

- **Site Control:** Show lease, deed, sales or real estate contract, or signed letter of intent (LOI) from landlord.
- Plan for Construction: Complete the construction plan in the application with realistic dates and upload a contractor bid.
- **Equity or Loan:** Provide evidence of funds available for applicant portion of project (minimum is 25% of project costs)
- Cost Itemized (Budget): Enter a lineitem budget into application with numbers that match contractor bids uploaded.

Application Opens: **Monday, August 16th**

Application Closes: Friday, September 24th







Project Goals

- Explore how the existing green boulevards, parks and open spaces can be better leveraged and connected








Finding a name

- Altenheim Line is the existing name of the CSX Rail line
- In the future, collaboration with the community will develop a new identity for the line that aligns with the vision
- The future name needs to resonate with the residents and community.

Equitable Economic Development

City of Chicago Goals include:

- A comprehensive vision for industrial and commercial development within North Lawndale adjacent to the current CSX Altenheim railroad corridor
- Creating a wider recreational and well-being framework

- Envision a new recreational use of the rail spur











Previous Planning North Lawndale Quality of Life Plan - 2018

Housing

America's Rails-with-Trails





A Resource for Planners, Agencies and Advocates on Trails Along Active Railroad Corridors



Separation

Separation refers to constructed or natural barriers between the trail and railroad. Survey results indicated that a vast majority (70 percent) of rails-with-trails have installed some type of barrier or were designed to be grade-separated for all, or a portion of, the trail's length. The most common barrier used is fencing, with a variety of fencing types and heights reported (e.g., chain link, wire fence with wood post). In some instances, railroads required that their fencing standards were met.





Represents results from 62 trails that reported existing barriers; some trails have more than one type of barrier.

Crossings

Designing safe rail crossings is critical to creating a safe and accessible rail-with-trail. Fifty-four trails (61 percent) reported at least one crossing; the average number of crossings was 1.6 and 70 percent of those crossings are at grade. The Camp Chase Trail in Ohio reported seven crossings, the most of any trail. Several trail managers indicated that no new crossings would be considered by the railroad, and nearly a third of trails studied do not have a single crossing.













Altenheim Line|606 Comparison








Learning from Other Communities

The 606 Chicago, IL

2.7 Mile linear park

- Reactivated an abandoned rail line through Humboldt Park, Wicker Park, Bucktown and Logan Square communities
- Gentrification and displacement an issue







El Paseo Trail Chicago, IL

At-grade 4.2-mile-long, at grade multi-use path

- Reactivated an abandoned rail line through Little
 Village and Pilsen communities
- DPD, CDOT, and DOH working to develop tools and policy to address displacement before the project is designed







Dequindre Cut Detroit, MI

At-grade/below grade 2-mile-long, multi-use path

- Reactivated an abandoned rail line to the detroit river
- Detroit Riverfront Conservancy works to program and manage the greenways







Atlanta Beltline Atlanta, GA

Circular greenway surrounding the city

- Reactivated an abandoned rail line, with future transit planned
- Line goes through both various communities







RiverlineBuffalo, NY

Linear Greenway in south of downtown

- Place of Refuge for the city
- Elevated berm along abandoned rail line







Beer LineMilwaukee, WI

Linear Greenway in through industrial neighborhoods

- Introduce forest into the city for health
- Art & Program to activate industrial area
