| 6 | Is there a motion to permit him to do so? |
| 7 | MEMBER FRY: So moved. |
| 8 | PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Is there a second? |
| 9 | MEMBER SIMPSON: Second. |
| 10 | PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor? |

| 14 | The first item of business is approval of |

held on Thursday, August 10, at 7:30 p.m. here at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters. Please note this meeting is on the second Thursday of the month. It's earlier than it normally is.

At this time I ask for a motion to close a series of executive sessions for the purpose of considering personnel matters and litigation, as authorized by Sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act.

Is there such a motion?

MEMBER FRY: So moved.

MEMBER EADDY: Second.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?

(Ayes in unison.)

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Opposed? The motion passes.

A report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month has been made available at this evening's meeting. Also, copies of the Board's annual report have been made available.

These reports and the Board's written Findings and Decisions are posted on the Board's web site.



The Police Board, as authorized by the 1 Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed 2 3 meeting one disciplinary case. The Board will now 4 take final action on this case. Regarding Case No. 16 PB 2916, is there a 5 6 motion to find Police Officer Danny Salgado guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer while off duty and 7 8 making false statements, and to discharge him from the Chicago Police Department? 9 10 MEMBER FRY: So moved. 11 MEMBER SIMPSON: Second. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? 12 13 (Ayes in unison.) 14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? Voting in 15 favor are Board Members Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, Fry, O'Mally, Simpson, Sweeney, and myself. 16 17 Any opposed? 18 The motion passes. Is there a motion to adopt the written 19 20 Findings and Decision of the that have been 21 reviewed by all Board members who participated in 22 the case? 23 So moved. MEMBER FRY: 24 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Is there a second?



1 Second. MEMBER EADDY: PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? 2 3 (Ayes in unison.) 4 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? All right. 5 The motion passes. The Board's decision in the case on which 6 7 we took final action this evening will be entered as of today's date, and will be issued to the 8 parties. A copy of the written decision will be 9 posted on the Board's website within ten business 10 11 days as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago. 12 There is one additional disciplinary 13 matter to announce. 14 Pursuant to Section 2-78-130 of the 15 Municipal Code of Chicago, one member of the Police Board has considered a matter in which the Chief 16 17 Administrator of the Independent Police Review Authority and Superintendent of Police did no agree 18 regarding the discipline of three police officers. 19

Case Nos. 17 RR 03, 04, and 05 involve allegations that Police Officers Brian Postrelko, Michael Torres, and Nelson Crespo failed to properly investigate and report a battery of two individuals. The Chief Administrator recommended



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sustaining all allegations and suspending each officer for 40 days. The Superintendent recommended sustaining one allegation and suspending each officer for 20 days.

In the opinion of the Reviewing Member,
Board Member Rita Fry, the response of the
Superintendent does not meet the burden of
overcoming the Chief Administrator's
recommendations for discipline.

A copy of the written opinion will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code.

The next item on the agenda is consideration of the amendments to Article III, Section D, of the Police Board's Rules of Procedure. Notice of the Board's plan to consider these amendments, and a draft of the amendments, were posted on the Board's website on May 24, 2017.

And, as always, we ask that you limit your comments to two minutes so that all those who 10 11 have signed up to speak may have an opportunity to 12 do so. 13 The first speaker is Crista Noel. 14 MS. NOEL: Hi. How are you all doing tonight? 15 All right. 16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Can you speak up just a 17 little bit? I'll just hold it. 18 MS. NOEL: 19 This your last one? 20 MEMBER FRY: Next month. 21 MS. NOEL: Okay. Well, I won't say anything 22 then. 23 Thank you. MEMBER FRY: 24 MS. NOEL: I'm a little upset about the death

of Chiquita Adams (phonetic). You all know about that one? Okay.

MEMBER SWEENEY: Why don't you give us a little.

MS. NOEL: That's the one where they chased the police officer, and the police officer ran into the woman in the car and killed her in the car, okay.

So I don't understand chases. I don't understand why we're doing them through neighborhoods. I don't understand why innocent people are getting killed. What, you even killed a 911 operator in a chase.

when I first started at the Board, there were two officers who were responsible for a young man that chased this young man and he was on his motorcycle. They didn't even have a good reason to chase him, and he ended up dying at the end of the street on Halsted and 95th or somewhere like that. And they turned off around the corner and lied on their report and said that they didn't have anything to do with it, and you all ended up firing them. So I appreciate that.

But with that being said, why are you chasing people through the neighborhood? You got



1 to stop. You got to stop. You know, I mean, this 2 is the second woman that's been killed this year. 3 One shot who had psycho social disability. This 4 woman, she was just driving a car. 5 Now, I don't know what was up with the police officer and why he wouldn't stop, that 6 7 doesn't make any sense to my, why you would chase a 8 police officer. But I really think that there needs to be 9 a review of the chase policies, and that review 10 11 should basically say that there is really nothing, 12 no good reason to chase anyone through the City of Chicago because of the risk to innocent life. 13 14 That's all I have. 15 CHAIRMAN MIDDLETON: Thank you, ma'am. MS. NOEL: All right. 16 17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is 18 Lavonta Burks. Lavonta Burks? 19 The next speaker is Queen Sister. Queen 20 Sister? 21 The next speak is Ms. EvAngel YHWHnewBN. 22 MS. YHWHnewBN: Good evening. I quess 23 everybody has heard about the black officer that



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killed the white woman. What I found interesting

about it, beyond the tragedy that we see here in the City of Chicago all the time, it just reminding me of opening the doors to the officers and then end up getting shot and killed.

But they seemed to have changed the narrative. Whenever somebody white kills somebody black, it's always what was in his system. With Laquon McDonald, they went all the way back to when he was two years old. And so now, all the sudden they started talking about the officer's troubled past. And they brought up the fact that he had had at least two or three complaints against him.

So my question is now that is policy has been put on glass, will we see background or -- on the police officer and how many complaints he had and what was in his system, or will that just exists when somebody black kills somebody white?

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Well, I will say that I can think of at least one, and I think there are more instances across the country, where the officer's background actually doesn't matter. So, for example, what I'm thinking about is Tamia Rice in Cleveland. That officer's history came out I think very shortly after the shooting. And what we



1 found out is that he was found unfit by another 2 police department, but he was hired anyway by the 3 Cleveland Police Department. So I'm not -- I get your point, but I 4 5 think you may be painting with a little too wide a 6 brush. 7 MS. YHWHnewBN: Well, I appreciate that. 8 hope that that is not the case. But in the Rice 9 case, that information that came out the sometime later on down the road when people were talking 10 11 about what he was going to be charged with. 12 But this was right off the bat, you know. 13 And that's what was said. I mean, racism just has -- the sin of racism just has to raise its ugly 14 15 head, and it has to stop. 16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. 17 MS. YHWHnewBN: So I thank you. 18 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Oh, next speaker is 19 George Blakemore. 20 MR. BLAKEMORE: Good evening to the members of 21 this Board, and to the few citizens that are 22 present.

Racism is alive in the Chicago City of Chicago, in the County of Cook, and throughout the



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nation. There's a new plantation that we are on, and the police were put in the middle of what's going on.

Our people are not getting good jobs, contracts, and services. This the country was built on black labor, and that is white wealth. There's a new plantation. Every black person know that they're not free. Every black person know who run the police department. The white folks. And we're still on the plantation.

But what we can do, there is some good white folks. Donald Brown was really good, and then they had freedom riots way down south. But it's only a few of them.

On this plantation, a black people, I'm speaking to black people, we must love. We must learn to love each other. We have no allies with the Asian community, with the Hispanic community, with the white community. We're all alone, enslaved people in American. And it happened a long, long time ago. And my father was on the plantation. My great grandfather was on it, and it still exists. When will we overcome it? It may be a thousand years.



1 But my point is here, I came here, I 2 don't have many issues with the police, but I will put mine. I want Ms. Lightfoot, I want her back, 3 4 because she's a community person. And after all, she is black and she knows what I'm saying is true. 5 6 She knows. And we want our Mayor to put her back. 7 Now, who else raised that point? She's 8 qualified for the job. So we must make him put her back. Our 18 so-called black leadership, these old 9 aldermens he appoint and they sign. Well, we got 10 11 to (inaudible) and make let them make sure that she 12 stay here. And we got to fight for her to stay 13 here. I seen many of them here, Reverend 14 15 Daniel, Nancy, all on this Board, I seen black superintendents and they still need black people 16 17 here. I seen black policemen, and they still going 18 along with master chattel, because master chattel pays them on that plantation. 19 20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore --

MR. BLAKEMORE: So --

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore --

MR. BLAKEMORE: I WANT to see you appointed. I put my own relations behind today when I heard on



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the radio how articulate you are, and said if the Mayor reappoint, surely I will. But if he don't, I'm still going to be involved. I hold you to that. If he don't, you still do what you have to do for our people. I heard you say you were going to do it with his appointment or without his appointment, and may God bless you. Please. And thank you for being here.

And I will see you Ms. Fairly when she come go to down Ashland in Chicago tell her about my problems. Sometimes we have to put our issues in the back for the greater issue of our community. May God bless each one of you, and may you bless somebody else.

And every black person know he's on the plantation and these whites are in control. You know it. I don't have tell you, you got your own story. You know it.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Robert More.

MR. MORE: It is July 20, 2017. Robert J. More speaking on behalf of St. Michael the archangel, executive committee. (Inaudible) has not returned, I still have not received my long sought and



earnestly sought reprieve. And the problems that

America and the world is plagued by have not been

ameliorated at all by this new Trump

administration.

The first question I have for Chief Waller is, what is the basis of the absent of the Superintendent of the Chicago City of Chicago Police Department from this meeting?

CHIEF WALLER: He had a trip to Springfield to address the representatives down there.

MR. MORE: Thank you. Okay.

The second question is -- because I had an extensive question with regard to first responders that I was working with that he heard my prior conveyances and now I can't get that in.

But Willis Tower is still standing. I forgot to the add that in the introduction. The Willis Tower still is standing. And the last death that evidently counts as a murder as an alleged suicide would be David Russell Stuartson (phonetic) on February 17, 2011, that may or may not be connected to these issues.

The next issue is why can't the Superintendent appear via live video streaming or



some way participate? I don't understand. I'm complaining to the Board that the Superintendent is not participating, because this is very important that the public be able to control the presentation of the state of mind of the Superintendent.

Again, as I've explained numerous times, if anyone took 11 differently individuals on September 11, 2001, if we had been able to control the presentation of the content of the state of mind of just one of those people at the top of these agencies, it would be probably -- and the people who pushed the button and pulled the strings had known that, it probably never would have happened. I just can't see how it would have happen.

So I'm requesting, proposing that either the Superintendent be require to participate via some means, televideo or whatever, I'd participate via televideo, although I'm here in sackcloth and ashes. This is poor man's sackcloth and ashes.

And I do dispute -- I agree with George
Blakemore that we're all on a plantation, but I
don't agree that it's only black people that are on
the plantation. It's a lot larger. We're all on a



plantation, it's just that simple. Except for a certain tiny number of people.

But anyway, I'm seeking --

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, you're time is up.

MR. MORE: Pardon?

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: You need to wrap up your remarks.

MR. MORE: Okay. To get to the point, I'm not going to be able to get to this point about the anti-Semitism problem because he wasn't here, and that's what I'm trying to get through that.

But the last question, the last issue I have is this. Is that either that or we get to construct the stimulation, the constructive knowledge of the Superintendent of the everything that is said here. That legally we bind him, even if he doesn't show, and it's not a huge burden for me to come all the way down here and have him not here, which is like half the time. So if we can get that consideration, it's my understanding the world will become a lot less violent and insecure place and that here everyone has an enormous interest in. Thank you.
