ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHICAGO

SECTION 1. Chapter 18-11 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting a new Section 18-11-1106.2.1, underscored as follows:

18-11-1106.2.1 Accessible parking space in a multi-unit residential occupancy.

<u>1.</u> A multi-unit residential occupancy that is required to provide parking pursuant to any provision of this Code shall retain ownership of any accessible parking space required to be provided by this Code in the name of the condominium association, co-operative association or corporation, or management company having responsibility for the operation of the multi-unit residential occupancy ("Management"), and shall not sell such accessible parking space to any individual unit owner.

2. Management shall allow the use of an accessible parking space by a disabled resident of the multi-unit residential occupancy upon request, provided that the disabled resident presents a disability or disabled veteran state registration plate or a valid person with a disability parking decal or device issued pursuant to Section 3-609, 3-616 or Section 11-1301.2 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, and the disabled resident is the owner of a parking space in the multi-unit residential occupancy. For the duration of such use, Management may lease the disabled resident's parking space to another resident on a month-to-month basis. Upon 30 days' notice to Management, the disabled resident may reacquire the owned parking space if the resident no longer has a qualifying disability or intends to sell their unit in the multi-unit residential occupancy.

3. If an accessible parking space under this Section is not in use by a resident with a qualifying disability, Management may lease such space on a month-to-month basis.

<u>4.</u> <u>This Section applies to any multi-unit residential occupancy receiving a certificate</u> of occupancy after January 1, 2020.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in force and effect upon passage and publication.

The attached information is in response to questions posed at our department's hearing on October 29, 2019 to discuss the proposed 2020 budget.

Alderman Harris asked how it is decided where curb ramps will be installed.

Starting in 2007, MOPD and CDOT co-chaired the Curb Cut Advisory Committee that addressed the lack of accessible curb-cuts in Chicago. That committee, which was made up of representatives from both Departments and stakeholders with disabilities worked to prioritize where curb cuts should be installed. It was then determined that schools, hospitals, government buildings, areas where people with disabilities work/live, areas near transportation, and pedestrian streets should be prioritized. The stakeholders also helped identify key areas where no curb cuts existed (as opposed to those out of compliance). Residents were also encouraged to use the 311 system to request curb cuts to be installed. Finally, CDOT staff identified street improvements that would trigger new curb cuts to be installed. While MOPD and CDOT continue to oversee progress on the installation of curb cuts, the program ended in 2012. Currently, curb cut requests are handled by CDOT through 311. Over 104,000 curb cuts were installed between 2007 and 2018.

MOPD will respond to complaints and work with 2FM or specific departments to address accessibility issues. If the physical accessibility of a building cannot be remediated, MOPD will work with departments on how programs and services can be provided, i.e., moving the program or service to an alternate location.

However, MOPD's 2020 Budget includes a new position for a Building Construction/Inspector. Filling this position will enable MOPD to increase the number of accessibility inspections and surveys it can complete in public/private and commercial/residential properties. Additionally, this position will increase MOPD's ability to track surveys and other compliance issues throughout the City.

Alderman Taylor asked how many CTA and Metra stations are accessible/not accessible.

CTA currently has 103 accessible rail stations. 70 percent of CTA's system is now accessible and while key station upgrade requirements under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) have long been met, multiple projects have continued and are underway to make more stations accessible.

Metra currently has 185 fully accessible stations, 13 partially accessible stations and 44 inaccessible stations. Customers who use wheelchairs at partially accessible stations will be able to access train platforms from the street. However, ramps, ticket windows, buildings and shelters may not fully conform to ADA guidelines. These stations are designated as partially accessible so as not to deter customers from facilities which may be usable.

In compliance with the requirements of the ADA, all 11 train lines in the Metra system are fully accessible to customers with disabilities. Metra has modified railcars and made accessible most of its busiest train stations to accommodate individuals with hearing, vision, and mobility disabilities. Train service for customers with disabilities spans all six counties in metropolitan Chicago."

- number of funded vacancies and breakdown for 2020
- number of vacancies being cut what positions (job titles) are being eliminated
- number of non-union employees to receive salary increases in 2020 budget
- description of outsources services projected for 2020
- list of savings and cost-efficiencies due to zero-based budgeting

There are no changes in headcount for MOPD projected for 2020.

MOPD has two funded vacancies for 2020. The Deputy Commissioner and Building Construction/Inspector both are corporate funded.

MOPD does not have any vacancies being cut.

None of MOPD's non-union employees will receive salary increases in 2020.

MOPD doesn't have any new outsourced services projected for 2020.

MOPD's budget is general in nature. In previous years, MOPD experienced savings and costefficiencies due to zero based budgeting. One example is hosting the bi-annual exposition AccessChicago every other year, versus every year. Also, MOPD purchases off citywide blanket agreement contracts to partake in bulk savings.
