
Please note that numbers reported in this section are based on data provided by the Chicago Police Department (CPD) and includes misdemeanor and felony incidents. This data only reflects incidents that took place in Chicago Police District 19.

a) Overall

In March 2024, CPD received 1,145 criminal incident reports from Chicago Police District 19 and 88 incidents resulted in at least one offender being arrested. The overall arrest rate is 8%. In total, 100 offenders were arrested.

Key Updates - March 2024 Felony Reviews & Prosecutions

1. Adult Felony Review & Prosecution a) Overall In March 2024, the CCSAO reviewed and made a charging decision for 28 adult felony cases in Chicago Police District 19, 21 cases were approved resulting in a 75% approval rate. Overall, the CCSAO prosecuted 19 cases, and 16 of those cases were filed by the CCSAO, not directly filed by law enforcement. Of these CCSAO-filed adult felony cases, 14 were convicted, an 88% conviction rate. The overall cases, including law enforcement direct file cases, where the CCSAO is not making charging decisions, 15 were convicted, a 79% conviction rate. Key Updates - CPD Workforce Allocation Study

Update via Ald. Matt Martin (47):

- CPD is nearing an agreement with Third Party organization to conduct Workforce Allocation (WFA) Study
 - On track to meet ordinance deadline: within first 90-days of ordinance passing (mid-to-late May 2024)
- Private funding has been secured to conduct WFA study and working with CPD and City to define the scope of the study
- We're continuing to advocate our community's voice to be included in what the final Workforce Allocation Study will accomplish

Key Updates - CCPSA Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee selected 15 nominees to send to Mayor Johnson on March 8, 2024.

Under City ordinance, the Mayor was due to present his appointments on April 7, 2024.

As of today, the Mayor has not named appointments.

Once appointments are named, they will be submitted to the City Council Committee on Police and Fire, and then to the full City Council, for Confirmation.

TRAFFIC STOPS OVERVIEW

WHAT IS A TRAFFIC STOP?

Any vehicle stops by a Chicago Police Department officer for an alleged violation of the traffic code.

- Moving violations (improper turn; failure to completely stop at a stop sign)
- Equipment violations (broken headlight or taillight; cracked windshield)
- Licensing & Registration violations (expired registration tags)

WHAT IS A PRETEXTUAL TRAFFIC STOP?

When an officer uses any violation of the traffic code as an excuse to pull someone over, when their real motivation is to investigate for signs of criminal activity that they do not have reasonable suspicion of.

WHAT IS NOT A TRAFFIC STOP?

Stops where police have suspicion a person has committed robbery, carjacking, or another non-traffic criminal offense.



TRAFFIC STOPS DATA CHICAGO CITYWIDE



KEY FINDINGS

- CPD traffic stops have dramatically increased.
- CPD isn't making traffic stops to make roadways safer; rather, most stops are made for minor offenses.
- Traffic stops are an ineffective tool for crime investigation and detection.
- Traffic stops are racially disparate and especially harmful to Black and Latine drivers.




CPD TRAFFIC STOP NUMBERS






TYPE OF TRAFFIC STOP


Selection of 2023 Traffic Stop Offenses






CITATIONS

In 2023, only **3.7%** of traffic stops resulted in a citation.






WHY STOPS HAVE INCREASED

In 2023, only **2.2%** of traffic stops resulted in any arrest.






CONTRABAND

Less than 1% of traffic stops in 2023 resulted in the recovery of illegal contraband such as drugs, alcohol, or weapons.

GUNS RECOVERED FROM TRAFFIC STOPS



Citywide from 2015 – 2021:


- Black drivers were <u>6x</u>

RACIAL DISPARITIES IN LOCATION


CPD 2023 Traffic Stops, by Police District



SUPERINTENDENT SNELLING Q4 2023



SNELLING'S FIRST QUARTER SHOWED MORE OF THE SAME (Q4 2023)



Numbers: Q4 saw 118,811 traffic stops. Lower, but still too high.



Minor stops: Focus on licensing/registration increased to 48.7% of stops.



Racial disparities: Disparities continued—81% of stopped drivers were Black or Latine.



West Side concentration: CPD made 22% of traffic stops in Districts 11 and 10.



Criminal activity detection rates:


- Citations 4.2%

DISTRICT 19 STOP NUMBERS



DISTRICT 19 STOPS BY RACE


2023 Stops vs. Population by Race

Asian drivers 1.85x as likely to be stopped





TRAFFIC STOP REFORMS AROUND THE NATION





3-PRONG PLATFORM TO REDUCE RACIALLY DISPARATE PRETEXTUAL STOPS

1. Limit Low-Level Stops

- No stops for a set of low-level traffic violations that have little to no impact on roadway safety, like having one broken headlight or taillight when the other is still lit, failure to have a license plate light, or recently expired registration
- Examples: Virginia, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Oregon, San Francisco Police Department



3-PRONG PLATFORM TO REDUCE RACIALLY DISPARATE PRETEXTUAL STOPS

2. Eliminate Pretextual Stops

- No stops for a traffic code violation when their primary intention is to conduct a suspicion-less investigation for unrelated criminal violations for which they lack reasonable suspicion
- Examples: Los Angeles Police Department



3-PRONG PLATFORM TO REDUCE RACIALLY DISPARATE PRETEXTUAL STOPS

3. End Suspicionless Consent Searches During Traffic Stops

- Require law enforcement to have an independent legal basis to search before asking consent to search a person, their vehicle, or their belongings during a stop for a traffic code violation
- Examples: Connecticut, Rhode Island, San Francisco Police Department



PROJECTED OUTCOMES

Fewer harmful interactions between civilians and police and reduction in racial disparities

Increased trust between police and impacted communities

Reduced entry into the criminal legal system and financial burden

Reduction in Pretextual Traffic Stops

Reduced police workload

Traffic enforcement focused on roadway safety

More police resources for 911 response, criminal investigation, and community policing
