

## American Islamic College Asylum Seeker Sheltering Discussion

Friday, July 21, 2023



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Overview

Over 11,000 individuals and family members have arrived to Chicago since August 31, 2022.

- Arriving from across the globe, primarily from Central and South America.
- The first phase of arrivals were sent by the State of Texas with no coordination with the City.
- Asylum seekers are also arriving via plane and other means, seeking shelter.



Overview

No funds diverted from the regular homeless shelter system to support the migrant mission.

- The City is identifying shelter spaces, providing the basic needs and advocating to the federal government for support and to fix this system.
- All hands-on-deck including City staff, State and County officials, delegate agencies, faith leaders, community leaders and volunteers.
- **58** buses have arrived in Chicago since May 9th, including one which arrived this morning.



Since August 2022, the City has established 25 shelters & 2 airport staging areas throughout the city to quickly and safely provide shelter to new arrivals.

- Large capacity with space for eating, showers, and must pass safety tests
- □ An empty space does not equate an adequate shelter
- □ The City is limited to spaces within city limits as that is our only jurisdiction
- The State or County would be responsible for finding other spaces if they wanted to create shelter outside the City of Chicago
- The federal government has not issued a disaster declaration; therefore certain resources, such as Red Cross, unavailable



- The overflow is stressing our police stations.
- 958 persons currently sleeping on police station floors including families with small children.
- The American Islamic College can help ease the pressure felt at our police stations.

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
#### Map showing current New Arrival Shelters

American Islamic College





- Over 200 locations vetted. Many facilities did not meet health, safety, and capacity requirements.
- The American Islamic College is meeting the moment by opening their space as a temporary shelter.



□What will be provided at American Islamic College:

- □Cots, blankets, towels, showers, laundry services, and food
- □Access to healthcare screenings
- School enrollment
- □Youth enrichment activities
- □ Majority bilingual staff
- Clients allowed to leave the building. Overnight curfew enforced.



- □<u>Comprehensive Medical Exams</u> are performed after entry into the shelter system at a local clinic, usually within 72 hours. New arrivals are screened for a wide range of illnesses and health conditions at that time.
- □<u>Shelter-Based Care</u> Onsite medical care is provided about 1-2 times weekly at shelters by shelter-based care providers
- **Community Health Work & Social Services** Federally Qualified Health Center partners are going to City shelters to provide information and connections to additional medical and social services, as a third layer of care.
- □<u>Mobile Health/Urgent Care</u> Urgent care services are provided on site at police districts and other locations for individuals not immediately placed in a City shelter due to a lack of space, by teams of volunteer health providers.

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### **Shelter Policies**

#### What rules and expectations are there for residents?

- Rules include:
  - No visitors or walk-ins
  - Abide by 11PM curfew
  - Sign in and out with front desk staff
  - No drugs and alcohol allowed
  - Clients must respect the entire property
  - Smoking is not permitted
- Residents may be discharged for violation of rules
  - Unless the reason for discharge is violence or active threat toward others, resident may be placed at another location



- Earliest possible move-in date: July 28
- Facility will host families with children
- Capacity:
  - Up to 600 clients by early August
  - Up to 800 clients by early September
  - Possible further expansion in coming months




**Community Safety** 

- Security outside campus: CPD
  - Special attention
  - Frequent building checks on every watch
  - Logbook and interactivity with onsite security
- Together with onsite security resulting in 24/7 security

#### Resettlement



- The City is working with the State on long-term transition plans for new arrivals across City shelters and advocating for federal resources.
- Goal is for new arrivals to become selfsufficient, self-autonomous, and selfactualized.
- Resettlement Services began April 17, 2023.
  - To date, 531 signed leases and 333 moves to permanent housing
  - On June 27, 2023: 189 had moved to permanent housing and 440 had signed leases and in process off moving in
