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ID#:	78-03 Complaints

Alderman Hairston requested the number of complaints that have been forwarded to the attention of the Attorney General.

Since July 1, 2013, the Board has referred no complaints to the Illinois Attorney General but has referred 67 complaints to the Office of the City Inspector General.



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ID#:	78-04 Ethics Violations

Alderman Tunney asked for information regarding what fines have been paid for Ethics Violations so far in 2019 and total in 2018, as well as where those revenues are accounted.

For 2019, the Board has assessed and collected \$950 for late filings of Statements of Financial Interests; \$41,500 for substantive Ethics Ordinance violations; \$2,834 from City employees, officials and lobbyists who failed to complete ethics training on time; and \$20,431 for lobbying late fines, a total of \$65,715

For 2018, the Board assessed \$42,200 in late lobbying fines, and \$26,000 for late-fling Statements of Financial Interests, for a total of \$66,200.

All fines for violations of the Ordinance go into the following account: AE01 100 78 2005 2710, Fines and Penalties.

Annual Mandatory Ethics Training DVD:

Each year, we hire an outside source for the manual recording or "voice over" for the annual Mandatory Employee Ethics Training DVD, which is used to conduct ethics training for departments and employees who work in the field and do not have daily access to a City computer. The mandatory online ethics training program can only be accessed and completed using a City computer; However, the DVD serves as an alternative for those departments and employees that do not have access to a city computer. The following departments rely on the training DVD:

In addition, we will continue to outsource the production, creation, and duplication of the DVD via City Vendor October, LLC
