1           PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening, everyone.

2 We are going to get started. My name is Lori  
3 Lightfoot, I'm the President of the Chicago Police  
4 Board, and I'm calling the meeting to order.

5           The first item of business is approval of  
6 the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting  
7 held on May 18, 2017.

8           Is there a motion?

9           MEMBER SIMPSON: So moved.

10          MEMBER SWEENEY: Second.

11          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

12          The motion passes.

13          Our next regular public meeting will be  
14 on Thursday, July 20, at 7:30 p.m., here at Chicago  
15 Public Safety Headquarters.

16          At this time I ask for a motion to close  
17 a series of executive sessions for the purposes of  
18 considering personnel matters and litigation, as  
19 authorized by Sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11)  
20 of the Illinois Open Meetings Act.

21          Is there such a motion?

22          MEMBER EADDY: So moved.

23          PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Is there a second?

24          MEMBER FRY: Second.



1 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?

2 (Ayes in unison.)

3 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

4 The motion passes.

5 Earlier this evening the Board, as  
6 required by the Illinois Open Meetings Act, met and  
7 considered minutes and recordings of all past  
8 closed meetings to determine whether the need for  
9 confidentiality still exists. The Board members  
10 unanimously agreed that it continues to be  
11 necessary to keep confidential the minutes  
12 recording of its past closed meetings.

13 A report of disciplinary actions taken by  
14 the Board during the previous month has been made  
15 available during this evening's meeting. This  
16 report and the Board's written findings and  
17 decisions are posted on the Board's website.

18 The Police Board, as authorized by the  
19 Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed  
20 meeting one disciplinary case. The Board will now  
21 take final action on this case.

22 Regarding Case No. 16 PB 2914, is there a  
23 motion to find Police Officer Aaron Washington  
24 guilty of engaging in threatening and harassing



1 behavior while off duty, and to discharge him from  
2 the Chicago Police Department?

3 MEMBER SWEENEY: So moved.

4 MEMBER FRY: Second.

5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?

6 (Ayes in unison.)

7 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

8 Voting in favor will be Board Members  
9 Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, Fry, O'Malley,  
10 Simpson, Sweeney, and myself. The motion passes.

11 Is there a motion to adopt the written  
12 findings and decision that has been reviewed by all  
13 Board members who participated in the case?

14 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So moved.

15 MEMBER FRY: Second.

16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?

17 (Ayes in unison.)

18 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: The motion passes.

19 The Board's decision in the case on which  
20 we took final action this evening will be entered  
21 as of today's date and will be issued to the  
22 parties. A copy of the written decision will be  
23 posted on the Board's website within ten business  
24 days as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.



1           The next item on the agenda is a notice  
2 concerning amendments to Article III, Section D, of  
3 the Police Board's Rules of Procedure. Notice of  
4 the Board's plan to consider these amendments and a  
5 draft of the amendments were posted on the Board's  
6 website on May 24, 2017, and remain on the website.

7           The general orders and directive issued  
8 by the Superintendent of Police during the previous  
9 month are listed in the books made available in  
10 this evening's meeting, and are posted on the  
11 Police Department's website.

12           The next item is the Superintendent's  
13 report to the Board.

14           Superintendent.

15           SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: For nearly a year and  
16 a half now, the Chicago Police Department has been  
17 on the road to reform. It's a path that we have  
18 committed to and one from which we refuse to  
19 waiver.

20           Now, I'm not a lawyer, so I won't speak  
21 about litigation. But since I've been the  
22 Superintendent, I've been working to give better  
23 resources to our officers and making CPD a more  
24 accessible, more transparent partner with the



1 communities we serve.

2 Just this past March we released a  
3 framework that dictates the path to reform we  
4 intend to take as an agency. While we were  
5 building this framework, we didn't wait to begin  
6 making changes at CPD. We recently launched our  
7 new use of force policy that was built upon input  
8 from both police officers and the community in two  
9 public comment periods.

10 We have committed to equip patrol  
11 officers throughout the city with body-worn cameras  
12 by the end of this year. We've made a  
13 department-wide emphasis on de-escalation to reduce  
14 the intensity of certain encounters. And our  
15 Community Police Advisory Panel continues to work  
16 to develop a plan that will be successful in  
17 Chicago.

18 While all this has been going on,  
19 countless conversations have taken place between  
20 the department and the public on how we can work  
21 together, united as a city, for a common cause.

22 Beyond our labels as police officers,  
23 activists, or elected officials, we all share one  
24 common label, and that's Chicagoans. We all share



1 the same love for this city and want this  
2 department to be better for everyone. Not just for  
3 the officers, but for the citizens that we serve.

4 while there were differing opinions on  
5 how to go about implementing these reforms, we  
6 share a common end goal. And that is meaningful,  
7 tangible, and long-term sustainable positive  
8 reform. It won't happen overnight because we want  
9 to get it done right, not quickly and not  
10 carelessly.

11 I made a promise when I became  
12 Superintendent that I will work every day to make  
13 this agency better. I plan on keeping that  
14 promise, and I'm making my commitment again today  
15 that we will not waiver from this path.

16 Thank you.

17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you,  
18 Superintendent.

19 I will now call upon those members of  
20 the public who signed up in advance to speak. When  
21 your name is called, please step up to the  
22 microphone. And, again, consistent with Board  
23 Rules, we ask you to limit your comments to two  
24 minutes so that folks who are coming behind you



1 have the opportunity to speak.

2 Our first speak is Pamela Hunt. Pamela  
3 Hunt.

4 Our next speak is Crista Noel. Crista  
5 Noel.

6 Good evening.

7 MS. NOEL: Good evening. How are you?

8 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Every time it's a  
9 different microphone.

10 MS. NOEL: Okay.

11 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I don't know who is  
12 controlling the volume. Can you turn up the  
13 volume?

14 MS. NOEL: Okay. How are you doing?

15 MEMBER FRY: Good. How about you?

16 MS. NOEL: Things are going.

17 Hey, Eddie, how are you doing? Haven't  
18 seen you in a while. Looks like you lost some  
19 weight.

20 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Twenty-four pounds.  
21 Thank you.

22 MS. NOEL: It looks good on you.

23 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Thank you.

24 MS. NOEL: I know you didn't expect this job to



1 be what it is, right? It will make you lose  
2 weight, right?

3 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: No, I'm trying to.  
4 This is intentional.

5 MS. NOEL: And I heard that you weren't doing  
6 too well as far as --

7 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: No, I'm good. I don't  
8 know who told you that.

9 MS. NOEL: All right. All right. You know  
10 they having the greatest alumni over at Corliss.  
11 Are you in the running?

12 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Yes, I am.

13 MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC: All right. I'm giving  
14 you my vote.

15 I was thinking the other day about top  
16 shelf, right. You know, top shelf, and how that's  
17 what we want for the city, right. The top shelf.  
18 And I thought about how, when something is on the  
19 top shelf, how you have to reach for it, you know.  
20 And you have to stretch sometimes, you know, and  
21 really get up on your toes and reach for it, you  
22 know.

23 And I don't know if we're stretching far  
24 enough and reaching for it. I think we're kind of



1 being conservative in our views and we kind of get  
2 stuck there, right. You know, we kind of start  
3 thinking that it's okay to do this and it's okay to  
4 do that. And what I know the community is saying  
5 is that it is not okay to shoot and kill people.

6 Now, I want to say something. The other  
7 day you had a young woman. Well, it really wasn't  
8 the other day, it was a few days ago, you had a  
9 young woman. I believe she was accused of  
10 attempted murder or something like that, and she  
11 shot a police officer and the bullet was caught in  
12 his vest. Or shot at, that's the alleged, okay.  
13 And you all shot her, but you didn't kill her.

14 And you know what, little things like  
15 that I appreciate, okay. I appreciate. I  
16 appreciate when you can shoot people and not kill  
17 them, you know. And I think that's the end goal,  
18 you know.

19 I know that police officers put up with a  
20 lot of stuff out there, and I know that we got a  
21 lot of post-traumatic stress on the street. That I  
22 know we got a lot of, period, stress on the street.  
23 And I know that they see things that I would never  
24 in my life want to see, okay. So I understand



1 that. And I understand that there are situations  
2 that are very, very dangerous for police officers.

3 But I'm still asking to go top shelf in  
4 everything that you do. To think top shelf. To  
5 think that we have to reach for that shelf. It  
6 ain't right here. What we got to do ain't right  
7 here, okay. What we got to do is way up. And I  
8 expect the culture of the Police Department to be  
9 in that mode, top shelf, okay.

10 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.

11 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you very much,  
12 Ms. Noel. We always appreciate your comments.

13 Our next speaker is Queen Sister. Queen  
14 Sister, are you here?

15 Our last speaker is Robert More.

16 Mr. More?

17 MR. MORE: It is June 15 of 2017, Robert J.  
18 More speaking on behalf of the institute of  
19 St. Michael, the archangel, executive committee.  
20 This is the Chicago Police Board component of  
21 the --

22 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Excuse me, you have to  
23 turn off the light.

24 MR. MORE: Pardon me? Oh. Let me start again.



1           We are now starting over here again. I  
2 was interrupted. I think that's kind of the time  
3 here as far as I know, and I can't justify it  
4 because of the time.

5           This is post stair re consideration,  
6 remission for June 2017. First of all, I have the  
7 general disclaimer that I speak here with either  
8 not in any way reinforced the continued existence  
9 and operation of this entity or any other entity  
10 under the nominal United States of America. The  
11 whole thing is an abomination of the Lord.

12           Notwithstanding that fact, I have to  
13 continue to conduct the activity in circumstances  
14 that exist, not in King St. Louis IX of France. So  
15 I just put in the disclaimer in so there is nothing  
16 I do that constitutes any type of apprehended  
17 legitimately (sic) endorsement of anything that's  
18 going on in this country. But -- so it's not on my  
19 record of activity.

20           The other thing is, this is a government  
21 interaction disclaimer. And I'm speaking very  
22 loud, I realize that, because I have a completely  
23 plugged ear and I don't know how loud I'm speaking.

24           But anyway, meeting with 32nd ward



1 Alderman, and, first of all, I screamed bloody  
2 murder about it makes a reference to the sanctity  
3 of the human life in that document use of force.  
4 How can an idiot protect clinics, Chambers, that  
5 murders the preborn, possibly make the claim to be  
6 concerned about the sanctity of human life.

7 If they're really concerned about the  
8 sanctity of human life, they should just stand down  
9 and we can drop all those abominations into the  
10 footprint and then we can protect the sanctity of  
11 life.

12 But to use that type of language, that is  
13 an abomination of the Lord. And I'm convinced that  
14 a (inaudible) of darkness, John 2:18 and it's John  
15 8:44, and it's skull and crossbones.

16 So it's my burden to help you flush out  
17 that skull and crossbones the demonic needs  
18 activity so that it can then be seen on the Capital  
19 steps in the noonday sun in the presence of the  
20 AR15 (inaudible) component of the population that  
21 is still is not -- not seen to recognize the true  
22 sanctity of human life, and we can get rid of it.  
23 We can extricate that.

24 Another thing, talking about the City of



1 Chicago Police Department as a force for good.

2 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you, Mr. More.

3 Thank you for your time.

4 MR. MORE: I can't hear. Anyway, I'm only  
5 going as far as I can through this.

6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, your time is  
7 up.

8 MR. MORE: Thank you.

9 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you.

10 We actually have one more speaker.

11 Pastor Charles Davis. Good evening, sir.

12 REV. DAVIS: Good evening. Thank you so much  
13 for permitting me to address the Board.

14 My name is Dr. Charles Davis. I'm the  
15 senior pastor of the Pentecostal church here in  
16 Bronzeville. It just happens to be the best church  
17 in this neighborhood. And there's a few of us who  
18 have come tonight, because we understand it to be  
19 our responsibility as citizens of the city, as well  
20 as people of faith, to be present here to remind  
21 you that he who is good and righteous cares about  
22 justice.

23 I attended one of these meetings last  
24 year and was broken in my heart to see the families



1 and the mothers that are bleeding, that were  
2 hurting. And I asked our church to stand with us  
3 every month to help you. That's really why we're  
4 here. Not to be adversarial.

5 So part of my question to you would be  
6 how do you see young people of faith in this  
7 neighborhood helping you to achieve your job of  
8 building better trust between the police and our  
9 community.

10 Our second question is how can we help  
11 you, I guess, in the contractual work between the  
12 Fraternal Order of Police. We want to be sure that  
13 we're doing all that we can to stand as a bridge  
14 with you. Not to fight you, and not to fight our  
15 community, but to help in any way we can.

16 Thank you, President Lightfoot, for  
17 giving me a chance to speak to you all. And we  
18 look forward to seeing you again.

19 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. And we can  
20 talk off line with respect to your questions.

21 MS. FAIRLY: I will be happy to talk with you  
22 about it as well.

23 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: At this time all persons  
24 who have signed up in advance to speak have been



1 recognized.

2 Is there a motion to adjourn?

3 MEMBER FRY: So moved.

4 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Second.

5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?

6 (Ayes in unison.)

7 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: The motion passes and the  
8 meeting is adjourned. Thank you all.


