2	is Ghian Foreman. I am president of the
3	Chicago Police Board, and I am calling the
4	meeting to order. Please note that Board
5	member Rhoda Sweeney is unable to attend in
6	person and would like to ask for a motion to
7	permit Rhoda to attend via videoconference. Is
8	there a motion?
9	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: So moved.
10	BOARD MEMBER WOLFF: Second.
11	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor?
12	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
13	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Is there a motion to
14	approve the minutes of the December 12th public
15	meeting?
16	BOARD MEMBER ZOPP: So moved.
17	BOARD MEMBER WOLFF: Second.
18	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor?
19	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
20	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The next public meeting
21	will be held Thursday, February 20th, 7:30
22	p.m. here at the Chicago Public Safety
23	Headquarters.
24	Is there a motion to close a

5	BOARD MEMBER WOLFF: So moved.	
6	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.	
7	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor?	
8	(CHORUS OF AYES.)	
9	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Next up, update on the	
10	Superintendent search.	
11	As we have announced earlier this	
12	week, the application period for superintendent	
13	of the Chicago Police Department has now	
14	closed.	
15	We reported on Monday evening	
16	that we received 23 applications. On Tuesday	
17	morning, we received from the U.S. Post Office	
18	two additional applications that were sent via	
19	priority express mail and was scheduled for	
20	delivery by January 10th, which was prior to	
21	our deadline; we have therefore accepted these	
22	applications which raises the number we have	
23	received now to 25.	
24	We want to provide a little	

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1	breakdown in terms of the applicants that we	Page
2	got just to give the public a sense of the kind	
3	of applications that we received. We look at	
4	race of the applicants, there were 13 white, 11	
5	African American and one Latinx. 21 men, 4	
6	women, and 11 applicants are from the Chicago	
7	Police Department or spent a significant amount	
8	of their career with the Chicago Police	
9	Department.	
10	We are now thoroughly reviewing	
11	all applications and plan to complete by the	
12	end of this month the initial round of in-depth	
13	interviews with the best-qualified	
14	candidates.	
15	As you know, under our duty of	
16	the Municipal Code is to nominate three	
17	finalists for the position to the mayor. The	
18	names of the three nominees that the Board	
19	submits to the mayor will all be made public.	
20	A report of disciplinary actions	
21	taken by the Board during the previous month	
22	has been made available at this evening's	
23	meeting and posted on the Board's website.	
24	There are no disciplinary cases	

Page 5 1 on the agenda for final action this evening. 2 One issue that we do have, Board, 3 is there a motion to grant permission for the 4 Superintendent to raise funds for the annual 5 award ceremony? BOARD MEMBER ZOPP: So moved. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor? 8 9 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 10 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The general orders 11 issued by the Superintendent during the 12 previous month are listed in the blue books and 13 posted on the Police Department's website. 14 I'll now ask the Superintendent 15 for an oral report. 16 INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT BECK: Good evening. That's loud. So since we last met, the 17 18 Department has released its 2019 end-of-year 19 statistics. I'll go over them very briefly. 20 Homicides were down 13 percent in 2019. 21 Shooting incidents were down by 10 percent, but 22 we still -- to illustrate that we still have a 23 long way to go, as we speak, the 11th District is investigating a shooting with five victims 24

1	in a barber shop in the 11th District, Maple	
2	and Pulaski. Five victims, three of which were	
3	juveniles, were in getting haircuts and we had	
4	an individual fire multiple rounds into the	
5	business striking all five. Right now they are	
6	stable and so we hope that continues.	
7	I will emphasize we still see far	
8	too much gun violence in Chicago. To put a	
9	sharper point on that, so far this year we got	
10	63 shooting incidents. And even though that's	
11	below our daily average for last year and our	
12	five-year average, it is slightly above that	
13	the year-to-date number for 2019. So we have a	
14	long way to go.	
15	Tomorrow, I'm attending the	
16	Martin Luther King breakfast interfaith	
17	breakfast. The mayor will be there, and I'm	
18	looking forward to doing that.	
19	I think it's a great time for	
20	Chicago to come together and talk about	
21	messages of peace, which the City sorely needs.	
22	And that concludes my report.	
23	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you,	
24	Superintendent.

9	Proud to say I wore the uniform for 40 years.
10	I was in the patrol division the whole time. I
11	was a blue shirt the whole time, patrol
12	officer. And I worked the beat car and the
13	wagon from start to finish. This is my first
14	time ever addressing the Police Board. I thank
15	you for your time here.
16	BOARD MEMBER ZOPP: Thank you for your
17	service.
18	MR. MILLIGAN: Thank you very much.
19	Appreciate it.
20	First of all, I want to thank the
21	police officers who are here keeping us safe,
22	fulfilling all of our rights, including the
23	right to free speech. Thank you, officers.
24	And I want to respectfully

1	address the Police Board that I understand you	Page 8
2	are in the middle of a very complicated and	
3	difficult search for our next superintendent.	
4		
	Fully support all your efforts. I know you're	
5	doing this in good faith with the understanding	
6	the value of these officers here. Certainly	
7	feel it's important to impress upon you the	
8	need that of the three nominees, of the names	
9	you ultimately submit to the mayor, each of	
10	those nominees understands the need	
11	imperative to make sure these officers get a	
12	good contract, a fair contract. They need it.	
13	They deserve it. They are overdue for it.	
14	Thank you very much.	
15	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.	
16	Next speaker, Octavia Mitchell.	
17	MS. MITCHELL: Good evening. As you all	
18	know, my name is Octavia Mitchell. I am not	
19	sure you all are aware that I had to fight the	
20	DNA for my son that the CPD withheld for nine	
21	years. I received those results, and my son's	
22	DNA was not on the weapon that CPD stated that	
23	he had; however, I see every day that people	
24	out there acquitted of crimes that they are	

1	Page 9 accused of with DNA samples. Just because my
2	son is not here doesn't mean that his name
3	shouldn't be freed.
4	I'm asking the City, O'Malley,
5	did you receive the DNA results?
6	MS. O'MALLEY: Can I respond? I did
7	receive a copy of it.
8	MS. MITCHELL: Okay. I haven't heard
9	anything. Do you all what do you all have
10	to say that you all have his DNA?
11	I was told by the Superintendent
12	Eddie Johnson was here once the DNA came back,
13	to consult with you all after that. So now
14	that you all see that my son's DNA is not on
15	this weapon, how do we go on from here?
16	Because I want his name freed. DNA does not
17	lie.
18	MS. O'MALLEY: We have not received a
19	request from COPA to reopen the CR
20	investigation. So as far as the department is
21	concerned, we have complied with our obligation
22	to turn over the DNA for testing.
23	If COPA comes back and has any
24	further discussion, we certainly will have that

Page 10 1 discussion with the Superintendent. MS. MITCHELL: When I spoke with you all, 2 3 you stated the City denied reopening the case. 4 Thank you, Ms. Mitchell. What MR. CONNOR: we tried to explain is that the inconclusive 5 results of the DNA analysis do not provide COPA 6 7 sufficient basis to request additional reinvestigation of the closed IPRA 8 9 investigation. It doesn't -- the results, 10 inconclusive results, do not make it more or less likely that the officers acted outside of 11 12 policy in the use of force. That's the limit 13 of COPA's investigation. 14 MS. MITCHELL: Can you explain to me what 15 does inconclusive mean? Because from my 16 understanding, if his DNA is not on there, 17 you're coming up with what you want to come up, either he did or didn't. 18 19 I tried to call the Illinois 20 State Police Department for them to explain it 21 to me. Everyone has them sealed off from me. 22 They will not speak to me. So when you say 23 inconclusive, DNA does not lie. 24 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Ms. Mitchell, can I

1	Page 11 ask, Ephraim, can you spend some time and get a
2	meeting set up? And can I ask you get back to
3	me just to make sure that I know that the
4	meeting took place, and we can try to I'm
5	not saying you have to come to a resolution
6	before next month. I want to make sure all of
7	Ms. Mitchell's concerns are being addressed and
8	she is pretty clear. Okay? Is that okay, Ms.
9	Mitchell?
10	MS. MITCHELL: Well
11	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I don't think we are
12	going to resolve it right here.
13	MS. MITCHELL: I understand, but COPA told
14	me the reason they that they had already
15	asked for them to review and they told me no.
16	So is that not clear? We spoke with my
17	attorney, and we had a phone conversation and
18	you stated the City is not willing to reopen.
19	Did you or did you not state that to me?
20	MR. CONNOR: What we attempted to explain
21	was that given the inconclusive results of the
22	analysis which stated that there were at least
23	three different DNA profiles on the weapon, at
24	least one of which was male, that there was not
1	

1	Page 12 sufficient basis for us to seek additional
2	authority to continue to investigate the
3	officer's use of force.
4	MS. MITCHELL: Okay. But it was these
5	males involved in the shooting. How do we know
6	that it wasn't one of the officers?
7	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So, Ms. Mitchell, I
8	would like for you to meet with COPA.
9	MS. MITCHELL: I've been meeting with COPA.
10	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I understand with COPA.
11	I would like to ask that the Police Board get
12	something a report in writing at the
13	conclusion of this meeting so we can have a
14	good understanding. Then that might help us be
15	able to communicate a little bit better if we
16	need to communicate with COPA or with the
17	Superintendent's office to try to help you get
18	to some resolution.
19	MS. MITCHELL: Okay. I would appreciate if
20	somebody would explain to me, because they are
21	coming up with their own assumptions of why his
22	DNA is not on there. If you can't prove it's
23	on there, you can't prove it's on there. It is
24	not up to you to say he did or didn't. It is

1	Page 13 not on there, pointblank, period.
2	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: This is where I think a
3	written report will be helpful, so there's
4	nothing inconclusive about what this group
5	said, what someone else said. We can get
6	something in writing. I think it would be
7	helpful for us. I think it would be helpful
8	for all the parties involved.
9	MS. MITCHELL: Okay. Thank you.
10	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next
11	speaker, Jennifer Edwards.
12	MS. EDWARDS: Happy new year, everybody.
13	Over the past few months, we have
14	presented five major examples of how our
15	community could work with the Chicago Police to
16	begin to solve some of the safety issues in
17	Chicago. We introduced a cadet program
18	proposal, a good business neighbor project, a
19	surveillance camera initiative, a request for
20	support for additional police at the crime
21	hotspot corridors along the Dan Ryan Expressway
22	of 95th Street, which we recently added, 87th,
23	79th, 75th and 75th Street. We're also
24	partnering with a group who developed a safety

Page 14 1 center in our area for reported crime tips when 2 community members are uneasy with reporting to 3 the police and also development of Crime Agitator app by the safety center. 4 5 We began with identifying hotspots of crime in the specific corridors on 6 7 the south side that I just mentioned. This was 8 granted. 9 We presented an evaluation of 10 part of a consent decree conversation in the 3rd, 6th and 7th police districts and 11 identified the 6th District as the model 12 13 closest to obtaining the desired reform. 14 We had also been contacted by the 15 9th Ward, organizations in the 5th District who 16 have expressed interest in collaborating with 17 us. 18 We spoke about crime around 19 abandoned buildings and took part in CBS Channel 2 investigative report identifying 20 problems and numerous buildings in our area, 21 22 many owned by the City. 23 We reported on the community 24 events at the Whitney Young Library where the

1	Page 15 6th and 3rd District police representatives and
2	numerous community members were invited to
3	discuss crime in our area in a project of
4	decorating abandoned, boarded-up buildings near
5	the schools where violent crime activity
6	involved.
7	We engaged the community on the
8	south side from Grand Crossing to Pullman in
9	the backyard community conversation about the
10	uptick in crime in our area.
11	The backyard conversation was
12	well attended and exhibited community interest
13	in coordinating our efforts to address these
14	issues of crime.
15	Plans are being made for our next
16	conversations. We will keep you informed.
17	We continue our collaboration
18	with the 6th District CAPS office by initiating
19	a monthly meeting that we call Coffee with the
20	Captain. We are pursuing a plan for the same
21	platform in the 3rd, 7th and 4th Districts.
22	We received verbal feedback
23	regarding the business neighbor project and
24	have read written feedback on the City of
1

1	Chicago Police Board website that states this
2	project is not possible because of cost. We
3	would like the opportunity to discuss this
4	further because it is our belief that revenue
5	generated from fines will make this effort
6	budget neutral.
7	It is our opinion that this is a
8	budget-neutral proposal.
9	We request an opportunity to meet
10	with the deputy mayor of safety to clarify our
11	proposal. Continue? Okay.
12	We hope to begin this year with
13	the concentration on problem businesses or
14	those suspected of supporting crime.
15	We began working with the 6th and
16	3rd Districts on strategies and would like
17	their support with the established procedures
18	and hope we can get dedicated officers on this
19	project.
20	We have an example of a problem
21	car wash business that attracted drug activity
22	in the 6th District on South State Street. Due
23	to strong community engagement with the police
24	and continued police surveillance, the area

1	problem has been resolved. We thank the 6th	Page
2	District for their diligence in helping to	
3	change a bad situation.	
4	We encourage the Police	
5	Department to continue to enforce the existing	
6	ordinances and regulations regarding problem	
7	businesses and we will emphasize collaboration	
8	at area CAPS meetings.	
9	We list the following community	
10	organizations that have consulted with on the	
11	south side and far south side of Chicago that	
12	have contributed to the bump. I won't read	
13	those. You have those.	
14	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.	
15	Ms. Edwards, I don't need to call anybody else?	
16	MS. EDWARDS: Right.	
17	BOARD MEMBER O'MALLEY: Mr. President, can	
18	we make contact to see if we can get this	
19	organization meeting with the deputy director	
20	of safety after all the time and effort they	
21	present to us month after month?	
22	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Absolutely. I will	
23	reach out with the deputy mayor right away.	
24	MS. EDWARDS: Thank you.
