How to Find and Apply for Funding Opportunities:

STEP 1:

Register as a vendor in iSupplier - To do business with the City of Chicago, your organization must register as a vendor in the iSupplier portal to use the City's eProcurement system and respond to bids and opportunities.

STEP 2:

View Citywide funding opportunities - All current funding opportunities and solicitations are online in the <u>City's</u> <u>eProcurement system</u>. Although you can view opportunities without signing in to your iSupplier account, you must respond to solicitations in the iSupplier portal.





Shared Cost Sidewalk Program



The Shared Cost Sidewalk Program is a popular voluntary program in which property owners share the cost of sidewalk repair with the City. Thousands of Chicagoans have been a part of this popular program, taking advantage of the low cost, exceptional value, and ease of participation.

The Shared Cost Sidewalk Program cost per square foot charged to property owners is well below what a private contractor would charge. Senior citizens and persons with disabilities may qualify for a further discounted rate.

Applications will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis. The number of participants is based on the availability of funds. The program typically reaches capacity quickly, so you are encouraged to apply early. Just so you know, if you applied for the program in previous years, you must apply again in 2024 if you wish to be considered for the 2024 program.

Applications will only be accepted through the City's 311 system by calling 311, the City's service request website https://311.chicago.gov, or the free CHI311 mobile apps on iOS Apple, and Android. The property owner's contact information and the property address are required at the time of request.

Shared Cost Sidewalk Program Program Overview

The 2024 Shared Cost Sidewalk Program will open to new applicants on January 8, 2024, from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The Shared Cost Sidewalk Program cost per square foot charged to property owners is well below what a private contractor would charge. Senior citizens and persons with disabilities may qualify to receive a 50 percent discount. Information on how to apply for this discount can be found on Page 7 of this document.

The scope of a Shared Cost Sidewalk Program project is limited to sidewalk within the public right-of-way, and may include the main walk, the sidewalk through a driveway, the existing courtesy walk (which runs perpendicular from the main sidewalk to the curb), and existing landing steps (the small strip of concrete sometimes found adjacent to the curb). Sidewalk on private property will only be included if needed for transition purposes; otherwise, it is **NOT** eligible for replacement under the Shared Cost Sidewalk Program. Owners of corner properties will be charged for sidewalk on both the main (address) side and the non-address side of the property. CDOT will continue to build ADA-compliant corner ramps where applicable, with the City paying the entire cost of the ramps.

Replacement of sidewalk is based on engineering considerations (CDOT cannot guarantee correction of existing drainage issues). In order to minimize the cost to property owners and increase the number of Shared Cost Sidewalk Program participants, only the portion of sidewalk in need of replacement as determined by CDOT is eligible for the Shared Cost Sidewalk Program pricing. The property owner does have the option to replace the entire sidewalk in front of the property. However, the entire cost to remove and replace the portion of sidewalk determined by CDOT to be in good condition will be charged to the property owner. **NO** senior or persons with disabilities discount will be applied to this work. To clarify, the City will not pay for removal and replacement of sidewalk in good condition.

For the 2024 program, applications will be taken on a **first-come**, **first-served basis**. The number of participants is based on availability of funds.

Applications will only be accepted through the City's 311 system by calling 311, through the City's service request website https://311.chicago.gov, or through the free CHI311 mobile apps on iOS Apple and Android.

- Make sure to specify that you want to participate in the Shared Cost Sidewalk Program.
- If you currently do not have a courtesy walk or landing step and would like one installed, this should be mentioned at the time of request. Installation is subject to engineering recommendation.
- If you are interested in removal and replacement of the driveway apron, this should be mentioned at the time of request.
- You must give the property owner's complete name, a contact phone number, email address if available, and the property's complete address. Please note that Shared Cost Sidewalk Program applications that are missing any of the requested information may not be processed.

Once the program budget amount is met, the program will close for the year. Applicants will be notified indicating whether they have been included into the 2024 Shared Cost Sidewalk Program. Applicants included in the program will receive a bill in the spring indicating the property owner amount due.

IHDA Mortgage Assistance Program

The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) has extended its mortgage assistance program designed to assist homeowners financially impacted by the pandemic. The Illinois Homeowner Assistance Fund (ILHAF) provides up to \$60,000 in mortgage assistance to eligible homeowners—paid directly to the servicer, taxing body, or other approved entity—while homeowners work to regain their financial footing. Whether homeowners have a mortgage, a reverse mortgage, or are mortgage-free, the program can fund past due housing payments and up to three months of prospective mortgage payments.

The program is free, and funds do not need to be repaid. Application, program information, and updates can be found at <u>illinoishousinghelp.org</u> or by calling the ILHAF hotline at 1-866-IL-HELP (866-454-3571).

Sign up to receive \$30 off your home internet bill with the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP)!

- What is ACP? The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a federal program that makes broadband internet more affordable for eligible households and families.
- How? ACP provides a \$30 monthly subsidy towards qualifying families' home internet bill.
- Who is eligible? Participants in any of the following assistance programs: SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Housing Assistance, Veterans Pension or survivor benefits, SSI, WIC. Households with gross annual incomes 200% or less than the federal poverty guidelines also qualify.
- How can I sign up? Visit getinternet.gov to learn more and apply, or contact one of the following Community Outreach partners for assistance with enrollment.

Summary

This Lead Service Line Replacement (LSLR) initiative offers to replace leaking or broken water service lines to impacted properties for FREE. Under Illinois State Law effective January 1, 2023, if your water service line is made of lead, galvanized iron, or steel, the service line must be completely replaced following a leak or a break. Thus, after a leak or break has been identified on a water service line, the City will replace the full water service line all the way into the property. Barring circumstances outside of the City's control, this replacement must be completed within 30 days of the leak or break.

What You Need to Do

If you receive this flyer following a repair to your lead water service line, contact the City to schedule the full replacement. **This construction work is FREE for you.**





Once at the website, input the address to search and the results for the service line material will populate. Results will show either: Not Lead, Lead, Galvanized Requiring Replacement or Suspected Lead.

You should know:

- The Department of Water Management (DWM) has made all reasonable efforts to ensure that the
 information on Water Service Line Inventory website is accurate according to the information available
 to us, but accuracy is not in any way guaranteed.
- Having a lead service line does not automatically mean you have elevated levels of lead in the water.
 DWM adds corrosion control to the water to help prevent lead from leaching into the water. Each house will have different test results based on factors such as water usage (which refreshes the corrosion control coating in your pipes), interior plumbing, and previous periods of vacancy. To check the levels of lead in your water, call 311 for free water testing.
- In Chicago, lead paint is by far the biggest source of lead poisoning in children. It is a good idea to check
 your house for lead paint while also checking to see if you have a lead service line.

- DWM has mailed more than 90,000 kits to Chicagoans since 2016. The certified laboratory testing results are available online for the public to review at chicagowaterquality.org.
- You can request a free lead test kit via 311 or by registering online at www.chicagowaterquality.org.
- You can also request in-person testing by a DWM Representative who will use the inhome kit for testing.

Water Quality and Consumer Confidence are top priorities at DWM.

There is no lead in the water when it leaves the water treatment plant. When lead is found in drinking water it is due to water dissolving the lead in pipes and plumbing.





MOPD HomeMod Program

The HomeMod Program provides accessibility modifications for Chicago residents with disabilities, with low income. Renters and homeowners may apply. Landlord permission is required for renters. Modifications may include ramps, porch and stairlifts, roll-in showers, widened doorways, accessible sinks, and cabinets. HomeMod works with licensed, insured, and experienced home remodeling companies. All services will be performed in accordance with federal, state, and municipal accessibility legal requirements. Qualifying individuals may re-apply for additional modifications after waiting one year from service.

What kind of **modifications** can be made?

A licensed contractor, along with MOPD staff, will conduct in-home assessments of the client's home environment to determine what accessibility features will enhance the person's independence and safety.

Typical alterations include kitchen and bathroom modifications and the addition of interior and exterior lifts and ramps. Specific modifications can include the installation of grab bars, lowering cabinets and countertops and widening doorways. Subsequent work may include, but is not limited to: plumbing, electrical, carpentry, masonry, dry walling, tiling and painting. All services will be performed in accordance with federal, state and municipal accessibility legal requirements.

Modifications are based on available funding. Site inspections are performed by licensed, insured and experienced home remodeling companies.

What are the **eligibility** requirements?

- Chicago residents with disabilities under 60 years of age.
- Must be head of household, spouse or legal dependent of the head of household
- Households with incomes below 80% of the area median income may qualify.
- Both homeowners and renters may qualify for this program.
- Payment of any outstanding property taxes.
- · If applicable, child support compliance.

Prior to beginning modifications, MOPD will perform on-site inspections for environmental issues and lead-based paint. In addition, MOPD will verify that there are no existing Building Code violation(s) for the residence undergoing modifications.

What are the benefits of participating in the **HomeMod Program**?

- Allows people with disabilities to achieve their maximum level of independence.
- Provides a safe and suitable living environment for people with disabilities and their families.
- Enhances the independence of people with disabilities. An accessible living environment provides people with disabilities a greater opportunity to fully participate in all aspects of life, such as employment, recreation and education.
- Increases the housing stock for people with disabilities—making apartments and single family homes accessible ensures that people with disabilities have appropriate and safe housing.

When to Apply

The application period for the **HomeMod Program** is open year around.



Ilinois Court-Based Rental Assistance Program

Illinois Court-Based Rental Assistance Program



The Illinois Court-Based Rental Assistance Program (CBRAP) provides funding to Illinois tenants and landlords across the state (outside of Cook County) who have pending cases in eviction court. The program is only available to litigants in eviction court. Applicants may qualify for up to \$25,000 in emergency rental payments that can include up to 15 months of past-due rent and three months of future rent payments to prevent eviction.

You may be eligible for CBRAP if:

- You are in a court eviction proceeding due to nonpayment.
- · You rent your home in Illinois (outside of Cook County).
- You have experienced financial hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Your household income is at or below 80% of the area median income, adjusted for household size. (See the income limits for your county <u>here</u>. Proof of citizenship is not required. Rental assistance is not a "public charge" benefit.

Community Safety Coordination Center Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund

The City of Chicago's Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund (ESVF) pilot provides financial assistance in set amounts to survivors and their families to alleviate the immediate financial impacts of shooting incidents. Launched in December 2022, the program eases the financial burden and trauma inflicted on those who experience loss from gun violence.

Financial assistance through the City's Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund is available until funds are depleted to:

- City of Chicago residents* who have experienced gunshot injuries in West Garfield Park, East Garfield Park, Englewood, West Englewood, or New City, on or after January 1, 2023, provided they are not detained by law enforcement.
- City of Chicago families who lost a loved one to gun violence on or after January 1, 2023, in any of the designated neighborhoods.

^{*}The program is open to anyone who lives in Chicago, regardless of immigration status.







AVAILABLE NOW:

Victims and families of victims who have experienced penetrating gunshot injuries in 5 community areas can receive funding through the City's Emergency Supplemental Victims Fund pilot program.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW: A pilot program from the City of Chicago's Community Safety Coordination Center and Chicago Department of Public Health provides financial assistance in set amounts to survivors and their families to alleviate the immediate financial impacts of shooting incidents.

AVAILABLE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE:

- Relocation Expenses (\$1,000 for temporary or permanent relocation)

SMALL BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT FUND (SBIF) Deadline Monthly Basis

The Small Business Improvement Fund (SBIF) provides grant funding for permanent building improvements and repairs across the city.

Program participants can receive grants to cover between 30 percent and 90 percent of the cost of remodeling work, with a maximum grant of \$150,000 for commercial properties and \$250,000 for industrial properties. The grant, which is administered by SomerCor on the City's behalf, does not have to be repaid.

 Small business owners are invited to attend an Open House and Reception to learn about grant opportunities available through the LaSalle Street Reimagined Corridor Small Business Improvement Fund (SBIF). The event features an Open House from 2 - 4 PM and a Reception from 4 - 6 PM on Wednesday, June 7.

Can the Small Business Improvement Fund Help Your Business?

WHO

SBIF grants are available for commercial and industrial business and property owners. Applicants must have a valid city business license, be current with property taxes, and be clear of City indebtedness. Residential projects are not eligible.



WHEN

SBIF funds are available for 30 day periods each month.

WHAT

SBIF provides grants to commercial businesses for 30%, 60% or 90% of the costs of permanent building improvements such as storefront renovation, building systems, interior remodeling, and roof replacement.

Industrial businesses with 200 or fewer employees are eligible for grants covering 50% of the project cost.

WHERE

SBIF funds are available to eligible business and property owners in TIF districts with SBIF authorization and available funds.



HOW

- 3) Review SBIF grant Eligibility Requirements and Program Rules

Who is eligible?

Chicago Resident Financial Relief Programs

Clear Path Relief (CPR) Pilot program and Fix-It Defense

The <u>Clear Path Relief (CPR) pilot program</u> provides low-income motorists with relief for vehicle-related debt, excluding expired meter tickets. Benefits of CPR include:

- Pay off the original fine amount for tickets issued in the last 3 years and all eligible older debt will be waived.
- Fifty percent (50%) reduction of new tickets issued within 365 days from down payment of debt relief payment plan.
- New unpaid tickets will not be assessed penalties until after December 31, 2023.

To qualify, an applicant must reside in a household currently enrolled in the Utility Billing Relief program or have a household income of less than, or equal to, 300% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

- Proof of income requirement: Public Aid Determination Letter (SNAP, TANF, etc.), current award letter for (Social Security Income) SSI /(Social Security Disability Income) SSDI Income, pension/annuity income, paycheck stubs covering 30 days or employer's letter on letterhead giving monthly income, unemployment benefits, child support documents, 2022 or 2023 tax returns, 2023 W-2s, VA benefits, verified enrollment in the Federal Free or Reduced Priced Lunch program, or other documents showing income.
- Proof of legal guardianship of student: Birth Certificate, adoption certificate, foster care agreement, or other document showing legal relationship to child.





Intensive Case Advocacy Services (ICAS) Caregiver Respite provides a break from caring for loved ones. A variety of options include in home care - home care aides, hiring of a personal friend or family, and residential care in a facility. Support is available for up to two weeks annually.

People who care for their aging family or loved ones (caregivers) can receive supportive services such as one-on-one or family counseling, support groups, food boxes, information and referrals, help purchase of goods or services, and education opportunities. A range of ages qualify – please call for information.

The Savvy Caregiver™ Training Program is a 12-hour education program for family caregivers taking care of those with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders. Each free weekly session is 2-hours over six weeks. A Caregiver Manual is provided. Training opportunities are available throughout the year.

Short-Term Chore service provides assistance with light housekeeping, laundry, shopping or other household support due to a life change, illness, disability, or temporary situation. Heavy-Duty Chore is an intensive cleaning for those whose living conditions pose a threat to their health and safety. Services include trash removal, moving heavy furniture, help with clutter, packing and more.

Grandparents or older relatives aged 55+ who have primary responsibility for a child under 18 or loved one with severe disabilities aged 19-59 are eligible for services including one-on-one or family counseling, support groups, information and referrals, education opportunities, and help purchasing goods or services such as clothes, school supplies, toys, and more.

Elder Rights, Legal Services, Protection, & Advocacy

Certified APS workers respond to reports of alleged abuse of Chicagoans aged 60+ and those with disabilities aged 18-59. Concerns including physical, emotional, and sexual abuse, self-neglect, neglect, confinement, and / or financial exploitation. APS stops the abuse and develops a plan for safety, well-being, and prevention.

CAS provides a Well-Being Check to Chicagoans aged 55+ living in the community who may be experiencing challenges living independently or are at-risk to themselves or others. The Team meets with the older adult, assesses their situation, then provides helpful referrals to services and links to community supports.

ICAS provides ongoing support to Chicagoans aged 55+ who are experiencing challenges living independently in the community by helping clients to access supports that prolong the ability to remain living at home. ICAS can also help those who are moving, experiencing transitions, health challenges, and more.

Legal Services

Legal Services protects the rights of older Chicagoans on matters such as: housing, guardianship, Powers of Attorney for health care and property, bankruptcy, fraud, employment, family law, financial and foreclosure counseling, reverse mortgages, and Advance Directives.

Ombudsman Program

Ombudsmen protect, defend and advocate for residents in long-term care facilities such as nursing homes, assisted living, and more.

Ombudsmen protect resident rights, resolve complaints, provide information, and ensure quality care for Chicago's long-term care residents over aged 19.

Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP)

SHIP helps Medicare beneficiaries access Medicare, drug plans, and more. SHIP Counselors host educational programs and one-on-one counseling to help older adults and people with disabilities by providing objective information about health insurance to those who have questions about Medicare.

Senior Medicare Patrol

The Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Program educates consumers about Medicare & Medicaid fraud, waste, and abuse. Program staff and volunteers help Chicagoans to prevent, detect, and report Medicare and Medicaid abuse.

Home Delivered Meals

Nutritious meals in a group setting are provided each weekday to nearly 50 community locations throughout Chicago. These meals promote better health through improved nutrition and reduced social isolation. Culturally specific meals are available.

Microwave-ready frozen or hot meals delivered to home-bound older adults 60 years of age or older who are unable to prepare meals for themselves and have no other means of acquiring nutritious and / or dietary-specific meals.

Brain Health Initiative

Community Programs

Foster Grandparents This free virtual and call-in training program is available to all Chicagoans and is targeted to residents living in apartment buildings. The programs focuses on behaviors to maintain healthy brains throughout life.

Senior Companion Program An opportunity for seniors to make a difference in a child's life. This program recognizes senior volunteers as a presence in the community. Volunteers make a difference in the lives of children and youth by mentoring and tutoring in communities across the city. This program includes travel, meal reimbursements, and a monthly stipend.

Chicago Fitness Plus Seniors make a difference in the lives of lonely, isolated older adults by reading, visiting and chatting, preparing light meals and more. This program recognizes senior volunteers as a presence in the community and includes travel, meal reimbursements, and a monthly stipend.

QUALIFICATIONS:

Age Requirements:

- · 65 years of age or older before January 1 of the current year; or
- · You must become 65 years of age this year; or
- · You must be 16 years of age or older before January 1 of the current year and qualify as disabled.

Residency Requirements:

· You must live in Illinois at the time you file your application.

Income Requirements:

Income limits are new for January 1, 2020 for License Plate discount and Ride Free Transit Card.
