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1 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening, 2 everyone. We're going to get started. Good My name is Lori Lightfoot. I am 3 evening. president of the Chicago Police Board. 4 I am 5 calling the meeting to order. Vice president Foreman and board member Eaddy are unable to 6 7 attend in person and both wish to attend via audio conference. 8 Is there a motion to permit 9 them to do so? 10 MR. SIMPSON: So moved. 11 MS. FRY: Second. 12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor? 13 (Unanimous ayes.) 14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? The 15 motion passes. 16 The first item of business is approval of 17 the minutes of the Board's regular public 18 meeting held on December 8th, 2016. Is there a motion to approve the minutes? 19 20 MS. FRY: So moved. 21 MR. SIMPSON: Second. 22 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? 23 (Unanimous ayes.) 24 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? The

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1	motion passes. Our next regular public meeting
2	will be held on Thursday, February 16th at
3	7:30 p.m. here at Chicago Public Safety
4	Headquarters.
5	At this time I ask for a motion to close a
6	series of executive sessions for the purposes
7	of considering personnel matters and litigation
8	as authorized by Sections 2(c)(1),(3),(4), and
9	(11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. Is
10	there such a motion?
11	MR. SIMPSON: So moved.
12	MS. DELGADO: Second.
13	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?
14	(Unanimous ayes.)
15	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? The
16	motion passes. The schedule of the Board's
17	regular monthly meetings for 2017 has been made
18	available at tonight's meeting and is posted on
19	the Board's website.
20	A report of the disciplinary actions taken
21	by the Board in the previous month has been
22	made available at this evening's meeting. This
23	report and the Board's written findings and
24	decisions are posted on the Board's website.

The Police Board, as authorized by the Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed meeting some of the disciplinary cases. The Board will now take final action on the cases. Regarding cases No. 10 PB 2726 and 2727, in 2011 the Police Board found Officers Brian Murphy and Jason Orsa guilty of engaging in unjustified altercation while off-duty and discharged them from the Chicago Police Department. The respondents appealed and the Circuit Court reversed the Board's decision.

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In August 2016, the Illinois Appellate Court reversed the Circuit Court and affirmed the Board's original decision. The Supreme Court of Illinois recently denied the petition for leave to appeal. Thereafter, Brian Murphy and Jason Orsa have since resigned from the Chicago Police Department.

19 Is there a motion to terminate the
20 proceedings against Brian Murphy and Jason Orsa
21 because they have resigned.

MS. SWEENEY: So moved.
MS. DELGADO: Second.
PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? May I

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1	have a show of hands? Looks like it's
2	unanimous and Reverend Eaddy and Ghian Foreman,
3	are you voting in favor?
4	REVERAND EADDY: Yes.
5	MR. FOREMAN: Yes.
6	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor and no
7	opposed, voting in favor are Board Members
8	Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, Fry, Simpson
9	Sweeney and myself. Motion passes by a
10	unanimous vote.
11	Board Member Fry, I am passing it to you.
12	MS. FRY: Pursuant to Section 2-57-060(c)
13	of the Municipal Code of Chicago a panel of
14	three members of the Police Board as authorized
15	by the Open Meetings Act has considered in a
16	closed meeting one matter on which the Chief
17	Administrator of the Independent Police Review
18	Authority and the Superintendent of police did
19	not agree regarding the discipline of a
20	sergeant. The members of the panel, Board
21	Members Eaddy, Simpson and myself will now take
22	action to resolve the issue regarding the
23	recommendations for discipline. Case No. 16 RP
24	08 involves an allegation that Sergeant Sean

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Tully failed to follow the department policy when he failed to bring an arrestee for medical and/or mental health treatment. The Chief Administrator recommended sustaining the allegation and suspending the sergeant for 120 days. The Superintendent concurred with the sustained finding but recommended a 28-day suspension.

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9 Is there a motion to find that the 10 Superintendent's response does not meet the 11 burden of overcoming the Chief Administrator's 12 recommendation for discipline?

13 MR. SIMPSON: So moved. 14 **REVERAND EADDY:** Second. 15 All in favor? MS. FRY: 16 (Unanimous ayes.) 17 MS. FRY: The motion passed by unanimous 18 vote.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Of the panel.

20 MS. FRY: Of the panel. Eaddy, Fry and 21 Simpson.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All right. The next
item on the agenda is consideration of
revisions to Article VI of the Police Board's

Rules of Procedure. Notice of the Board's plan 1 to consider these revisions, and a draft of the 2 3 revisions, were posted on the Board's website 4 January 3, 2017. These revisions were 5 necessitated by the recent passage of the 6 ordinance establishing the Civilian Office of Police Accountability, among other issues. 7 8 Article VI of the Police Board's Rule of Procedure sets forth a procedure for resolving 9 10 disagreements between the Chief Administrator 11 and Superintendent of police regarding the recommended discipline for Police Board 12 13 members -- I am sorry, Police Department 14 members. The ordinance establishing the 15 Independent Police Review Authority required 16 review of the matters by a panel of three 17 Police Board members. The COPA ordinance 18 changes this process by requiring review of 19 these matter by one Police Board member. 20 Is there a motion to amend Article VI of 21 the Board's Rules of Procedure as set forth in

the Board's Rules of Procedure as set forth in a draft of the revisions posted on the Board's website and made available at this evening's meeting?

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1 So moved. MS. FRY: 2 MR. SIMPSON: Second. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? 3 4 (Unanimous aves.) 5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? With 6 the Board's approval of these revisions to Rules of Procedure, the provisions of 7 subsection 2-78-130(a)(iii) of the COPA 8 9 ordinance pertaining solely to reviews of 10 disciplinary-related recommendation by one member of the Police Board shall be 11 12 implemented. This action does not affect the 13 implementation of any other provision of 14 subsection 2-78-130(a)(iii) or any other 15 section of the COPA ordinance. 16 The general orders and other directives 17 issued by the Superintendent of Police during 18 the previous month are listed in the blue books 19 made available at this evening's meeting and 20 are also posted on Police Department's website. 21

The next item is the Superintendent's report to the Board. Mr. Superintendent, will you be providing on oral or waive?

SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Waive.

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1	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Is there a motion to
2	waive the oral presentation and receive the
3	monthly report in writing?
4	MR. SIMPSON: So moved.
5	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Second?
6	MS. FRY: Second.
7	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?
8	(Unanimous ayes.)
9	REVERAND EADDY: Aye.
10	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: The motion passes.
11	I will now call upon the members of the public
12	who signed up in advance to speak. When your
13	name is called, please step up to the
14	microphone and we ask you limit your comments
15	to two minutes. In addition, please take into
16	consideration people coming before you and that
17	we would like to make sure that we have
18	everybody who is signed up, have the ability to
19	speak. We'll start with Melvin Bailey.
20	MR. BAILEY: Good evening. Thank you guys
21	for taking the time to hear me speak. I'd like
22	to actually thank the Superintendent and the
23	rest of you guys for actually doing a good job
24	of trying to go handle around this violence in

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our community because it's really out of hand. 1 My job as executive director of a community 2 3 project is to build relationships with private and public businesses in our community. 4 This is particularly for the Superintendent, we have 5 an issue in our community. My job is to really 6 go to liquor stores in our community and find 7 8 out why so much liquor is being sold in our neighborhood, and it's a mind-altering drug 9 10 that we think that alcohol is part of the 11 problem towards violence. But in particular I want to talk about a liquor store that has been 12 helping me create jobs, Super Nick's, 4115 West 13 Unfortunately, well, the 10th 14 Roosevelt. 15 District commander is trying to shut it down. And I am here to talk to the Superintendent to 16 17 see can we keep it open. Because the reason, 18 any other time I am advocating to shut liquor stores down, but this liquor store I asked him 19 20 to help. I said you guys sell a lot of liquor 21 in our community. I said what you gonna do? 22 They said, what you want us to do? So I came up with the idea, let's take some of these 23 24 vacant and abandoned buildings and buy them

from to the City of Chicago, but when we go 1 2 into the Building Department and go into the 11th floor at the Daley Center, I took the son 3 4 of the liquor store with me and we took a couple of buildings off the demo list in that 5 area, rehabbed them, hired them guys right in 6 7 that neighborhood. We took like four 8 properties from the City of Chicago that was slated for demolition. We worked closely with 9 10 the Building Department. We worked very 11 closely with Corporation Counsel to make sure 12 that these buildings can continue, not to be 13 torn down, we can create jobs, particularly with the young men that we feel in the 14 community that had no vision and was lost in 15 16 our neighborhood.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Bailey, can you wrap

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MR. BAILEY: Yes. And I am the first one to advocate closing down, shutting down, but this particular store, liquor store I want to at least talk to you privately and see how we could keep it open to keep creating jobs.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.

1	Next speaker, Mauri Bey.
2	MS. BEY: Good evening. I understand that
3	you guys are on a timeframe, but what is
4	important needs to be said, so I'll be as quick
5	as I possibly can.
6	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Can you get closer
7	to the microphone?
8	MS. BEY: I was ensuring that everyone
9	present got a copy of this proclamation that
10	Rahm Emanuel, the CEO of this corporation
11	called Chicago, put out on December the 22nd,
12	2011 stating that the Moorish Americans are the
13	aboriginals. You guys could take a look at
14	that. The situation that we have here at
15	Chicago, this corporation, is that the
16	indigenous of the land are constantly, okay,
17	constantly being disrespected and dehumanized
18	and enough is enough. Okay. We're here from
19	the Moorish Holey Temple of Science on 64th
20	Street, where I am the Grand Shekinas. We are
21	teaching our people the truth about their
22	nationality and birth rights. I am not a
23	corporate citizen. I am a human being, and I
24	won't be treated like I am chattel property,

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1 because I am not. I'll leave this for you so 2 that all of you can have a copy of it, you can see it and make sure that every single policy 3 enforcer, because they're not enforcing the 4 law, first, fourth, fifth, eighth Amendment 5 rights are being abridged daily and enough is 6 7 I have the right to travel. I don't enough. 8 drive, because I am not a chauffeur. I don't 9 have a cab. I don't have a bus. I don't have 10 I have a right to travel from point A a truck. 11 to point B without being abridged. Okav? 12 Enough is enough. My young men are not going to be snatched out of their conveyances because 13 14 someone thinks that they're up to no good. Probable cause, that's the constitution. Okay? 15 16 Enough is enough. 17 So you guys have this. This is 319 U.S. 18 105, Supreme Court. You talk about Supreme Court of Illinois, Supreme Court, the 19 20 constitution is the supreme law of the land. 21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Wrap it up.

MS. BEY: The Supreme Court rules in Murdoch versus Pennsylvania that no state shall convert a liberty into a privilege and attach a

fee to it. I have the liberty to travel. 1 Т 2 have the liberty to travel, and it doesn't need 3 to be licensed, and there is no fee for it. 4 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Can you wrap it up? 5 I certainly can. It's important MS. BEY: 6 we know the Prophet Noble Drew Ali was here at 7 Macka Morocco, corporately known as Chicago, 8 Illinois. We are the indigenous of the land. 9 I am part and parcel to the land. This is my 10 ancestral estate. I won't be shoved around any 11 longer. You guys can hold on to this, hold on 12 to this and let everybody know right here, this 13 is registered with Cook County. Okay. тһе 14 prophets put it in. 15 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am. 16 Indeed. Please uphold the MS. BEY: 17 constitution. That's all we ask, because the 18 law is the law, not policy but law. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am. 19 20 MS. BEY: We'll be here February 16th. 21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I look forward to 22 seeing you. Next speaker is Pamela Hunt. 23 Good evening. First I first MS. HUNT: 24 want to address the issue of the DOJ report.

It's scathing, it's depressing and it shows exactly the depth of the racism and the misconduct. So on record I want to say that Rahm Emanuel covered up the murder of Laguan McDonald and he should resign. I am going to say it each and every time until we get it I am saying that Rahm is racism, and I right. make that statement. I understand the definition of racism. I understand the scholarship behind the definition, and here's 11 what I base it on; if Laguan McDonald was a Jewish youth, does anyone in this room believe that he would have covered up the murder, paid 14 the family off to be silent, convince 50 15 councilmen to be co-conspirators?

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So if you think if Laquan McDonald was Jewish and Rahm Emanuel would have acted in the same manner, then we're going to have a discrepancy there.

20 Superintendent Johnson, I am simply asking 21 this: what are you doing in your policies, your hiring practices to prevent racism? I know the 23 mantra and what is put out in the media is that 24 the problem is training, but it is racism. And

we said time and time again on the north side, the officers know what to do. In the loop, they know what to do. As a matter of fact, black residents living on the north side, they get harassed by the officers more than the white residents. So I just really want you to be clear about this and focus on it and then get the problem straight. To you officers, you shouldn't be offended if we said it's racism. because we're living it. We know what it is. 11 I want to make sure that officers, they have a right to get home to their families safely, we're not disputing that. We don't want to be 14 at odds or in conflict with officers.

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PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, can you wrap it up?

17 MS. HUNT: Sure. So the DOJ report is 18 scathing and I hope real change is going to 13,000 officers are going to be hired. 19 come. 20 Obviously, you need some serious adjustments in 21 the training before that is done. I am going 22 to leave this paper for you, President, and 23 Superintendent Johnson. Please take the time 24 to read it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: If you leave it with the court reporter, I will take it. Thank you. Is Ms. Dorothy Holmes here? Good evening,

Ms. Holmes.

Sharon Fairley, that MS. HOLMES: statement you all came up with not charging Hernandez for the murder of my son was bogus for the simple fact Cooper, which was the detective, police, whatever you want to call himself, he attacked my son that night of the he was killed. I also have a copy of that report, too. When he grabbed him by the back of his head and tried to choke him out, threw him to the ground and my son jerked away and ran, charges should have brought against him, When he ran to that gate, he didn't have too. a gun in his hand, because if he would have had a gun in his hand, do you think Cooper would have let him get free of his partner? I read that report. He said he took his gun and put it back in his holster when he assaulted my So if my son had a gun on him between son. Cooper and his partner, one of them should have killed him, not Hernandez. How you going to

jump out of a car two seconds and open fire on somebody with their back turned? If that is the case, you should have turned around and boxed him, he would have whooped his ass, I have money on that. If I would have been there when that bogus stuff went down, they would have killed both of us. That's how I feel. T† ain't over with vet. I am glad DOJ feel how I feel about this corrupt city.

Ya'll sitting up there, where is that coward Rahm Emanuel at? Carol Fox should be sitting up there, too, listening to what is going on here.

Eddie Johnson, you talk about putting all new cops on the street? What about the other ones that that is bad and corrupt? You going to take a whole new school of cops to be bad cops? That's not going to work. We're not going to trust them either. Ya'll got a lot of work to do before ya'll gain our trust. We got 21 perverts working on the force. Trigger happy cops working on the force, and we tired of being harassed by them.

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PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Ms. Holmes, you need

to wrap it up.

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MS. HOLMES: Okay. Give me one second. You need to do something with these cops, because they is corrupt. Don't ask, don't tell, but when a crime gets committed, they want us to tell. Why should we tell? They get paid for it. Do your own work, because we not telling ya'll nothing. We fighting for justice. We going to get it or we going to turn the city out.

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker, Raysurnett Morris. Good evening, Ms. Morris.

MS. MORRIS: My name is Raysurnett Morris, former Chicago police officer. I worked for the department as a police officer from 1995 until 2011 when they discharged me after the case was thrown out of domestic court. I was dating Ronald Pope. He made allegations I stalked him after I found out he was not only dating me but several other females on the job, and I did not want to be a part of that.

22 When it went to court, the judge threw it 23 out. When it went to the Board, the Board 24 found no proof that any evidence was against

1 me, but they turned around and hit me with a 2 rule violation. I never had any disciplinary I been working for the City of Chicago 3 action. 4 since 1983. I never had a ticket, okay? They 5 took my job. This has financially ruined me. 6 It has caused me stress. It has caused my 7 family stress. I lost my mother in between the 8 I was not able to help bury her. I time. think this is ridiculous. I am suffering. 9 Ι 10 am about to go into foreclosure. I don't have 11 water in my house. I was a public servant. I 12 never did anything wrong in my life, and I am paying for this and my family, and I asked for 13 14 this Board because the board that you had 15 before when I brought it to them, they said they couldn't do anything about it. They 16 wanted me to take it to the Appellate Court. 17 18 How do you take it to the Appellate Court when they cut off your funds? 19 20 when I talked to FOP, they told me I was 21 railroaded, and I believe I was railroaded. 22 because Ronald Pope's son died and they gave

him extra justice and took my career away from me. It's ridiculous. I am suffering. I am 57

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years old next month, and it's hard for me to 1 2 find employment. He has been promoted since. I don't understand, and I lost my job because 3 4 of what he was doing. He was the one on the 5 job messing with all the women, and it's a common practice and everybody knows it. I 6 7 mean, it's ridiculous. I have never been so 8 unjustly, you know, treated. Then now that I 9 lost my job, I can't go get a job. I ao to 10 fill out applications. I don't hear anything. 11 I asked the Corporate Counsel to look into it. 12 when I called them a couple of weeks ago they told me they haven't made a decision. They 13 haven't even looked into it. He had witnesses 14 15 coming here I have never even met, okay, never 16 had any contact with. They couldn't even 17 describe my car, only thing they said was light 18 colored vehicle drove past the residence. 19 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Ms. Morris --20 I never even met the women. MS. MORRIS: 21 I lost my career. I was working three jobs to 22 take care of me and my family and 23 grandchildren, and I have no husband. Now I am suffering like someone that never ever had a 24

1	job, and I worked 44 years of my life. I am
2	asking for you all to look into this matter and
3	you will see where the lies were made at this,
4	and I also want to see Rahm Emmanuel, and I
5	would like to speak to the Superintendent of
6	the police department, because this is
7	ridiculous. What am I supposed to do?
8	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Ms. Morris, can I
9	ask you a question?
10	MS. BEY: Yes.
11	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: You mentioned that
12	you had communications with the City's
13	Corporation Counsel, is that right?
14	MS. MORRIS: Yes, Mr. Caproni.
15	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: No, that's our
16	executive director.
17	MS. MORRIS: Okay.
18	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Did you talk to
19	somebody in the law department?
20	MS. MORRIS: Where?
21	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: The city law
22	department, the lawyers that represent the city
23	in these actions?
24	MS. MORRIS: No, and another thing with

that, they were trying -- at the hearing, they 1 2 were trying to turn my witnesses against me. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Okay. Ma'am, what I 3 will do is I will personally look into your 4 5 situation. 6 MS. MORRIS: I hope you do. This has 7 really put a burden on me and my family. 8 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: What I'll ask you to 9 do is Mr. Caproni is sitting right over there to your right in the first row. I want you to 10 provide him with your contact information and 11 12 we will be in touch with you. 13 MS. MORRIS: Thank you. 14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sure. Our next 15 speaker is EvAngel -- I don't see her here. 16 I'll spell the last name for the record. 17 Y-H-W-H-N-E-W-B-N. I don't see her here. 18 Our next speaker is Mr. Blakemore. 19 MR. BLAKEMORE: Good afternoon to the 20 citizens of our great city. 21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good afternoon, 22 Mr. Blakemore. 23 Global world class city, MR. BLAKEMORE: 24 and to the residents of our world class city.

I had an experience that happened at Rush and 1 2 Superior. On January the 7th I was out in front with some of my artwork and some other 3 goods that I have hoping that somebody will 4 like it. They were Chinese umbrellas, and they 5 said, Mr. Blakemore, you selling anything? I 6 7 said no, I am out here. Somebody want to give 8 me a donation? The key is not if I had a peddler's license, they -- if I did or didn't, 9 that would be decided in an administrative 10 11 hearing. It is a non-jailable offense. It goes to administrative hearing, like a red 12 13 light camera. Somebody speed, they get a ticket. They don't get put in jail, taken 14 15 their car, they took my merchandise, left my racks out there, carry me to the 18th District, 16 fingerprinted me, kept me in that cell for 17 18 three hours. When I got out, they said, 19 Mr. Blakemore. would you sign this for us? I 20 said sign what? I won't sign anything. I said 21 this is a non-jailable offense. She said, I'll 22 sign it for you. I said, I am not going 23 signing anywhere. She said, "Get the F out of 24 here. Get the F out of here." I was appalled.

1 They had five black women there. They said, 2 Mr. Blakemore we see you on TV, I am so sorry that is happening to you. Those black women 3 cannot speak on my behalf, because they're on 4 the same plantation that I am on. They knew 5 that I wasn't supposed to be locked up for a 6 non-jailable offense. I was shot 16 times. 7 8 where are the bullets? The bullets are in my mind. When they say I know -- don't teach a 9 10 black person how to read. I read it and they 11 gave me a state charge. I say this is a city 12 violation, so they -- to me, do you have any 13 license? Did you ask these illegals do they have a legal status in there? You tell your 14 15 police don't question --

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PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore...

MR. BLAKEMORE: Mr. Blakemore is going to Ms. Lightfoot. I am going to bring down my inventory not yet approved, gave me a two-month date, and said that those charges have to sign. My question to you is somebody explain when they have a sergeant in the station, another policeman is not supposed to sign where -- when it is written down they want a sergeant to

approve, or maybe you don't have another 1 2 sergeant but one was there. Ask me some questions about this, because it is happening 3 to somebody else that is being arrested on a 4 5 code violation. 6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore, why 7 don't you come up and we can talk afterwards 8 and work together. Have I been articulate 9 MR. BLAKEMORE: enough? You do know some guasi criminals, you 10 can either arrest -- to let you know -- what is 11 12 your name, again? 13 MS. FAIRLEY: Sharon Fairley. 14 Yes. You know I came to MR. BLAKEMORE: 15 your office on Ashland and Chicago. MS. FAIRLEY: Did you file a complaint? 16 17 MR. BLAKEMORE: I came and when I filed a 18 complaint, I came and I asked for my complaint. 19 They say we can't give you your complaint when 20 I called in on the phone, that complaint 21 I want to read what that intake belonas to me. 22 person had, put that implement when the people 23 call in that, their complaint, you take that 24 complaint, then you give that complaint back to

1 the citizen and let the citizen see it if they 2 want to amend it or if they want to approve it. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore... 3 4 MR. BLAKEMORE: The office said --5 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Let me recommend this. 6 7 MR. BLAKEMORE: Your office said they 8 couldn't give me my complaint. 9 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore. Mr. Blakemore --10 11 MR. BLAKEMORE: I need my merchandise 12 back. It's not -- selling without a license, 13 that is not a criminal act. That is a ticket. 14 Thank you. May God bless all of you and 15 Ms. Lightfoot you are doing a beautiful job here. You are doing the best job you can on 16 17 the same plantation. Mr. Johnson, you are 18 doing a beautiful job. We all know where we 19 are and who we are. We all know these white 20 folks run America. We know racism exists in 21 May God bless each one of you and in America. 22 return may you bless somebody else. And I 23 would like that matter to be cleared up. Thank 24 you. Thank you.

If you stay. Ms. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Fairley will take care of your complaints.

Our next and final speaker is Mr. Robert More.

It is the 19th day before MR. MORE: inauguration here. My time is getting started Okay. First of all. I complain because here. there is an equal protection issue. Every time I raise the issue identifying simply ask the question to identify the causes of various facts, John F. Kennedy assassination, Martin Luther King assassination, Robert F. Kenney assassination, Forest Gall Patent, everybody since going back to Andrew Jackson in this way except the one that tried to shoot Ford, every time I raise the issue of why do steel buildings collapse, it's never happened before in history. They burnt a building for 32 hours. There's no kerosene fire that hit 500 degrees enough to cause a building to come Every question I ask is antisemitism. down. That's a federal felony. I complain. Excuse me, Superintendent Johnson, what is the basis? 24 I am going to produce to you, how do I deliver

1 to you and to the president a reverse marshal 2 law tract, simply get the laws, all state laws 3 declared unconstitutional supplied to Robert J. 4 More and tell the protection and the purchasing power of the currency and four or five other 5 6 conditions are met, and I'll never have to be 7 back here again. The answer to all this is 8 Magna Carta Clause 61. It's predatory. That 9 is the way to fix this. That's the only way to 10 fix this. Other than we get caught in a 11 bureaucratic maze, such a low accountability to passing the buck plausible liability. This is 12 13 going on now, now no one can claim -- now it's 14 a different administration. We need 15 investigations of those or we need citizen investigations and citizen prosecutions. 16 I am 17 down to 30 seconds, I set this, because I got 18 so many things to cover. I agree with this 19 voung lady 100 percent about what she said and 20 the other woman, Shapiro versus Thompson and 21 Murdoch versus Pennsylvania on terms of the 22 right to travel. The Constitution protects 23 being able to travel, but getting to the point, 24 one of the basis of those explanations, and I

am still holding up the antisemitism because it's impossible, facts are facts. Ben Freidman grew up in his household. He heard all about the things that this young lady is referring to at least tangentially, okay? And all the people --

9 Ben Freidman. facts are facts. MR. MORE: Ben Freidman warns America, a fact is not 10 11 antisemitic or anti anything else. We are 12 trying to identify the cause and effects, 13 otherwise we can't correct the problem and prevent revocation problems. How do I get this 14 15 reverse marshal law to you, Ms. Sergeant At Arms, so I can get this to you and I got it 16 17 locked in the superintendent's state of mind. 18 If somebody came up here before September 11th and been doing this to any member of the 19 20 president's administration, CIA, the FBI --

PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up. At this time all those persons that signed up in advance to speak have been recognized. Is there a motion to adjourn?
