
Quick response to 14 food-borne cluster or outbreaks allowed to prevent additional illnesses.



Completed the 15-month process to develop Chicago's first Cumulative Impact Assessment.




Collaborated with several community-based organizations and other partners, for a citywide heat-mapping study with resident scientists.

Issued 1191 permits and completed 4813 environmental inspections




Healthy Chicago Equity Zones: Partnerships

X Medicaid Redetermination



Deployed our Community Health Response Corps (CHRC) to support the State's Medicaid enrollment at community events across the City, targeting high-priority community areas on Chicago's southwest and south sides. To date, CHRC has reported over 12,000 Medicaid-related engagements with residents at 335 events.



Across the MICAH bureau, our programs provided more than 100,000 direct services to people in 2023 to date.



Through WIC, nutritional assessments, 17,288 pregnant and post-partum people and children received education and access to healthy foods.



Through Family Connects Chicago, **2,550 families** received post-partum nurse home visits through partnership with **8 birthing hospitals**.



Through our Justice for All Reproductive Health Access program, 2,414 received services in support of abortion care access



Through our School-Based Health Services, **44,853 CPS students** received oral health exams, **25,216 CPS students** received eye exams (11, 810 of whom received eyeglasses), and **7,368 CPS students** received comprehensive sexual health education.



Mental Health



City-operated mental health clinics provided **22,731** units of services and served **1,496** patients.



The Trauma-Informed Centers of Care Network expanded behavioral health service coverage to all 77 Chicago community areas **providing services for 42,439 patients.**



Embedded CDPH mental health clinicians in four Chicago Public Library branches.



Expanded CARE program into new neighborhoods.

X Violence Prevention

Provided an estimated \$30M in funding to 19 street outreach organizations in 25 community areas

Street Outreach responded to over 1,940 incidents assisting individuals who are at immediate and high risk of being either victims or perpetrators of violence.

Approved **\$248,500** for disbursement to 170 applicants for funeral, basic needs, and relocation expenses to alleviate the immediate financial impacts and trauma inflicted on survivors & families experiencing loss from gun violence.

Supported over 150 community-led events and public safe space activations in communities most impacted by violence.

X Substance Use





Launched five public health vending machines in overdose hotspot areas to provide no-cost harm reduction resources to community members.

Expanded Medicated Assisted Recovery (MAR) NOW program to offer immediate treatment for Alcohol Use Disorder.

Advanced proposal in conjunction with the Department of Housing to launch Chicago's first Stabilization Housing Center at the old Diplomat Hotel.





- Office of CMO facilitated a pathway to medical care for all new arrivals via CCH. To date over **18,000 deduplicated new arrivals**, connected to care about **60% of the individuals** that have entered the City since August 2022.
- New Incident Command Structure. The Disease Control Bureau provides guidance and strategies
- The Behavioral Health Bureau and OSU providing services, guidance and protocols.
- Vaccination Support for Varicella, COVID And Flu across 27 shelters
 - The CDPH Hospital Preparedness team deployed the Medical Reserve Corps to support public health screenings and assessments at police districts.



2024 Key Priorities

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90% of reportable infectious disease cases reported to CDPH within timeframe. Initiate response to 99% clusters/outbreaks within 24 hours of notification.



Cohesive, coordinated bundle of services for persons living with and vulnerable to HIV



Release a progress report on Healthy Chicago 2025 goals by March 2024.



Expand Families Connect services from 8 to 14 hospitals to increase visits from 8,000 to approximately 16,500 families.



Expand the number of communities served by the CARE program, extend time in field and on weekends, and implement a new staffing model of CDPH Clinicians and EMT's to staff the program.



Reach "saturation" levels for Narcan in the most impacted communities using multiple data sources to monitor impact including OD Map, wastewater surveillance, CDPH Narcan distribution data, EMS, and syndromic surveillance data.



2024 Key Priorities



Reopen 2 Mental Health clinics in underserved neighborhood



Increase flu and COVID-19 vaccination rates in most impacted communities



2024 National Democratic Convention Preparedness: Support Chicago's 35 hospitals, Long Term Care facilities, dialysis centers, etc. for potential service impacts and potential medical surge.



Secure new grant funding, reduce avoidable corporate expenses, automate reporting, expand RFP outreach.



Community Health Response Corps programs to enhance awareness and engagement with vital public health resources and services.



Expand workforce capacity and increase efficiency of hiring process
