

BIKING IN CHICAGO


There is a growing interest and need for bikeways in several neighborhoods not well served by the bike network

Biking is a vital ingredient to building healthy, safe, vibrant places

Biking won't be a useful transportation option until it provides convenient access to all the places people want and need to go

No existing bike lanes within Brighton Park, Gage Park, and McKinley Park





CHICAGO CYCLING STRATEGY

Building the **best bike network in the country** with an **equitable transportation system** that provides people with mobility options and is focused on keeping our **most vulnerable users of the street safe**.


- A Connected Citywide Network of bike routes on key corridors which cross barriers, connect neighborhoods, and serve regional destinations
- Focused on Local Trips to get people to meaningful destinations by building connected bike networks in partnership with communities
- Providing Low-Stress Options to make everyday cycling safe & convenient by prioritizing protected bike lanes and neighborhood greenways










CHICAGO CYCLING STRATEGY

Centering communities and focusing on an equitable process

- Each community has its own set of needs, contexts, and perspectives.
- Chicago's bike network is not evenly distributed.
- Each neighborhood is in a different stage of network development.
- Partnering with neighborhoods to build connected Neighborhood Bike Network that best respond to a community's needs.





NEIGHBORHOOD BIKE NETWORK PROGRAM

2021: Belmont Cragin, Austin & North Lawndale

Identified and are installing 45 miles of new bike routes

2022: South Lawndale, Little Village & Marshall Square


Identified and are installing over 10 miles of new bike routes

2023: McKinley Park, Gage Park & Brighton Park

Continuing south to expand and build a connected network throughout Chicago



SOUTHWEST SIDE NEIGHBORHOOD TASKFORCE

This year and 2024:

- Identify bike routes to install in 2023 & 2024 (10+ miles)
- Identify long-term projects (2025 and beyond)
- Develop other recommendations for making biking safe, convenient, and appealing to the neighborhood
- Advise how we can engage residents on how these projects will benefit the neighborhood

- Brighton Park was 4th highest requested community area










CRASHES FATAL & SERIOUS INJURY

- ► 16,146 Total Crashes
 - 3,229 Average Crashes/Yr
- 27 People killed in crashes
 - 1 person on a bike
 - 10 people walking
 - 16 people driving
- 304 People seriously injured
- 30% of Fatal or Serious crashes involve people biking or walking






BIKE CRASHES FATAL & SERIOUS INJURY

- ► 158 Total Crashes
 - 32 Average Crashes/Yr
- 1 Person killed
- 15 People seriously injured
- ► 133 People injured






PEDESTRIAN CRASHES FATAL & SERIOUS INJURY

- ► 357 Total Crashes
 - 71 Average Crashes/Yr
- ► 10 People killed
- 70 People seriously injured
- 269 People injured






MOTOR VEHICLE CRASHES FATAL & SERIOUS INJURY

- ► 15,631 Total Crashes
 - 3,126 Average Crashes/Yr
- ► 16 People killed
- 219 People seriously injured
- ► 1,836 People injured






CHALLENGES: BARRIERS & **ACCESS**
