MINUTES [Draft]

Board Members Present: President Ghian Foreman, Eva-Dina Delgado, Michael Eaddy, Steve Flores, John P. O'Malley Jr., John H. Simpson, Rhoda D. Sweeney, and Andrea L. Zopp.

Board Members Absent: None.

Others Present: Superintendent of Police Eddie Johnson, General Counsel to the Superintendent Charise Valente, Civilian Office of Police Accountability Chief Administrator Sydney Roberts, Police Board Executive Director Max A. Caproni, and members of the public.

President Foreman called the meeting to order.

- 1. Board Member Eaddy moved to approve the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting held on May 17, 2018. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
- 2. President Foreman announced that the Board's next regular public meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 19, 2018, at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

Board Member Simpson moved to close a series of executive sessions of the Board for the purposes of considering litigation and personnel matters, as authorized by sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

3. President Foreman reported that earlier in the evening the Board, as required by the Illinois Open Meetings Act, met and considered minutes and recordings of all past closed meetings to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists, and that the Board members unanimously agreed that it continues to be necessary to keep confidential the minutes and recordings of its past closed meetings.

- 4. President Foreman stated that a report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month appears in the blue books made available at the meeting, and he noted that this report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website. He then announced that the Board considered in a closed meeting several disciplinary cases, and that the Board will now take final action on these cases.
 - Case No. 17 PB 2935. Board Member Simpson moved to find Police Officer Raoul Mosqueda not guilty of making willful false statements regarding what he heard over the radio prior to a police-involved shooting, and to reinstate him to his position as police officer. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed. Board Member Simpson moved to adopt the written findings and decision that have been reviewed by all Board members who participated in the case. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
 - Case No. 16 PB 2920. President Foreman reported that the Superintendent filed charges to discharge Police Officer Marco Proano from the Chicago Police Department for unjustified use of deadly force, and that the Superintendent subsequently moved to withdraw the charges without prejudice because the respondent resigned from the Chicago Police Department. Board Member Eaddy moved to grant the Superintendent's motion to withdraw the charges. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.
 - <u>Case No. 17 PB 2939</u>. President Foreman reported that the Superintendent filed charges to discharge Police Officer Roy Beard from the Chicago Police Department for engaging in domestic altercations while off duty, and that the Superintendent subsequently moved to withdraw the charges without prejudice because the respondent resigned from the Chicago Police Department. Board Member Eaddy moved to grant the Superintendent's motion to withdraw the charges. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

President Foreman stated that the decisions in the above cases will be entered as of today's date and will be issued to the parties, and that a copy of the written decisions will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

- 5. President Foreman announced that copies of the general orders and other directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during the previous month are listed in the blue books made available at the meeting and are posted on the Police Department's website.
- 6. President Foreman noted that the next item of business is the Superintendent's report. Board Member Sweeney moved to waive the oral presentation and receive the report in writing. The

motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

- 7. President Foreman called upon those members of the public who had signed up in advance to speak. (See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of each speaker's remarks.)
 - Darva Watkins asked questions about the process and agencies for investigating
 allegations of police misconduct, to which President Foreman and Chief Administrator
 Roberts responded. Ms. Watkins also spoke about the importance of having police
 supervisors out in the community, and of improved relationships between the police and
 the community.
 - EvAngel YHWHnewBN spoke about police officers violating constitutional rights and creating situations to use deadly force. Superintendent Johnson noted that the Department recently revised its use-of-force policy and is currently in the midst of consent decree negotiations with the state attorney general.
 - President Foreman called upon the following individuals and there was no response: Brian Darcy and Robert More.

President Foreman stated that all persons who had signed up in advance to speak had been called. Board Member Simpson moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Eaddy, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed, and President Foreman announced that the meeting is adjourned.

Policy Regarding the Attendance of and Participation by the Public at Board Meetings

(Adopted 15 December 2005)

The Police Board values the attendance of the public at its meetings and the opportunity to receive comments and questions on matters concerning the Board or the Police Department. The Board will treat members of the public with courtesy and respect, and expects that the public will treat Board members and Department members in a similar manner.

Toward that end, the Board has adopted the following rules governing conduct at Board meetings:

- 1. An individual wishing to address the Board must sign-up in advance by contacting the Board's office by phone, fax, or in person no later than 4:30 p.m. of the day before the meeting.
- 2. When called upon to address the Board, each speaker is to identify him/herself and speak clearly so that all in attendance may hear and so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of the proceedings.
- 3. Due to time constraints, each speaker is limited to two minutes and must conclude when asked to do so by the Board member acting as parliamentarian.
- 4. Personal attacks, obscene language, fighting words, threats, conduct intended to disrupt or interfere with the meeting, and comments not related to matters within the Board's or the Department's jurisdiction, by a speaker or any person in attendance, are strictly prohibited.

Violation of any of the above rules may result in the removal of the violator from the meeting room, or in the immediate adjournment of the meeting; in addition, repeated violations may result in the violator not being permitted to attend or participate in future Board meetings.

PERSONNEL AND TRAINING

During the month of **June 2018**, **121** training blocks were conducted for Chicago Police Recruits, Metropolitan Recruits (including surrounding agencies) and In-Service Courses.

A total of **20,256** Department attendees received In-Service/E-Learning training, which included: Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement, Force Mitigation/Crisis Recognition & Response, LEMART, Prescribed Weapons Qualifications, Procedural Justice and Legitimacy, Active Shooter, Power Test, Patrol Carbine Requalification A, TASER Qualification and Re-Certification, COPA Taser, TARA Gas Mask Training, Body Warn Cameras: Law and Policies, Directives: June 2018, Standard Field Sobriety Testing Basic/Refresher Course, PAPV, POWER Test and Gang Violence Reduction Strategy.

A total of **714 Chicago Police Recruits** were in training along with **20 Metropolitan Police Recruits**.
