration and  
7 naturalization.

8                   So you are not doing your job,  
9 because the mayor told you not to do it.  
10 Sanctuary. Don't ask them if they a citizen.

11                   I'm a citizen. If I commit a  
12 crime, I am a U.S. citizen, and you treat me  
13 one way. Those that commit a crime that don't  
14 belong here, turn them into ICE. Send them  
15 back where they came from.

16                   Now, wait a minute here. This is  
17 out of control. God bless America. And I'm a  
18 U.S. citizen. My people came here as slaves in  
19 America. Not immigrants, but enslaved. And  
20 seems like to me that you still want to keep us  
21 there and put another group when you got  
22 investigation and your human resource and going  
23 to use it on these people that don't even  
24 belong here.

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1                   And the little dirty secret, you  
2 can be a Chicago policeman and do not have to  
3 be a citizen of the USA.

4                   And thank you, Ms. Lightfoot. So  
5 much progress obtained because of you. And you  
6 and these other blacks on this Board.

7                   God bless each one of you.

8           UNKNOWN SPEAKER: I want to address the  
9 Board.

10          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sir, you are not  
11 speaking tonight. You have not signed up. I  
12 have asked you politely. No, sir. No, sir.  
13 I've asked you politely. Sir. Sir.

14          UNKNOWN SPEAKER: You all got to police --

15          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our last speaker,  
16 Mr. Robert More.

17                   Mr. More, please. Wait one  
18 second.

19                   Sir, please take your seat. Can  
20 you please take your seat, sir.

21                   Mr. More, go ahead.

22          MR. MORE: Robert More speaking. Executive  
23 of the archangel. 18, September of 2017.

24                   There's been some confusion over

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1 the most recent meetings as to what day it is  
2 and their special meetings. And maybe on the  
3 voicemail after hours a message can be left  
4 with the Police Board number, because trying to  
5 follow all this has gotten confusing. I have  
6 missed some meetings.

7 I'm really sorry to hear the  
8 troubled infliction of the Superintendent, but  
9 that brings us back to the question: What is  
10 necessary for the citizens of the City of  
11 Chicago? Is the Superintendent cognizant of  
12 the contents of the conveyances of each of the  
13 public speakers at each and every meeting?

14 I have to come down here and  
15 having the -- we have a new -- a different  
16 deputy superintendent.

17 This isn't like we're in some  
18 little Petticoat Junction or something where  
19 there's just one deputy. It's not Barney Fife.  
20 I mean there's 13,000 different individuals  
21 could be sitting there.

22 So trying to accomplish what I'm  
23 trying to accomplish, it's just -- and now I'm  
24 just moving on to make a record.

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1           So, again, I have respectfully  
2 demanded sometimes a stipulation as to the  
3 Superintendent at least reading, cognizant of  
4 the contents of the conveyances.

5           Again, what happened on September  
6 11th. We are now 16 years and one week since  
7 the September 11th, 2001, atrocity.

8           The last premeditated murder was  
9 (inaudible) victim in January of 2016.

10           40 months and two days the next  
11 scheduled inauguration. This is a temporary  
12 window of opportunity which will be lost  
13 forever, even if -- I don't know if Trump's not  
14 doing a good job at all. He is not bearing the  
15 burden of the office.

16           Nonetheless, at least we're not  
17 having attempts to start deportations to the  
18 camps.

19           My heart goes out to all the  
20 people who've lost children due to the sins of  
21 other human beings. But no gun has ever killed  
22 anyone. No knife has ever killed anyone. And  
23 the means of self-defense is necessary to keep  
24 an armed citizenry, the Second Amendment.

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1                   There's no problem in human  
2 history to which more government is ever the  
3 solution. That's simply not the problem.

4                   David Clarke, Milwaukee County  
5 sheriff --

6           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, you need to  
7 wrap up.

8           MR. MORE: Okay. Trying to make the best  
9 use of the time.

10                   The last really important thing,  
11 I just have to solute the following three in  
12 law enforcement: Jack McLain, Ted Gunderson,  
13 and Terrence Seeke, without your revelations of  
14 the truth of the first World Trade Center, the  
15 agenda of the (inaudible) Oklahoma City and  
16 trying to expose what really happened.

17                   I solute all of you (inaudible)  
18 for all members of the City of Chicago Police  
19 Department.

20           THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. More.

21           MR. MORE: Thank you.

22           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Before we adjourn, I,  
23 too, want to join the other speakers in noting  
24 the passing of former Police Officer Patricia



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1 Hill. She held us all accountable. She  
2 demanded accountability in a high standard.

3 I send out our condolences to her  
4 family.

5 I also want to thank our now  
6 former Hearing Officer Jackie Walker. 30 years  
7 of service to the Police Board. And want to  
8 thank her for her dedication to her tasks. She  
9 will be missed.

10 Now, is there a motion to adjourn  
11 tonight's meeting?

12 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: So moved.

13 BOARD MEMBER SIMPSON: Second.

14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?

15 (Chorus of Ayes.)

16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Okay. The motion  
17 passes. The meeting is adjourned.

18 Thank you, folks.
