Mayor Rahm Emanuel: Reform and Invest


Mayor Emanuel's strategy to **"reform and invest"** has put the City of Chicago on much stronger ground financially, produced tremendous savings through reforms and expanded the services that matter most – especially to our children. Under Mayor Emanuel's leadership, the city more than tripled our investments in youth while reducing our structural deficit by 85 percent and stabilizing pensions.

Since 2011, under Mayor Emanuel's leadership, the City is budgeting \$33 million less for healthcare and \$55 million more on youth.











Reforming the City's Financial & Budgetary Practices

- ► Chicago has achieved over \$556 million in budget savings since 2011.
- We have ended the practice of selling City assets to pay Chicago's bills.
- After 20+ years of "scoop and toss," essentially using a credit card to pay your mortgage, the City has eliminated this financial practice.
- All taxpayer-backed variable rate debt has been converted to fixed rate, reducing taxpayer risk.







Mayor Emanuel has presented a balanced budget each year since 2011.

The City no longer raids its reserves; instead, it funds the reserves each year.



As the City finances have improved, the economy is also stronger. The unemployment rate has dropped from 11% in 2011 to 4.6% in 2018. Today, the city has 145,200 more jobs and **44,000** fewer children are living in poverty. And the City is making sure that these children have more access to more programs than ever before.





City Investments in Youth: Pre-K Access

We've invested **\$76.4 million** since **2013** in Ready to Learn investments that support early childhood learning and CPS is on its way to offer every 4-year-old in the city free full-day pre-K by 2021.
