1	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Good evening, everyone.
2	It is now 7:30. We will get started.
3	My name is Ghian Foreman, President
4	of the Chicago Police Board, and I am calling the
5	Board's April 15th meeting to order.
6	To protect the public's health in
7	response to the COVID-19 outbreak, and as
8	permitted by Governor Pritzker's Executive Orders
9	2020-07 and 2021-06, this meeting is taking place
10	remotely.
11	This meeting is open to the public
12	via audio conference and is being carried live by
13	CAN TV. Those participating by phone are on mute
14	in order to reduce background noise and
15	disruption.
16	I will begin by taking attendance
17	so it is clear who is participating in this
18	meeting. Please say here after I read your name.

19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: Here.
20	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
21	Before we proceed to the items on
22	the meeting agenda, I want to acknowledge that
23	earlier today, as many of our participants know,
24	the Civilian Office of Police Accountability

1	released the video of the fatal shooting of
2	13-year-old Adam Toledo by the Chicago Police
3	by a Chicago police officer.
4	I and the members of Police Board
5	wish to express our condolences to the Toledo
6	family as they continue to grieve the tragic loss
7	of Adam.
8	We also echo Mayor Lightfoot's
9	statement. We acknowledge that the release of
10	this video is the first step in the process
11	towards the healing of the family, the community
12	and our City.
13	The Police Board would like to
14	contribute to this healing process. And we have
15	altered the items on the meeting agenda. We will
16	begin with statements from COPA Chief
17	Administrator Roberts and then Superintendent
18	Brown. We'll have time at the end of the meeting
19	for public comments.
20	Please join us in creating a
21	positive climate for us to address the
22	circumstances surrounding the tragic death of
23	Adam Toledo and the very complex and urgent

violence in our communities and the difficult job 1 confronting the leaders and officers in the 2 police department, as well as those who 3 participate in this meeting each month. 4 We continue to believe that the 5 work of the police accountability process and the 6 implementation of the Consent Decree must play a 7 crucial role in addressing violence and community 8 trust in policing. 9 10 Once again, those participating by 11 phone are currently on mute in order to reduce 12 background noise and disruptions. 13 When we get to the public comment 14 portion of the meeting, we will unmute each 15 speaker. 16 Chief Roberts, before you make your 17 comments, I would like to acknowledge the hard 18 work that you and your team have put together in 19 releasing the video. I believe it's pretty 20 unprecedented in the amount of time in which you 21 released the video. We know it is a lot of 22 hours, a lot of hard work that went into this 23 and I know it's hard. So thank you very much to 24 you and your team for doing this and really

stepping up. And so I'll turn the floor over to you now.

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CHIEF ROBERTS: Thank you, Mr. President.

And as you mentioned, and as everyone is well aware, COPA released the transparency materials.

When I say transparency materials, that's the video, video evidence, OEMC records, as well as the associated arrest reports for the shooting death of 13-year-old Adam Toledo.

COPA reached out to the family actually the day that he was -- it became known who was shot. We had our first conversation with Mrs. Toledo. And we kept in constant contact with the family over these last weeks, making sure they were fully aware of who we are, COPA the civilian police oversight body, and what she could expect from us in the investigation, the level of engagement that we will have, the amount of information that we will share with her, and assured her that we would be available to answer any questions that she had. And we also let her know that day that we would be responsible for the public release of these video materials, but that before we did that, we would give her and

her family the opportunity, if they chose, to 1 review these video materials in advance of this 2 information being made public. And the family 3 did make themselves available for that. And we 4 accommodated their schedule so that they could 5 review this material when the time was right for 6 7 them. As all of you know, COPA has 60 8 days in which to release this video. 9 10 Our duty is to make sure that we 11 release that video as expeditiously as we can, 12 but always with a prior advanced opportunity of 13 the family to review that video and never before 14 release of that video will compromise the 15 integrity of this investigation or any of our 16 investigations. 17 In this particular case, when the 18 family was ready, COPA was ready. And we met 19 with them and we sat with them and we talked to 20 them and we talked to them about what they were 21 about to witness and gave them all of the space 22 that we possibly could give them. 23 As you guys have heard on numerous 24 occasions, these are -- this is very difficult.

1	And it's difficult for everyone. And it's also
2	very difficult for the COPA staff to bear witness
3	to these incidents sadly over and over again.
4	But our job is to release those videos and to
5	make them public to the families, but we try to
6	do that in a timely but also compassioned way.
7	We do join the Toledo family, the
8	Police Board, and other city officials in asking
9	for calm. We ask for also patience to allow COPA
10	to do the investigation.
11	Video evidence is an important
12	piece of our investigative process, but it is not
13	dispositive of our outcome. There is more
14	substantively more investigation that COPA must
15	do and we are doing that, but these
16	investigations do not happen overnight.
17	We are investigating the death of a
18	young man that is going to take time, time for
19	the interviews, time for the forensic analysis to
20	come through, time to review the medical
21	examiner's report, time for ISP to review their
22	report, and those things are things that COPA
23	does not have control over.
24	We are contingent and reliant upon

external agencies to do their work so that COPA
can reach a finding based upon all of the
evidence.
Our investigation is much more than
just looking at a video and interviewing people.
That we can do. We've already started that.
But we also do not want to close
this investigation before we review ballistic
evidence. We do not want to conclude this
investigation before we do DNA analysis. We do
not want to conclude this investigation until we
receive the medical examiner's report.
Those are all things that are done
by agencies outside of the City.
So I ask for the public's patience
to allow us to do a full and thorough and
objective investigation; an objective
investigation of the entire incident that
includes not only the officer's use of deadly
force, but the actions of the other officers,
what brought the officers there, what action they
took while they were there preceding the shooting
and what happened afterwards.
We do a full and thorough

1	investigation. And that does take time.
2	When COPA first got here,
3	investigations were taking two and three years to
4	be completed. In these last three years, through
5	process improvements, efficiencies, better
6	oversight, we are completing investigations in 18
7	months. That is our average. That has been
8	unheard of by any civilian oversight agency
9	before. And COPA and the City of Chicago has
10	had civilian oversight for 50 years. 50 years.
11	1974. Well, 47 years. And we are completing
12	those investigations. And I don't mean
13	investigations that we close without a full
14	investigation, I'm talking about investigations
15	that are completed pursuant to a full
16	investigation.
17	And I hate to use this word, but it
18	is true, we, COPA, are investigating a homicide.
19	This is a homicide investigation that takes time,
20	that takes a full review and analysis of the
21	investigation and proper oversight before we
22	conclude our case. And we are committed to doing
23	a full and thorough investigation. And the
24	investigations that we have done in the past I

think are evidence that COPA will do a full and thorough investigation.

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Now, something President Foreman mentioned I'd like to highlight. This release is 17 days after the shooting. And we were ready on day 11. It was delayed because the family wanted more time. This release included 20 -- the posting of 20 videos, but we reviewed many -- not many more, but there are other videos that were reviewed. We released audio material, documentary material, and all of this was released in 17 days, all while COPA is concurrently facilitating the release of two other officer-involved fatalities that occurred within days of each other this past March. accomplish this was a tremendous strain on our already burdened resources; however, providing the public a timely and comprehensive release of all of the relevant video and related materials into the conduct of COPA's investigative activities and affording transparency in the use of deadly force by the Chicago Police Department in accordance with the established City policy is of paramount importance and is the only way -- or

1	one of the many ways that we gain the public's
2	trust and confidence.
3	And to this end, COPA will continue
4	to release video materials timely, thoroughly,
5	and publicly. And we will always do that in
6	accordance with established City policy.
7	Mr. President, that concludes my
8	report.
9	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you, Chief.
10	Superintendent Brown.
11	SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: Thanks, Mr.
12	President. As you know, the specific details of
13	this police-involved shooting, including the
14	comprehensive use-of-force investigation, which
15	includes the use of deadly force, obviously are
16	being investigated by COPA, but I wanted to
17	convey with the full cooperation of the Chicago
18	Police Department.
19	The officer that was involved has
20	been placed on administrative duties for a period
21	of 30 days.
22	If after COPA's investigation any
23	allegations are sustained and seeks a penalty of
24	suspension of more than one year or separation,

1	those recommendations will be forwarded to me. I
2	will then have 90 days to review COPA's
3	recommendation. If I agree, the recommendation
4	is sent to the City's Department of Law to
5	prepare charges for suspension or separation,
6	which are then filed before the Police Board. If
7	I disagree with COPA's recommendation, the
8	decision goes before a one-person panel of the
9	Police Board for determination and possible
10	referral to the entire Board.
11	It's important that as the Police
12	Department's final decision-maker on COPA's
13	recommendation for this investigation, that I
14	remain impartial and withhold any statement of
15	opinion until presented with the evidence that
16	COPA has gathered.
17	As the COPA investigation
18	continues, CPD will fulfill FOIA requests and
19	produce reports related to this incident, which
20	include arrest reports, any third-party video,
21	any tactical response reports, forms typically
22	filled out by officers after an officer uses
23	force. I want to reiterate. COPA has the
24	Chicago Police Department's full cooperation.

And finally, I want to convey my 1 2 deepest condolences to the Toledo family and my appreciation for the family's call for calm and 3 for peace during this difficult time. Thank you, Mr. President. 5 6 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you, 7 Superintendent. The process Superintendent Brown 8 described can be found on the Chicago Police 9 10 Board's website, ChicagoPoliceBoard.org. We have 11 a video in English and in Spanish explaining the 12 process. It's a complex process of -- but we 13 have video as well as a chart explaining that. And so that information is there. Or you could 14 15 contact Max Caproni at the Police Board office if 16 you'd like any additional details. We would like to remind those here 17 18 tonight that the Police Board members and staff 19 are working with Jones Day law firm, whose 20 members are helping us pro bono, to upgrade our 21 training and examine our responsibility to review 22 and update the rules which govern police conduct 23 in Chicago. Jones Day is researching what is happening in police accountability across the 24

1	country, on the ground, and also the most
2	rigorous academic and practical research. We are
3	still on track to receive their recommendations
4	this summer.
5	The Board will share our work on
6	these issues at a future public meeting.
7	Is there a motion to approve the
8	minutes of the Board's March 18th regular public
9	meeting?
10	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: This is Paula Wolff.
11	I so move.
12	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Michael Eaddy. Second.
13	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor, please say
14	aye.
15	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
16	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Any opposed?
17	(NO RESPONSE.)
18	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The motion passes.
19	Our next regular public meeting
20	will be held Thursday, May 20th, at 7:30 p.m.
21	Whether this will be an in-person meeting or
22	remote meeting will be determined closer to the
23	meeting date.
24	Is there a motion to close a series

1	of executive sessions for the purposes of
2	considering personnel matters in litigation as
3	authorized by Sections $2(c)(1)$ , $(3)$ , $(4)$ and $(11)$
4	of the Illinois Open Meetings Act?
5	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: I so move. Paula
6	Wolff.
7	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. Michael Eaddy.
8	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor, please say
9	aye.
10	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
11	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Any opposed?
12	(NO RESPONSE.)
13	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The motion passes.
14	A report of the disciplinary
15	actions taken by the Board during the previous
16	month has been made available on the Board's
17	website. There is one police disciplinary case
18	on the agenda this evening.
19	The Police Board, as authorized by
20	The Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed
21	meeting one police discipline case. The Board
22	will now take final action on this case.
23	Regarding case number 20 PB 2977,
24	the Superintendent filed charges against Police

1	Officer Saharat Sampin recommending that he be
2	discharged from the Chicago Police Department for
3	making false statements regarding a
4	police-involved shooting. The Superintendent
5	subsequently moved to withdraw these charges
6	because Sampin resigned his position with the
7	CPD. Is there a motion to grant the
8	Superintendent's motion?
9	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: So moved. Paula
10	Wolff.
11	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. Michael Eaddy.
12	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I will now call on the
13	members of the Board for their votes. Wolff.
14	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: Aye.
15	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Crowl.
16	BOARD MEMBER CROWL: Aye.
17	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Eaddy.
18	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Aye.
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Flores.
20	BOARD MEMBER FLORES: Aye.
21	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Montes.
22	BOARD MEMBER MONTES: Aye.
23	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: O'Malley.

1	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Sweeney.
2	BOARD MEMBER SWEENEY: Aye.
3	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Zopp.
4	BOARD MEMBER ZOPP: Aye.
5	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: And I vote in favor of
6	the motion. Voting in favor are Board Members
7	Wolff, Crowl, Eaddy, Flores, Montes, O'Malley,
8	Sweeney, Zopp and myself. The motion passes by a
9	vote of nine to zero. A written order will be
10	entered as of today's date, sent to the parties
11	and posted on the Board's website.
12	The general orders and other
13	directives issued by the Superintendent during
14	the previous month are posted on the Police
15	Department's website.
16	As we move to the public comment
17	section of the meeting, I would like to remind
18	everyone of the Board's policy on participation
19	at these meetings. We value your comments and
20	questions on police-related matters, and we will
21	treat you with courtesy and respect.
22	We expect all members of the public
23	to treat everyone at this meeting in a similar
24	matter.

1	I will now call upon members of the
2	public who signed up in advance to speak. Each
3	speaker will be unmuted after I call his or her
4	name.
5	Our first speaker, Gwendolyn
6	Woodson. And, Max, what do they need to press to
7	unmute?
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: Callers can
9	express *6 to unmute themselves.
10	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Ms. Woodson.
11	Next speaker, Lena Bivins. Ms.
12	Bivens, *6 to unmute.
13	Next speaker, Refugio Gonzales.
14	You can press *6.
15	Next speaker, Darlene Tribue.
16	MR. GONSALES: I pressed *6.
17	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All right. Wait. We're
18	going to back up. Go back to number two. Ms.
19	Bivins.
20	MS. BIVINS: I go first?
21	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Let's start with Ms.
22	Bivins.
23	MS. BIVINS: My name is Lena Bivins. I am a
24	resident out of West Woodlawn on 64th and Vernon.

My concern is that in West Woodlawn 1 2 that we are having a numerous amount of shootings that have been happening during the winter 3 months. And as it's getting warmer, more needs 4 to be done in the community because it seems not 5 to be done between Cottage Grove and King Drive, 6 63rd and 68th, where there's much of the action 7 is happening in the community. 8 9 And I would like to emphasize that I would like to have a little bit more focus on 10 11 the Police Department on the residents in the 12 community who are homeowners, people who are 13 doing right because they are the ones -- we are 14 the individuals who can help support what's going 15 on. 16 I don't believe there's enough 17 going on. And I also have realized during this

I don't believe there's enough going on. And I also have realized during this pandemic that there's a reason why the residents in the community are not involved.

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I'm 45 years old and for 40 years

I've been living in distressed, poverty-stricken

communities, and none of these communities have

communities that are really involved to help turn

it around and during this COVID I have realized

1	why; that the residents are not involved because
2	there needs to be a stronger and better
3	initiative focused on community involvement,
4	because people are stressed out, they have PTSD,
5	they are overwhelmed, and at times we feel like
6	hostages to our community.
7	So I wish a focus would put a
8	little bit more on coming out, the Police
9	Department, and talking, discussing and working
10	with the people in the community to get involved
11	so we can help support the issues that's coming
12	on our community.
13	Until that is done, West Woodlawn,
14	and many other communities, I'll be here 20 years
15	from now telling you, I am still waiting on a
16	change to happen because nothing has been done by
17	the Police Department and other organizations to
18	emphasize community involvement. Thank you.
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Superintendent, would
20	you like to respond?
21	SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: Yeah. I have to
22	apologize to the caller. I usually have those
23	area deputy chiefs or commanders on to
24	specifically address issues but they are all

1 deployed. We have several protests going on that are peaceful, so they're not able to jump on this 2 call. 3 Let me just assure the caller that 4 5 we will address their issue. That we have emphasized community policing, working with the 6 community, collaborating with other City 7 departments and non-profits for not only policing 8 issues but some of the quality-of-life issues 9 10 that have been pervasive in the community throughout not only that particular area but 11 12 throughout Chicago. 13 So we will make note. And we would 14 love to follow up, Mr. President, with the caller 15 if we can get the contact information to make 16 sure that the Commander and the Area Deputy 17 address those specific issues she raised. 18 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: We will make sure -- I 19 actually have an e-mail here from -- I think it's 20 Lieutenant Charles Johnson. The 3rd District has a weekly meeting on Fridays called Together We 21 22 Can, partnership program, that's held at the POAH 23 Woodlawn Resource Center, 6230 South Cottage 24 They are adhering to social distancing. Grove.

1	They ask people to wear a mask. They have Zoom
2	information as well. Sergeant Charlie Johnson,
3	3rd District. So that's the regular scheduled
4	meeting. And I can assure that we can get that
5	information over to you and to your neighbors as
6	well.
7	The next speaker is Mr. Gonzales.
8	If you can press *6, Mr. Gonzales
9	MR. GONZALES: My name is Refugio Gonzales.
10	I'm with the Little Village Community Council,
11	secretary, on behalf of the president, Manuel
12	Martinez. The Little Village's Community Council
13	calls for no civil unrest. We call the start of
14	community dialogue with elected officials,
15	community leaders, youth groups to bring into
16	Little Village community a comprehensive youth
17	program.
18	We understand what the mayor said
19	today, to really look forward, to try to get more
20	dialogue with these youths, and we're prepared to
21	help in that effort.
22	Basically, we're coming out
23	publicly regarding the tragic death of Adam
24	Toledo today because we respected the family's

1	wishes and the privacy, time to mourn the loss of
2	their beloved Adam Toledo. But today it is our
3	plea to bring the various parties together for a
4	peaceful gathering to find solutions to the
5	current state of our youth and to provide them
6	with all the necessary support and programs,
7	social economic services, to endure a healthy and
8	normal life.
9	On behalf of the Little Village
10	Community Council, our president, Manuel
11	Martinez, is willing to meet with our district
12	commander to assure him that we support a good
13	and safe environment for not only for Little
14	Village but all of City of Chicago. And we hope
15	that the Mayor and other political leaders
16	convene a youth conference with grass-roots
17	community workers and youth to gather information
18	how to implement new programs that focus on
19	education, wellness, recreation and employment.
20	And, finally, we're committed to
21	ensure that our youth will have the right to a
22	better future and support of family and
23	community. Thank you.
24	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next

1	speaker, Darlene Tribue. You can press *6.
2	MS. TRIBUE: I got it. Hi, I'm Darlene
3	Tribue, the president of Park Manor Neighbors
4	Community Council, and I'm speaking on behalf of
5	not just our community, but south side
6	communities, as far as trying to keep everything
7	peaceful in our neighborhood.
8	There are a lot of avenues right
9	now going on in the Chicago for youth engagement,
10	except the youths aren't coming.
11	You know, that's one thing with the
12	Cook Workforce Development Center on 79th Street,
13	they have all kinds of programs, and they're
14	disseminating the information out.
15	But the youth seem to gather in
16	other areas, and some of them may have positive
17	focus. And with schools not being at their
18	normal rate with COVID being out here for
19	community activities to be normal, you know,
20	everybody seems to be suffering.
21	You know, we have Park Manor
22	Chatham, Woodlawn, Chesterfield, Avalon Park, and
23	South Shore. We have a lot of chambers that are
24	all trying to work together, and with the Greater

Chatham Initiative as well to try and gather some 1 form of unity in every area of a community in 2 this City. 3 In the process of that, we don't 4 need to lose any of our stores in the process of 5 civil unrest. That we're hoping that we can have 6 7 peaceful protests wherever they are and not go nuts like we did Memorial weekend of last year. 8 9 So I'm appealing to the 10 Superintendent and to the Mayor and to everyone 11 that we can maintain and sustain our 12 neighborhoods in a safe way throughout what's going on, not just with, you know, the shooting 13 of Adam Toledo, but what's happening in Minnesota 14 15 as well; that it doesn't spill over into Chicago 16 as well where we lose any more than what we've 17 already lost. 18 I appreciate my 3rd and 6th 19 District commanders and their community policing 20 efforts and all the efforts that they have been 21 doing. We've got new commanders. They're doing 22 a great job. And I want to compliment, you know, 23 our police at this point, but, you know, we're 24 expecting them to work miracles, and we're here

1	to work miracles with them and help them. That's
2	our only comment. Keep us safe.
3	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.
4	Next speaker, Sharon Pincham.
5	Press *6. Sharon Pincham.
6	Next speaker, Jennifer Edwards.
7	MS. EDWARDS: Good evening, everybody. In
8	trying to curtail crime, our community members
9	have stepped up to involve several area concerned
10	groups, along with the 6th District CPD officers.
11	We executed a walk to observe the
12	79th Street business district that receives many
13	911 calls. We walked from King Drive to
14	Champlain and will continue to Cottage Grove in
15	our upcoming walk. We documented many DACP and
16	COVID violations and will be working with City
17	and police services to correct the issues.
18	We appreciate any and all of the
19	referrals from the CPD as a result of our
20	presentations and ask for assistance in
21	navigating how to connect with the appropriate
22	City departments to correct the issues on 79th
23	Street.
24	We hope to help with the crime

1	issues on 79th Street and would like to beautify
2	the area in keeping with the West Chesterfield
3	Community Association Good Business Neighbor
4	Project.
5	We intend to conduct these types of
6	walks in other problem business areas in our
7	communities on the south side. We are pleased to
8	have made new connections with the following
9	standing organizations and new organizations;
10	Park Manor Neighbors, Community Council Greater
11	Chatham Alliance, Operation Safe Neighborhood,
12	formerly Safe Pumps, Revere Caring and Sharing,
13	Champs Male Mentoring, SABNO, and Chicago
14	Playground Legends. We continue to connect the
15	safety in our neighborhoods. Thank you.
16	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.
17	Next speaker, Enunice Chatman-Regis.
18	MR. CHATMAN-REGIS: Hello, can you hear me?
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Yes, ma'am.
20	MS. CHATMAN-REGIS: Okay. Good evening.
21	I'm a member of Eberhart 79th Block Club, and we
22	have made many calls regarding Family Fresh Food
23	Market located at 457 East 79th Street, which
24	continues to be a problem for our neighborhood.

1	It continues to exhibit poor business practices
2	as detailed by Chicago's BACP. One loiterer has
3	been parking his red motorcycle on a curb outside
4	457 East 79th Street. The business owner, Bobby,
5	permits it. He permits loitering despite signing
6	a no-trespassing affidavit and also posting no
7	loitering on his stores.
8	He harbors these miscreants and
9	they don't live in our neighborhood.
10	On March 31st of this year, a
11	community walk was conducted that included
12	Communities Organized to Win, our block club, 6th
13	District Commander Ben, and members of her CAPS
14	team, our beat 624 beat facilitators, and other
15	Chatham neighbors from the 3rd District. The
16	walk originated at the parking lot of 79th and
17	Vernon, the library, and continued eastward on
18	both sides of 79th Street to Cottage Grove.
19	The purpose of the walk was to
20	introduce businesses to the ordinances, no
21	covering no windows, and have them sign
22	no-trespassing affidavits.
23	One business was visited. I was
24	with Commander Ben when she went specifically and

1	told Bobby at 457 East 79th Street to remove the
2	items that completely covered all the windows and
3	to clear the debris that was piled in the
4	windows, because he was violating the City
5	ordinance. Today he has done none of that.
6	The remainder of this presentation
7	continues with the next speaker. I thank you for
8	your time.
9	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. June
10	Norfleet.
11	MS. NORFLEET: Good evening. As my
12	colleague Enunice says, we will continue. April
13	6th, 2021, around 11:26 p.m., there was a
14	shooting near 457 East 79th Street wherein one
15	individual was killed and another was wounded.
16	This is a dangerous and
17	unacceptable condition that exists on this
18	intersection.
19	Your phone log of CPD will attest
20	to the fact that our neighborhood phone tree has
21	made many calls numerous calls to 911 to
22	report the unquestionable to report the
23	questionable activities and illegal activities at
24	this location.

1	After our presentation on March
2	18th at the Police Board citing these problems, a
3	phone call was received from Area 1 Yolanda
4	Talley who wanted more in-depth information
5	regarding the 457 Street incident.
6	Deputy Chief Talley said she would
7	pass the information on to the deputy chief of
8	Area 2 because Talley did not work in our area,
9	as Talley only attended the Board meeting in the
10	absence of Area 2 deputy chief.
11	Talley said that both she and Area
12	2 deputy chief would call. No phone call from
13	either one has occurred.
14	As one drives down State Street,
15	several squad cars are stationed along this
16	median. Why can't a patrol car be stationed at
17	79th street and Eberhart or 79th and Cottage
18	Grove? A corner that seems to be a haven and
19	gathering point for these free-willing illegal
20	behaviors.
21	Is it too much to ask that the
22	police be assigned even if only temporarily?
23	We need help now before weather
24	becomes more conducive and draws more and greater

1	crowds in this area. If the Loop gets help, why
2	can't we? We implore you to act posthaste.
3	We are concerned about the habitual
4	rotation of District 6 commanders every two
5	years. That doesn't help to stabilize our area
6	and our community.
7	This report will be forwarded to
8	you, President Ghian. And all of us here on the
9	south side extend our condolences to the Toledo
10	family. We are grieving with them. Thank you
11	very much for your attention.
12	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.
13	Next speaker, Matt Brandon.
14	MR. BRANDON: Good evening, President
15	Foreman, members of the Board, Superintendent
16	Brown, command staff and Chief Roberts.
17	Communities Organized to Win continues to work on
18	bringing police and community together so that
19	we, as partners, can develop strategies and
20	solutions to the issues that plague our
21	communities.
22	Although we recognize that the
23	traditional priority calls, particularly felony
24	in-progress calls take precedence, it has been

typical nuisance calls that keep many of our
neighbors up through the night and early morning
hours. Large gatherings, street parties, illegal
parking plague our areas. Felonious activity
evolves from some of those occurrences resulting
in violence, property damage, and the trashing of
our streets, sidewalks and alleys around our
homes. Calls to 911 are met with disdain and
impatience. Our lifeline to the men and women on
duty is tethered to the 911 call-takers. Callers
have been asked, Are you calling again? Or,
We've already had that call, making us believe
that our concerns are insignificant and therefore
not recorded in totality.
What seems unimportant to the
call-takers is of the utmost importance to our
neighbors.
Communication is the key to our
partnership, so we've been told. It's got to get
better.
We're also concerned about the
shortage of police officers in our district.
Officer safety and response to
calls for service are dependent upon adequate

1 staffing. We have made a promise to those officers in our community that we will continue 2 3 to lobby for manpower. As you undertake the difficult task of reimaging how police services 4 should and will be delivered going forward, a 5 reduction in manpower isn't one of the answers. 6 7 Thoughts and prayers out to the Toledo family. And kudos to Commander Watson and 8 Commander Ben. And to our men and women in blue, 9 10 be safe and thank you. 11 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much. 12 Superintendent, so we've heard -- we hear from 13 the neighbors on the south side quite a bit, and 14 they've been pretty diligent over the last year, 15 year and a half. And I think you know they're 16 both complimentary as well as critical. It would 17 be great if -- you know, I'm not exactly sure. 18 kind of turn it over to you to see if we can --19 what we can do to try to, you know, make some 20 incremental progress. Any thoughts? 21 SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: Yeah. I think one of 22 the callers alluded to it. As we come out of the 23 impact of COVID-19 on the communities' ability to 24 meet in groups where we were before the pandemic,

our interaction with our young people with a lot of our programs, not only what we do with CPS but City of Chicago, has many programs for our young people that have been put on hold since last March. So we're looking at a year of this quarantine and our residents are apprehensive as well in congregating. But we see a light at the end of this tunnel of our ability to interact with community more and more and more in large groups so that we can have the kind of response that all these communities deserve.

But I would just add that the 3rd and 6th Districts have come up with very creative ways to social distance, wear a mask, and some on Zoom, but it's just not the same as meeting in person, meeting in the community, you know, visiting with people in the neighborhood like we were before we were quarantined.

So we are being aggressive with our community policing strategy. And we hope soon as more and more people take the vaccine, both doses, and get out more comfortably and associate with one another and with the Police Department. We see that glimmer of light that we can come out

of this quarantining based on COVID-19 to get 1 back to some sense of the normal interactions with each other. 3 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next speaker 4 5 Mr. John Perryman. \*6. 6 Next speaker, Flora Suttle. Flora 7 Suttle. Press \*6. MS. FLORA SUTTLE: Good evening, Superintendent, Board, Ms. Roberts, Deputy Chief 9 10 Roberts. Speaking again, requesting that my son 11 Derrick Suttle's case be reopened. You are 12 familiar with this case. He was fatally shot by 13 an off-duty Chicago police officer who happened to be black, who dressed in uniform shot him. 14 15 struggled with him and handcuffed him to the 16 steering wheel in the arm that he was shot. He 17 was also shot in the chest. The case was closed. 18 The investigation was not complete. I'm a former police agent. And I've asked Chief Roberts to 19 20 look into this matter. I've asked the 21 Superintendent to look at his reports. And I've 22 asked a release of the Inspector General to look 23 into this matter. 24 Superintendent, the last time I

1	spoke at the Board, I didn't do any follow-up on
2	you to ask you if you had seen reports of my
3	son's by the detective division.
4	Sidney Roberts, I know that you
5	have the information on Derrick Suttle's case.
6	I also submitted a Freedom of
7	Information Act pursuant to the Mayor's executive
8	order requesting that the information be
9	released all files be released on Derrick.
10	And I want them published, too.
11	And I want them this has been since 19 I
12	mean 2012.
13	And, Deborah Witzburg, I'd like to
14	thank you for calling me the next day after the
15	Police Board meeting and calling me to keep me
16	informed on what it is you're doing with my son's
17	case. We have spoken every week. And you
18	informed me and I appreciate that.
19	And then, finally, I'd like to give
20	a compliment, if I may, to a sergeant on the west
21	side. She is a community policing sergeant. I
	noticed her and several young men from the
22	nooroea ner ana severar poang men rrom one
22	community going door-to-door in the 15th

stopped her and asked her why they were going 1 door-to-door. She explained to me that they had 2 had a shooting on that block just a day before. 3 This is April 1st. And they were out there a 4 long time knocking on doors and talking with 5 people. And I told her I appreciated what she 6 was doing and we need more of that. 7 So community policing in some 8 areas -- in the 4th District, you're working hard 9 10 and you're moving hard. 11 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Ms. Suttle, I'm sorry. 12 I'm going to have to stop you. I appreciate it. 13 And we also received written comments from Ms. Witzburg, so I believe that that's going over to 14 15 COPA for review. 16 Next speaker Zed Braden. Zed 17 Braden. If you can press \*6. 18 Final speaker, Mr. Robert More. 19 Mr. More, if you are here, \*6. 20 MR. MORE: Mr. Foreman, can you hear me? 21 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Yes, sir. 22 MR. MORE: Okay. It's Robert J. More at the 23 Chicago Police Board meeting of April 2021. 24 Robert J. More, RJM initials, again expresses

1	herein RJM's concern for the net consequences of
2	RJM's activities to the cause, which is salvation
3	of souls, constitutes and invites any citizens
4	who's cognizant of our RJM's record that
5	(unintelligible) with regard to opine regarding
6	whether in the balance the competent evidence of
7	the overall effect of RJM's activity indicating
8	to the constitute the net source of utility for
9	such cause or a source of detriment whereto
10	without RJM possessing cognizance of such
11	conditions.
12	Yet, the actual matter is that it
13	constitutes a source of detriment whereto.
14	Suggestions regarding modifications RJM can make
15	to bring the overall effects whereto into a
16	positive balance.
17	Number one: Regarding the March
18	2020 meeting, RJM spent 54 minutes trying to make
19	a connection on a whatever it was, Menards,
20	and it just didn't work with three phones, three
21	devices. RJM has not reduced his commitment.
22	There's no (unintelligible). There's just
23	hopefully surge forward to make his what is my
24	contribution to help fix these problems.

Report regarding developments and 1 2 non-malitia at large, there is an absolute truth, I think it's called -- Mike Lindell interviewed 3 Douglas G. Frank. The evidence is overwhelming 4 5 in the mind of this layperson that the election was stolen in 2020. It is treason as RJM 6 understands it to defer to the activity of this 7 nominal administration. These are tyrants by 8 (unintelligible). The matter must be corrected. 9 10 Douglas G. 2	time is up. And I apologize that I skipped over
3	one name. Ms. Crista Noel. You can press *6,
4	Ms. Noel.
5	MS. NOEL: I'm here. So the first thing I
6	have to say is, Mississippi, God damn. A mama
7	calls the police to have you find her missing
8	child and you bring him back in a box. Stop
9	releasing these videos like lynching ads. We
10	don't need to know when you're releasing it. We
11	don't need to know the date. Just put it up.
12	Stop getting all this crap on these snuff films.
13	Now we got to have some community
14	agreements with the police. If I put my hands
15	up, that means, Don't shoot me.
16	And how do you think you're
17	effective if you're willing to shoot children
18	complying with your orders?
19	And don't forget Anthony Alvarez.
20	You shot him, too. And I'm sure you got that on
21	video, too, and I don't hear nothing about you
22	releasing that one.
23	And we offered to use counsel
24	through the Consent Decree and got blocked.
	1

1	Adam and Anthony could have been
2	alive right now. And you know what will keep us
3	calm? You asking us to stay calm. You know what
4	will keep us calm? Stop killing us. Stop
5	killing us. No excuses. Stop killing us.
6	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you, Ms. Noel. At
7	this time, all members of the public who signed
8	up to speak have been called. Is there a motion
9	to adjourn?
10	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: So moved. Paula
11	Wolff.
12	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.
13	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I haven't spoke.
14	Hello?
15	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Yes.
16	MR. WOODSON: This is William Woodson. I
17	would like to speak. I was the first one. You
18	didn't come back to me.
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I apologize. All right.
20	We'll hold off on the motion to adjourn. Mr.
21	Woodson.
22	MR. WOODSON: Yes. My statement is related
23	to the whole opening of the meeting right here
24	with the community and the police. And the

1	community logo, slogans and everything is to
2	serve and protect. And by law the community is
3	99.9 percent right. Also, the police is 99
4	percent right 99.9 percent right. But the
5	percentage that's keeping them from being on the
6	same level, even though they have the same
7	percentage of writing, and that little percentage
8	in my eyes that I see is that, To serve and
9	protect. It needs to be a full statement to
10	state, To equally serve and protect. And that
11	will close all the gaps. It may not do it
12	spontaneously, but it will close many a gap,
13	especially with conversations I have just heard.
14	And it will also cost all cities and states very
15	little money to just add that one word across the
16	top of To Serve and Protect. That way, the
17	community and the police, they will have more
18	security within each other, and they can also
19	have the safety of working together on a more
20	open and free basis. And my appeal is going out
21	to all the cities and states with mayors and
22	superintendents, and this will make a more calmer
23	USA.
24	And if you agree, I would like to

1	put this in motion as a law, because it's
2	mandatory to be done, and it will resolve a lot
3	and it doesn't cost a lot.
4	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
5	At this point, I believe that all
6	callers that signed up to speak have been called
7	upon. Is there a motion to adjourn?
8	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: Yes. I renew my
9	motion. Paula Wolff.
10	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. Michael Eaddy.
11	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor, please say
12	aye.
13	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
14	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The motion passes and
15	the meeting is adjourned.
16	Thank you, everyone. Please stay
17	safe.
18	(WHEREUPON, the proceedings
19	were adjourned at 8:22 p.m.)
