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1 Good evening. I am Ghian MR. FOREMAN: I am the vice president of the 2 Foremen. Chicago Police Board, and I am calling the 3 4 meeting to order. Board members Lighfoot and 5 Sweeney are unable to attend this meeting in 6 person and wish to attend via audio conference. 7 Is there a motion to permit them to do so? 8 MR. EADDY: So move. 9 MR. SIMPSON: Second. All in favor? 10 MR. FOREMAN: 11 (Ayes in unison.) 12 MR. FOREMAN: The motion passes. The first item of business is approval of 13 14 the minutes of the board's regular public 15 meeting held on November 17th, 2016. Is there 16 a motion to approve the minutes? 17 MS. FRY: So moved. 18 MR. SIMPSON: Second. 19 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor? 20 (Ayes in unison.) 21 None opposed. The motion MR. FOREMAN: 22 Our next regular public meeting will passes. 23 be on Thursday, January 19th at 7:30 p.m. here 24 at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.



At this time I ask for a motion to close a series of executive sessions for the purpose of considering personnel matters in litigation as authorized by Section 2(c)(1),(3),(4),(11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. Is there such a motion?

MS. FRY: So move.

MS. DELGADO: Second.

MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. FOREMAN: None opposed. The motion passes. The schedule of the Board's regular monthly public meetings for 2017 has been made available at tonight's meeting and will be posted on the Board's website.

Earlier this evening the Board as required by the Illinois Open Meetings Act met and considered minutes and recordings of all past closed meetings to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists. The Board members unanimously agreed that it continues to be necessary to keep confidential the minutes and recordings of its past closed meetings.

A report of disciplinary action taken by



the Board during the previous month has been made available at this evening's meetings.

This report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website.

The Police Board, as authorized by the Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed meeting one disciplinary case. The Board will now take final action on this case. Regarding case number 15 PB 2894, is there a motion to find Detective Jamie Duignan guilty of disobeying a direct order to report to internal affairs for a statement regarding investigation of alleged misconduct and to discharge her from the Chicago Police Department?

MR. SIMPSON: So move.

MR. EADDY: Second.

MR. FOREMAN: All in favor by a show of hands? Any opposed? Voting in favor are board members Lightfoot, Delgado, Eaddy, Fry, Simpson, Sweeney and myself. The motion passes by unanimous vote.

Is there a motion to adopt the written findings and decision that has been reviewed by



all Board members who participated in the case? 1 2 MS. FRY: So move. 3 MR. SIMPSON: Second. 4 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor? 5 (Ayes in unison.) None opposed. The motion 6 MR. FOREMAN: 7 passes by unanimous vote. 8 The Board's decisions in the case on which we took final action this evening will be 9 10 entered as of today's date. It will be issued 11 to the parties. A copy of the written decision will be posted on the Board's website within 10 12 13 business dates pursuant to the Municipal Code 14 of Chicago. 23	I will now call upon those members of the
24	public who signed up in advance to speak. When



your name is called, please step up to the microphone. We ask you limit your comments to two minutes. The first speaker is Deanndra Leuver.

DEANNDRA LEUVER: Good evening. My name is Deanndra Leuver. I, again, apologize for any pauses. I was recently hospitalized for my active or for active symptoms of PTSD and the concussion which has left me with a mild traumatic brain injury. Those were sustained from being attacked on March 28th, 2016.

I am here, again, today to try to understand why I am so petrified to step outside my apartment. I have spoken to Scott Waespack on November 14th after my friend was attacked. I have not heard back from his office. So now I am even more petrified, because it seems as if nobody is listening to me.

I appreciate Mr. Caproni taking the time to listen to me and for giving me the opportunity to speak to you, but nothing in my life has changed. I am still terrified to walk alone in my community. Women, regardless of



race, religion, sexual identity or even
location are unsafe in Chicago. That is a
problem.

My friend being attacked is what provoked
me to speak up on November 17th. The next day

me to speak up on November 17th. The next day,
November 18th, another friend of mine was
attacked. I went into the hospital on
November 20th. Since my hospitalization, I am
continuing to fight to get my life back and
part of that includes ensuring my safety and
the safety of my loved ones who live in every
corner of this city. So my question now is
what is the Chicago Police Board doing for the
community to help ensure my safety and the
safety of the women in Chicago?

Thank you for listening to me and giving me the opportunity to speak to you today. I really appreciate that. I hope you guys have a good evening.

MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. I actually have a copy of your statement, so I'll pass it to the Superintendent Johnson as well.

DEANNDRA LEUVER: Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Next speaker is Marie



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MARIE MESTAS: Hi. Thank you for allowing me to speak today. This is one of my first or my second time coming to a meeting like this and I will say that last meeting kind of blew me out of the water hearing stories from people all across the city and how they are effected by the police or how they were effected by the community.

A couple of my friends, as you just heard Deanndra, they have been mugged within the last month and they have been affected by this clearly, and I think that just upsets me because it's so close to home. I also have a one-year-old son and hearing the mother speak last week about her son being shot by a police officer lit a fire in my belly. It's no news that this has become an issue across this nation, and I want to know how we as Chicago, the city of Chicago and the officers of the law of this city will make the change and how we will stand out. Of all of cities and towns in this nation, how are we going to stand out and say hey, we are different, we protect our own,



we don't hurt our own, but we protect our own.

We protect the city. We protect our citizens,
and we also protect the animals. Judging by
the meeting last week, that also lit a fire in
my belly. It was ridiculous to hear that and I
want to know how we are going to make that
change? How are you going to positively affect
the city, this time around this year, within
the future. Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. Superintendent, do you want to make a comment?

SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: We have been working hard, as some of you know, since I became Superintendent in April to restore the faith that the community has in the police department. Mistrust and inappropriate behavior didn't happen overnight, this happened over decades. So to that I will say that it's going to take sometime to fix it, not decades, but since April I have seen a lot of positive progress in that interaction.

I will continue to go out into the communities to see what you all concerns are.

The command staff will continue to go out, but



I can assure you of one thing, CPD has begun a 1 shift in our culture in how we do business and 2 we will continue that until we absolutely get 3 4 it right. 5 Thank you. Next speaker is MR. FOREMAN: Pamela Hunt. Pamela Hunt? Next speaker 6 7 Gwendolyn Moore. Good evening. 8 Good evening. GWENDOLYN MOORE: Is it 9 possible that I could give you guys a copy of 10 something? 11 12

First of all, I want to thank you for the opportunity to allow me to speak before your Board. My name is Gwendolyn Moore. I am the mother of six children, Xavier, Darius, Justido, Jasmine, Jason and Jamaal Moore Sr. who was murdered by a member of the CPD whose names is Ruth Castelli.

On December 15th, 2012 my son, Jamaal Raymone Moore was brutally murdered and justice has not been served.

In our society today the world depicts what is it perfect and righteous. According to this world standards Jamaal is not a perfect child but he was righteous. He had a heart of



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gold and always did the right thing when it came to his family. Jamaal had just become a father of a baby boy that looked just like him, Liam Joseph Moore, which is his son and looks like him as I afore stated.

At that time in December 2012 Jamaal's son Liam Joseph Moore was two months old at the time of Jamaal's death. At the time of Jamaal's death his son began to cry uncontrollably and had to be taken to the emergency room, to the hospital for observation. Once Liam's mother explained what had just happened to Liam's father Jamaal, the doctors stated that baby Liam was grieving and knew that something had happened to his father. This went on for two days until his crying stopped. On that day my family's life changed. My youngest son was tragically taken from my family by the hands of Ruth Castelli.

I stand here not as a protester, not as a person who does not like police officers. I have personal relationships with police officers in my life. I stand here as a mother who has lost a son, her youngest son.



Since Jamaal's death, I lost my father and my husband of 34 years who wanted justice for his son Jamaal. I am not able to move on in the grieving process for my son Jamaal because justice has not been served for him as yet. I stand here alone today because daily I am alone. No one is with me when I go into my bedroom and cry at night. No one is with me when I drive in my car and think of him all day. When I try to sleep, I can't. When I try to move forward in life, it's difficult. I am haunted every day with a nightmare that plagues my life since December 15th, 2012.

I don't despise or hate police officers.

Again, as I stated, I have friends and personal relationships with Chicago police officers who do their job and serve and protect us very well.

My life has been haunted and is standing still, because I have not had justice for my son Jamaal Raymone Moore Senior. Oftentimes we don't take things personal until it happens to us in our lives. That is when we pay attention. I have lost my son in



December 2012, my father due to sickness in 2015 who talked about Jamaal often, and my husband, Joseph Moore, Jamaal's father, who died hurting, grieving and trying to fight for his son this year in January 2016.

I stand before you asking, beseeching and asking you to take a look into the case of Jamaal Raymone Moore and hold the Chicago Police Department Officer Ruth Castelli accountable for the death and murder of my youngest son Jamaal Moore Senior. My life, my childrens' lives, his brother's life, his sister's life, his friends' life and his son Liam Joseph Moore's life will never be the same. This Board was designed with justice in mind, accountability in mind, and to understand the citizens of Chicago need you.

Everyday you wake up and greet your loved ones, each day you kiss your loved ones, each day you hug your loved ones, and remember there goes like me, we need justice for our loved ones that have been wrongfully murdered. I thank you for your time and patience to listen.

I ask you be open and investigate Jamaal



Raymone Moore Seniors case and bring justice by persecuting and convicting Ruth Castelli for the death and murder of my baby boy, my youngest son, Jamaal Raymone Moore Senior.

Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Thank you.

MR. EADDY: Thank you.

MS. DELGADO: Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Roosevelt Slaughter.

ROOSEVELT SLAUGHTER: First of all, good evening to everybody and every member on the Thank you for the opportunity to take a Board. chance to speak. Me myself, Superintendent Johnson, I am also a victim of Chicago police corruption that took place 11 years ago where anything could have happened to me when an officer on my block lied and had our home raided, but today I am not up here just for me, I am up here to talk about the tragic murder of I feel that whatever he was doing Kuwan Rav. or whatever he was stopped for with the culture of policing in this country now, I could understand why he would run. At this point if an officer encountered me, I probably would



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run, but the worst and dirtiest thing Sergeant
John Kowlis (phonetic) did to him was shoot him
in the back. I feel that is the worst thing
you could ever do to somebody is shoot them in
the back, because they are not a threat to you.
If anything, the threat was trying to escape.
The threat was trying to leave. The only thing
the police and even the media could bring up is
that certain things that he did in his past.

Why is it that us in the black and Latin community, even all over this city, no matter what race or gender, no matter what sexuality are always judged from the past, because any of you all know if a police officer stops you or pulls you over, what is one of the main questions they ask you? Have you ever been arrested before? What does that have to do with it? I have been asking the question for vears, but nobody has been able to tell me what does this have to do with what you are pulling me over for now? I wish one of the Board members or one of the guys or gals in blue could come and tell me that, because that don't have anything to do with it.



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I believe what the Scripture says, God 1 2 says in the Bible, Jesus said that we all, every single last one of us, you Superintendent 3 Johnson, every single member on this Board, 4 5 every single body in this room, every single 6 gal and guy in blue has sinned and fallen short 7 of the glory of God. So, therefore, we cannot 8 be judged upon our past, whatever it is that we 9 did, whatever it is Mr. Ray did in the past, he 10 was not doing it right then. And just because 11 somebody had a rough past or whatever it is, shouldn't be brought up in the media and 12 13 brought up by police to make them look bad, and that's exactly what happened. It was an 14 embarrassment to him, an embarrassment to his 15 family and embarrassment to his legacy. We all 16 17 have sinned and fallen short of glory. 18 pretty sure some officers are still out there 19 sinning now.

MR. FOREMAN: Please limit your comments.

ROOSEVELT SLAUGHTER: So Superintendent, you should make the right choice in suspending his police powers. He needs to be brought up on charges and brought to justice. And with



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1 that, I am going to sit down and have a happy
2 holiday, all the members and every single body
3 in this room.

MR. EADDY: Thank you.

MS. FRY: Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Next speaker, Dorothy
Holmes. Next speaker, Darva Watkins. Next
speaker, Minister Robert Plum.

MINISTER PLUM: As we sav. we don't die. we multiply, and we say as, asa lama lakum, Shalom, this is the reason why I am here. I am yours truly Minister Robert Plum, and I am at your service. The service is the way God wants us to be, and the only way for us to be is to do it right or not at all. And I am also in a reflection of the Honorable Mayor Harold Washington. I am not a biological son, I am that I am a spiritual son. There is a balance. The balance is as each human beings, black, white, red, brown and yellow, all, as the last speaker has said, fall short of glory of God. And in the beginning De or Da equals 23. Justice equals 23. We in the community are the children. We are the people and we are the



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1 world. We deserve respect. Respect is 2 everything, and we must give respect. However, 3 wrong hurts all of us. It's right that helps all of us. So we must amend, we must correct 4 5 the things between us. At this point it is a 6 serious issue. It is a serious dilemma that Chicago was raided during Daley's 7 8 administration. It was cited in the news 666, 9 we have even surpassed 666. We have a solution. The solution is 277 plus 23 and 10 11 every human being, when you look at your 12 brains, you see how I am doing my hands, that 13 means your brains ain't no bigger than mine, mine ain't no bigger thans yours, and you have 14 no bigger eyes. That's 99.5 equals 23. The 15 Honorable Mayor Harold Washington said --16 17 MR. FOREMAN: You are done. MINISTER PLUM: Vision is also 23. So if 18 vou have the Honorable Mayor Harold Washington, 19 20 23 is a better way of life when we can share. 21 There is an understanding through God and 22 there's a way of life that we must do it right 23 or not at all. That is on the community side,



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the police need the community and the community

1 need the police. So let's create a balance 2 which would be a paradigm, a way of life we can 3 make a difference. God bless you. Thank you 4 all, and good to see you Superintendent 5 Johnson. You know, we was last at Father George Clemmons place last time I seen you at 6 7 his church. So I think you know the right 8 intent is good so that we can continue to 9 promote peace in our community. God bless you 10 Thanks a million. Again, pray for all. 11 Chicago because this is what I do, is pray for Chicago, America and the world. All power to 12 13 the people. All power to the people.

MR. FOREMAN: John Catanzara.

JOHN CATANZARA: First, I'd like to say to the Board members, as you go forward deciding the fate and employment over a handful of officers in the Laquan McDonald incident, a Rule 14 violation sustained is not an automatic fire rule offense. I stand before you as evidence of that, so keep that in mind and don't bother with public pressure.

Mr. Superintendent, in February when you were the acting first deputy I asked you about



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a promotion to then Commander Buslik about --1 after he was shortly sustained CR for 2 3 threatening and harassing and intimidating a 4 licensed business owner and why he was not demoted but promoted from captain to commander. 5 You said you were going to look into that 6 7 incident. Did you get a chance to look into 8 that? 9 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Not fully. 10 MR. SIMPSON: Pardon me? 11 Not fully. SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: 12 JOHN CATANZARA: I will forward everything 13 I got to your secretary's office, and hopefully we can get an answer soon here, because I still 14 15 don't understand how he got promoted. Lastly, over the course of the last few 16 17 years then First Deputy Wysinger, I asked him 18 several times, the Archdiocese of Chicago gets 19 free police protection at the Cardinal's 20 residence, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. 21 This has been going on for at least 16 years I 22 I am sure it's been going on for know. 23 decades.



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Does that money get paid back to the

police department of the city of Chicago for 1 2 that police protection? 3 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I am not aware. 4 JOHN CATANZARA: 18th District, as a policeman there, first, second and third watch 5 6 is their detail, if that's what they're told to 7 do, that's what is done, but these are active That's several hundred thousand 8 policemen. dollars a vear of police protection the 9 10 Archdiocese of Chicago gets. Seems like a 11 gross violation of separation of church and 12 state and a waste of tax dollars. So, I mean, 13 Deputy Wysinger refused to answer the question 14 on two separate occasions six months apart. So 15 I would appreciate it if you could find out. Т still haven't gotten an answer five years 16 17 later. Thank you. 18 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Thank you. 19 MR. FOREMAN: EveAngel Yhwnewbn. 20 EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: Halleluiah, greetings. 21 For the record, Mr. Robert Plum is a very good 22 friend of mine, but I object to you not 23 following the rules. That is why -- excuse me,



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excuse me, that's why you are not trusted or

respected because you don't follow your own rules.

I have two questions, in high homicide and shooting areas like Englewood, why are the officers not wearing body cameras?

Question number two, Superintendent you have put a lot of emphasis on repent -- repeat, stiffer penalties for repeat shooting, repeat gun violators, you put a lot of emphasis on that and thought and said they should get more time when they repeat these offenders, these offenses. But my question is, do you have any plans to put stiffer penalties for repeat killer cops, violators that commit or commit homicide or shoot unarmed suspects? Do you have any emphasis you plan to put on that? Why or why not?

SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I'll start with your first question. Regarding body cameras in Englewood, by 2018 all officers that you see patrolling in marked squad cars all across the city, citywide will have body cameras. You are correct, Englewood doesn't have them yet but there are plans in place that they will get



them in the not too distant future, but, of course, with any technology like that that you roll out, funding is always the issue. If I had the money for it, the entire police force would have body cameras. I am a fan of it. I think it shows the incident in its entirety and takes a lot of questions away. So they will be getting the body worn cameras.

EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: I was concerned maybe you have cameras on officers in areas maybe on the north side or something that don't have high rates of homicide and suspect shooting. And there should be some priority put on the areas of need, that is what I was wanting you to address.

SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: That's duly noted, but as I said, everybody at a certain point will have a body worn camera. I will take that into consideration.

In regards to your second question about repeat gun offenders, in terms of police officers, listen, I have said from day one that accountability within CPD starts with me, and goes all the way down to the last probationary



police officer. So if we find an instance 1 where a police officer is wrongfully committing 2 3 use of force, then that person will be dealt 4 with swiftly. It's as simple as that, but we 5 also have to keep in mind we have due process 6 that we have to go through. CPD does not investigate use of force incidents within CPD. 7 8 so we have to wait for the investigation to be 9 done by IPRA, which is turning into COPA and 10 that's the system that we have. But to that 11 end, if we find police officers engaging in misconduct, they'll be dealt with accordingly. 12 13 EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: I appreciate your 14 I was at a hearing down at city hall.

answer. I was at a hearing down at city hall. They said the police officers had more rights than the Bill of Rights, so I hope some of these things when they are -- police contracts comes up again, that you take some of those rights away and treat them like other citizens who should not break the rules just because they have the power to violate as you did young man. Thank you.

MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. Queen Sister.

QUEEN SISTER: Blessings. I would have



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loved to have seen your face, I would have loved to have seen your face when my name come up all the way in Rome at the Vatican, but more than that, I like to know what it is you were doing in Rome when black folks was dying in the streets here. You have a duty and an obligation to us here. You have a lot of damn nerve not showing up 12 times a year here. come when you first got here, I introduced you to the village trustee. I am disturbed that you had not contacted me to take that into consideration, but I know why because it was a culturally incompetent homicide prevention, not planned, not programmed, not project, but a strategy that will result to self-sufficiency to black folk.

Now, you went into that closet with that country club mayor and you made the deal at the expense of the peoples' safety, and today we don't know whether or not it come with a country club membership but what we do know is you have community meetings in dark closets with these little girly boys running around as paid protesters under the false pretense of



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activists that we know today are agent provocateurs. That video that is going viral on the internet where (inaudible) parlays into the hands of the police officers and claims to have been taken into custody, I know it wasn't him because we had every attorney from legal defense and every precinct in this city and he was not in custody.

I don't know what kind of thrill it is you get from the game you playing, but I think you get more pleasure out of playing with yourself because of the satisfaction guarantee.

MR. FOREMAN: Conclude your comments.

QUEEN SISTER: Now, we come here at the end of the year with 3,486 citizens shot and wounded, 672 killed with a total of gun violence, with a total of 4,158 victims that is creating this 2016 blood flowing through my streets. You sit there on your black ass with your chest pulled out like that's something to be proud about. Everything that Jew boy does is out of respect for Jewish culture, but we know not to expect nothing from you because you know not who you are and where you come from,



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and you have no respect for those of us out
