Afterschool Matters is a 501c3 that provides after school programs for children and youth across the City. The City provides a grant to Afterschool Matters for summer and after school programs through the Department of Family and Support Services.

DCASE anticipates costs for cleaning and security for 2014 to be level with 2013 expenses. 20. When film production companies want to shoot in Chicago, could we work something out with them so that we would be allowed to screen their films during our outdoor film festivals? Perhaps a "Made in Chicago" series? Also for independent films – might help increase number of viewers of smaller independent films shot in Chicago.

**Response**: It's difficult to negotiate screenings of new releases in outdoor venues because of piracy; however, acquiring the rights to screen films in wide general distribution is definitely possible. Coincidentally, we've been exploring many new ways to promote films made by Chicago independent filmmakers. Among the initial ideas being considered is a "Made in Chicago" segment on one of the City's municipal television channel to screen locally made films and accompanying interviews with the directors, producers and casts that made them.

21. Please provide funding statistics for all landmark rehabilitation projects in 2013 and projected 2014.

**Response**: In 2013, approximately \$201,000 will be spent on restoration projects in the Chicago Cultural Center, primarily involving first floor public spaces as listed below:

• Michigan Avenue Galleries not only in preparation for the Spontaneous Interventions exhibit, but also to make the space better suited to future exhibitions with new walls;

- Restorative work on the marble walls (cleaning/treating), coiffered/mosaic ceilings (paint analysis/color treatments), and floor work (repair and polish damaged terrazzo/carpet removal) in Randolph Square in preparation for 2014 restoration work;
- Renovation of the Landmark Gallery corridor in preparation for an updated exhibition on Chicago's landmarks and the story of historic preservation; and
- New carpeting in the Preston Bradley Hall, replacing carpet that is 17 years old and is worn (this is one of our prime revenue generating rental spaces, as well as a showcase for our free public programming).

In 2014, priority projects for DCASE are at the Cultural Center and the Clarke House Museum. \$693,028 is included in DCASE's 2014 budget for such projects and additional funding is anticipated from grants. This will fund:

- Chicago Cultural Center
  - Renovation of Randolph Square.
  - New hardwood floors in the Michigan Avenue and Garland Galleries, replacing dated/worn carpet in these spaces.
  - Repair of the ceilings and installation of new energy efficient lighting in the Claudia Cassidy Theater.
  - Furnishings and equipment for the Randolph Square space.
- <u>Clarke House Museum</u>
  - Repairing and repainting the landmark exterior.
- 22. What was the amount of lost revenue in 2013 for parking/street closures requested by DCASE?

**Response**: Parking/street closures in connection with DCASE events have not been tracked separately from other parking street closures. However, the 2014 budgeted amount is an estimate based on prior year closures and costs and anticipated 2014 festival and event plans.

23. What is the cultural plan for south side and how much funding will this plan receive in 2014?

**Response**: Cultural plan projects on the south side have included programs in partnership with the Chicago Park District – Night Out In the Parks and Classics in the Parks which took place in many south side locations. Other projects are being done in partnership with Choose Chicago. They have recently launched a neighborhood tourism site, which includes many south side communities.

In 2014, \$750,000 is committed to the Park District to continue their citywide summer programs, and an additional \$500,000 is budgeted for continued 2014 Cultural Plan implementation.

24. What is DCASE's 2014 budget to renovate properties critical to DCASE's mission?

25. What is the 2014 cost of the expanded theater in the park initiative?

**Response**: \$750,000 is budgeted for the Night in the Parks.

26. Please provide a full breakdown of the 2013 advertising/promotional budget. What is the expected return on investment for those dollars?

**Response:** In 2013, DCASE budgeted \$110,000 for advertising and \$12,000 for promotions, and the city saw 4.9 million attendees at 10 DCASE events with a total economic impact of over \$247 million.

27. Can we have funding allocated for dance and music programs at specific locations in the 20th Ward?

**Response**: Organizations and artists seeking direct funding should apply to one of DCASE's cultural grant programs. Timelines for the application process is listed below.
