Grants related information was provided by OBM. With respect to asset forfeiture, total federal asset forfeiture revenue received year-to-date as of September 24, 2013, is \$4,627,485.80. This amount does not re-enter the City's corporate budget. Per State and Federal regulations asset forfeiture revenue cannot be used to supplant corporate funds. Due to drastic fluctuations in the receipt of asset forfeiture funds, CPD does not project what will be received in the future.

23. Specific breakout for Law Enforcement Block Grant for year 2014 and detail for 2013 grant. Include contractors, purpose, amount and personnel positions.

The Local Law Enforcement Block Grant ended in 2004. It was replaced by the Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG). The 2014 grant has not yet been received by Chicago Police through the Department of Justice. The budget for the 2013 grant is as follows:

- 32. What is the current backlog in getting information back from the state crime lab? Please identify categories of what is sent to the crime lab and the time it takes to receive information back. What are protocols for requests for analysis of sexual assault kits, fingerprints, and any other category of information requested by Police Dept. What is the timeline for DNA results? What is the current backlog on rape kits?
 - 1. There is no current backlog with receiving information from the Illinois State crime lab.
 - 2. Physical evidence from the following crime categories are sent to the Illinois State Police Forensic Science Center for processing: Homicides, Criminal Sexual Assaults, Batteries, Burglaries, Robberies, and other crimes in which evidence with DNA can assist in identifying the offender and/or linking the offender to the victim or the scene of a crime. The DNA hits from 01 Jan 2013 30 Sep 2013 differentiated by type of crime are as follows:

- 3. The policy of the Chicago Police Departments Bureau of Detectives is to request analysis of all evidence recovered that may aid in the identification and prosecution of an offender. All evidence or property that is collected and inventoried must be processed through the Forensic Services Section prior to being transferred to the Illinois State Police Forensic Science Center. The protocol within the Bureau of Detectives is to utilize Etrack to complete an electronic "Evidence Submission Form" detailing the request of the evidence to be analyzed. The completion of this form is the protocol for submission of ALL evidence to the Illinois State Police Forensic Science Center, including rape kits.
- 4. The timeline for receiving DNA results varies for each case and is continually changing. An estimated time of return for individual crimes has been requested of the Illinois State Police Forensic Science Center however they do not have those numbers for us at this time. The time frame to receive a DNA 'hit" is also determined by whether or not the matching profile is in the CODIS database (for example a "hit" may come years after evidence is submitted because the offenders profile is only then entered after a qualifying offense/conviction). The Bureau of Detectives does track the results of the preliminary test for biological evidence in rape kits, which is currently at approximately 5 months.
- 5. The Chicago Police Department does not currently have a backlog of rape kits. All of our inventoried rape kits are submitted to the Illinois State Police within 10 business days in compliance with Public Health Act 96-1011. The Bureau of Detectives DNA Unit performs a weekly audit of all inventoried rape kits to ensure compliance.
- 33. Ethics Training. Policy regarding number of training hours required for officers.

The Chicago Police Department instructs each recruit in a 16 hour block of Ethics Training even though the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board mandates only 4 hours of training on the subject. In addition to that training, ethics training is infused in to other blocks of instruction such as 14 hours of Communication in the Police Environment, 4 hours of Police Citizen Relations, and 24 hours of

Diversity Management Training. The entire curriculum of recruit training is in the process of being rewritten and an ethical component is being added to each course.

The Department has created an 8 hour class entitled Procedural Justice and Police Legitimacy. This 8 hour course has a strong ethical theme that is a continuation of the above mentioned ethics courses. To date, 7,252 Department members have completed the course.

The Department also has a streaming video program in which training videos are selected for review at daily roll calls. Many of these videos are based on ethics based or have an ethical component.

37. Possibility of creating a link between the computer system that the police use with the one the Dept. of Revenue meter readers use so that if Dept. of Revenue personnel ticket a car that has been reported stolen, the information would be directly transmitted to the police.

Today, the Department of Police provides a daily "hot list" of wanted vehicles that is loaded into Department of Finance License Plate Reader (LPR)-equipped vans, so that when a wanted plate is identified the van operator can contact 911 for a police response.

We collaborated with the Department of Finance on a Request for Information (RFI) expected to be released shortly ("License Plate Recognition (LPR) System Technology Equipment and Support") that will allow for an automated exchange of information between the Department of Finance LPR-equipped vehicles and Public Safety Information Technology (PSIT) systems at both the Office of Emergency Management and Department of Police. This will allow for automated alerts and real-time access to video from LPR-equipped vehicles when an alert for a wanted vehicle is received.

We will continue to work with the Department of Finance to explore the expansion of this real-time capability to hand-held equipment utilized by Department of Finance personnel.

38. Possibility of making changes necessary so those Police detectives have access to the addresses at which parking tickets were issued. (Currently, they can only access the Dept of Revenue website, which only includes the date, violation type and violation number.)

Department of Police investigators may contact the 24-hour Crime Prevention and Information Center (CPIC), who has direct access to the CANVAS (Chicago Adjudication, Noticing, and Violation

Administration System); a city-owned application which hosts a variety of information involving parking and red-light violations including specific addresses of violations.

We will work with the Department of Finance and Bureau of Detectives to expand this access to Detective Areas in the coming months.

39. *Crime lab – what is our equivalent to CSI?*

Currently the CPD Forensics Services Division provides the following services:

- Crime scene processing Evidence Technicians and Police Forensics Investigators collect evidence and photograph scenes (including LEICA 3D images).
- Ballistics Lab Processes most recovered firearms including functionality, test firing, entering fired cartridges into NIBIN system for comparison to other crime scene weapons.
- Laser Unit Updated and capable of developing latent prints on evidence including guns.
- Evidence Evaluation Unit Items awaiting forensic testing.
- Photography Unit Develops and Processes all film and digital prints.

The CPD Forensics Lab has been upgraded during the past year to include IBIS (Integrated Ballistics Identification System) and other equipment for the processing of guns, new laser equipment for development of latent prints, new printers for processing of photos, improved facilities for the processing and evaluation of evidence. The remaining items to be completed are the hiring of additional personnel as Firearms Examiners, and the purchase of a LEICA system for efficient 3D imaging of crime scenes.

- 40. What is the average attendance of caps meetings throughout the city? I ask because we typically have the same 5-7 residents that attend and report the same issues over and over again, might not be bad to allocate money to hiring new officers instead of spending the allotted amount in the caps department. I know at one point they were considering eliminating the program, is it the same scenario this year?

There are 22 districts within the city. Each district commander determines the schedule for their CAPS beat meetings. The CAPS order only states that the beat meetings must meet quarterly. Each district has three sectors and within each sector there are four or five beats. Taking the total beat meeting attendance for the first eight months and dividing the number by 3 for the sectors. The average sector attendance is 115.

Beat meetings have been established since the inception of the CAPS program. Beat meetings have always been about bringing the community into an arena to discuss a problem and to do problem solving with their neighbors and the police. Many community members that are actively engaged within their neighborhoods will attend beat meetings to see and hear what issues are occurring within their community. These beat meetings are perfect avenues for those members to select community concerns that are more specific or peaks the interest of that attendee to volunteer. This is a springboard for individuals to volunteer and get involved with the CAPS program and their community.

41. What is the average response time for a responding officer to arrive on the scene?

- 42. Calls that the CPD chose not to respond to:
 - Burglaries We have had constituents inform us that their garage had been burglarized, entry point sometimes in the window where finger prints are visible. Nobody responds to get those prints.
 - Car thefts If someone is stuck up at gun point, car is stolen police will not respond. What if the victim didn't see the criminal but witnesses on the street did. Nobody is there to capture a statement or description of the suspect.
 - o Between September 1, 2012 and September 30, 2013, the Alternate Response Section (ARS) received 449,586 calls. 73.1% of all reports completed by the ARS are for theft, motor vehicle theft, criminal damage to property and lost property.
 - O The car theft case noted above is an example of Vehicular Hijacking which will warrant a police response to the scene.

46. When we receive additional officers from outside districts in our ward, they seem to issue a lot of unjust citations, including no rpp sticker, when the resident clearly has it displayed. Same thing for truck permit violations, resident has the sticker but they still receive a violation. No one is getting out of the car to inspect causing our office to be burdened with writing letters to assist the resident with contesting the ticket.

Without seeing the ticket in question, we cannot determine the circumstances surrounding the ticket.

Officers receive training on the new Residential Parking Permit and City stickers when they are issued. Officers have a personal stake in having this knowledge. Officers that fail to purchase their city stickers are not only liable for any parking citations they receive but they also face disciplinary action for failing to purchase their sticker. This makes officers more aware of what is needed to be legally licensed to have a motor vehicle in the city.

47. What criteria are used to determine what kind of patrol each problem area will receive? Will this program be expanded to other districts/beats/communities? How much will that expansion cost?

We would be happy to work with the alderman to better understand this question and provide a response.

49. What is the cost of hiring a new officer versus an equivalent amount of overtime for existing staff?



During our recent hearing to discuss the 2014 proposed budget, Aldermen Suarez asked about the activities of the CAPS personnel.

The Chicago Police Department CAPS program continues with the core groups consisting of court advocacy, domestic violence, youth, seniors, and faith based. Each of the these groups is represented within each district by the CAPS office containing one sergeant, two police officers, a community organizer and a shared youth service coordinator. Each district submits a calendar of their beat meetings for the entire year, which is then printed and handed out at the district level. The District Commander working with the community and the CAPS office decide if additional committees, such as business, elementary and high school principals, community based or non-profit organizations that can provide resources as needed to address some of the underlying causes of crime and disorder within the district.

Many of our programs support these core groups. Each district and their communities will host major events that are conducted in partnership with elected officials, major stakeholders, business organizations, parks, schools, and community organizations. National Night Out, neighborhood clean and greens, smoke outs, prayer vigils, rallies, block clubs are some of the events that are conducted within the districts. Youth programs working with domestic violence and detectives consisting of a peer jury, explorers group, seminars on teen bullying, teen dating, mentoring programs and study groups where the youth are also able to earn their hours for school.

Crime prevention programs are scheduled throughout the year among the areas and districts to include landlord/tenant training, bank seminars, court advocacy training, street safety, identity theft, financial fraud, burglary prevention. These Department programs are provided in partnerships with city and federal agencies.

In 2014, CPD will implement a community policing strategy modeled on the CAPS strategy that brings the police, community residents, and other City departments together to identify and solve neighborhood crime problems. Approximately \$2.3 million of CDBG funds will be invested in low-income community areas with police districts such as Austin, Englewood and West Englewood, Roseland, West Pullman, and Fuller Park, among others. These funds will be primarily used to fund Police, Community Organizer, and Youth Services Coordinator positions to develop and implement plans for recruiting and organizing community residents; encouraging youth participation; raising awareness of the problems specific to each community area; and facilitating problem solving between CPD staff, city departments, and community service providers.

The following positions will be moved from the corporate budget to CDBG funding.

- 6 Police Officers
- 10 Community Organizers-CAPS
- 2 Youth Services Coordinators
- 2 Information Service Coordinators

During our recent hearing to discuss the 2014 proposed budget, Aldermen Cochran requested additional information regarding the department's spending of 1505 State Asset Forfeiture funds.

State statute dictates that the forfeiture is not intended to be an alternative means of funding the administration of criminal justice. The use of 1505 funds is restricted to the purchase of items which there is a realistic, demonstrable connection between the items and narcotic enforcement activity. The Illinois State Police Asset Forfeiture Unit guidelines require that 1505 funds are utilized to supplement the current budget, not supplant budgetary needs.

Payment of salaries and benefits of current, permanent law enforcement personnel is generally not a permissible use of State Asset Forfeiture funds.

# **IDOT Safe Routes to School**

This is a joint CPD/CPS/CDOT project to make it safer for students to walk or ride bicycles to and from school. The grant focuses on approximately twenty elementary schools around CPS-designated "Culture of Calm" high schools. The funding expands CPD's Walking School Bus (\$37,880) and parent patrol (\$61,320) programs by paying for radios, hats, high visibility coats, whistles, and training materials for volunteers.

# FY08 Secure Our Schools

This is a program to improve safety and security at schools with high levels of violent incidents committed by and against students. Services will target ten high schools and 30 elementary feeder schools, and will include de-escalation training, GSST training, and the purchase of x-ray scanning devices and digital bus tracker systems.

# **Public Safety Private Support**

This line in the 925 table is for any grants the department might receive from private individuals or entities. These private grants include those provided by Target department store, Harvard University, and the Asian Health Coalition. Each grant has specific spending criteria and areas of focus. Examples of allowable spending categories include police overtime, bicycles, equipment, supplies, dogs, and technical consulting for enhancements to the department's CLEAR system.
