Key Updates - Migrant Situation

- All migrants have been cleared from all police stations,
 including District 19, and placed in local shelters or churches.
- Texas is not cooperating with city landing zone creating an even more organizational challenges
- Mutual aid team is reimaging what their work will look like now that there are no people staying at the 19th Station.
 - Making welcoming kits to hand out at the landing zone
 - Interested in helping with housing since that is a major hurdle for these folks
- Continue to advocate for access to housing, work permits,
 and more federal funding to help all people in Chicago

Members of the Chicago City Council,

We, Chicago residents and elected Police District Councilors, urge you to vote for a transparent, community-informed workforce allocation study within the Chicago Police Department when the issue comes before you in the City Council.

Officer salaries are the largest portion of the CPD budget. But right now, Chicago lacks a solid understanding of where and when to send our officers so they can be timpact public safety. Response times to 911 calls remain too high in too many neighborhoods. Community policing suffers when officers lack the time to engage with the public. And officers veilbeing erodes when and hoc delivorments lead to overwork, canceled days off, and burnout!

Perhaps most important, evidence we have to date suggests that current CPD staffing is not aligned with public safely. For instance, a 2019 University of Chicago Crime Lab study found that 1"4% of shootings are happening between midnight and 5 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays in the city's least-safe areas, but just 3.8% of the work hours of Chicago police tactical teams were logged there during that same 10-hour period. "Ill no there words, CPD is not deploying officers when and where violent crime is most likely to occur.

The facteral consent decree also requires staffing changes to ensure CPD performs effectively and constitutionally. The consent factores seeks to ensure that officers have appropriate guidance by assigning them to consistent supervisors and having sergeants supervisor on more than ten part of officers at once. ²⁰ But CPD's current staffing is a far cryform achieving these goals. A workforce allocation study could help map out how to achieve these important objectives to improve policing and public safety.

Key Updates - CPD Private Arbitration Vote

- Last week, the City Council voted against allowing CPD officers facing serious cases of misconduct to have their cases heard in a private arbitration rather than the public Police Board
- We believe the process for these most serious cases must remain open and transparent to ensure a strong relationship between the Department and other community members
- We'd especially like to thank all 6 Alderpersons of the 19th District for voting against this measure and everyone who made calls to let their voice be heard!



Key Updates - CPD Private Arbitration Vote

Next Steps:

- Goes back to the the negotiating table and, potentially, the same arbitrator for a decision. He has indicated he would decide once again in favor of arbitration.
- Goes back to City Council for a vote.
- If City Council votes it down again, it will likely go to court
 - Prospects in court are uncertain, but we believe it's important to uphold these principles in the City Council



Key Updates - 2024 Prioritized Goals for CCPSA

- 1. Work with Superintendent Snelling to establish basic standards for communications and meetings between District Command staff and the District Councils and ensure that the Superintendent enforces those standards.
- 2. Set a goal for Superintendent Snelling to reduce 911 response times in an equitable manner.
- 3. Direct CCPSA staff to develop a public relations and education campaign with support from District Councils that highlights their role in public safety and police accountability.
- 4. Focus the Commission's attention and resources on its responsibility to help to bring the City into compliance with the Consent Decree as soon as is practicable, per Section 2-80- 030(10) of the Chicago Municipal Code.
- 5. Set a goal for Superintendent Snelling to follow through on and implement its plans for a workforce allocation study that engages the Commission and District Councils

Key Updates - Nominating Committee

- Sam facilitated the District Council Nominating Committee meeting on December 16, 2023
- Over several months, the Nominating Committee has set the nominating schedule; developed an application, rubric, and interview questions; and is beginning an outreach campaign to seek Commission candidates

 Accountability (CCPSA) will be posted January 8
 and accepted through February 7, 2024



About OIG



The City of Chicago Office of Inspector General works to make City government better and to hold City actors accountable when they break the rules.

If you have information about misconduct, waste, abuse, or mismanagement relating to City officials, City employees, or contractors and subcontractors providing goods or services to the City, or suggestions to improve City government, report it to the Office of Inspector General.

About OIG



- OIG's oversight authority and jurisdiction is governed by the Municipal Code of Chicago and includes:
 - City officials (elected and appointed)
 - City employees
 - City contractors, vendors, and licensees
 - Lobbyists
 - Chicago Police Department (CPD)
 - Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA)
 - Chicago Police Board
- OIG achieves its mission through:
 - Administrative and criminal investigations;
 - Audits of City programs and operations; and
 - Reviews of City programs, operations, and policies.

Independence

 Oversees CPD, BIA, COPA, and the Police Board


 May also exercise oversight over other City offices and agencies under the general jurisdiction of OIG
- Works with the goal of "enhancing the effectiveness of the Police Department, [COPA] and the Police Board; increasing public safety, protecting civil liberties and civil rights; and ensuring the accountability of the police force, thus building stronger police-community relations"

Powers and Duties



- Analyze disciplinary outcomes
 - Trend analysis
 - Fairness and consistency of discipline
- Evaluate and review policies, procedures, practices, programs, and training
- Review individual closed disciplinary investigations
 - Recommendations to inform and improve future investigations
 - Recommend reopening of materially deficient investigations
- Analyze civil judgments and settlements of claims
- Publish findings, recommendations, and responses
- Address community groups and inform the public



Arrests Dashboard



View arrest data for adult and juvenile individuals by the race of the Arresting Officer and race of the Arrestee




CPD Arrests: Trends





Rules of Engagement

- Request to make public comment must be submitted within 30-minutes of start of meeting
- Order of speakers randomly selected
- No disruption of speakers
- No harassment or disrespect will be tolerated (zero tolerance policy)

Follow Up

- DCMs and staff will take official minutes of public comments made
- DCMs may address comments in real time or may follow up with community member at a later time
