Overview – Week of November 28

New Arrivals Buses as of November 28, 2023

- Chicago has received over **22,600** new arrivals since the mission began.
- **427** Buses have arrived in Chicago since Jan 1, 2023
- 418 Buses have arrived in Chicago since
 May 12, 2023
- •NOTE: The census numbers are updated daily and can fluctuate due to resettlement, finding housing independently, onward movement, among other factors. Additionally, the bus numbers are fluid and can change.

Overview – Week of November 28

From November 13 – 27, we placed 1,207 individuals in shelter.

We are currently averaging 500 individuals exiting our system due to outmigration and resettlement efforts.

Continued **collaboration with mutual aid and CBOs** to coordinate transportation from police stations to shelters.

Continued **conversation with CCH** on expanding services.

- Launch intake center to welcome and coordinate new arrivals
- Reduce the number of people going to shelters by 10% through a coordinated arrival process
- Create a winterized "soft shelter site" providing temporary housing for up to 2,000 people for up to 6 months
- Reduce ASERAP from six to three months
- Allow all current shelter residents access
- Clear communication on benefits available for new arrivals
- Expand case
 management, housing
 assistance, and legal

- > TPS/EAD assistance for ~11,000 shelter residents by Feb. 2024



- 60-day limited stay policy for residents of emergency new arrivals shelters run by the City.
 - Establishes exit dates based on arrival dates to shelter, with a written notice.
 - Those who still need shelter at the time of their exit date will be instructed to return to the landing zone to request a new shelter placement.
 - Temporary extensions may be granted for individuals under extenuating circumstances, such as medical crises or extreme cold weather.
- The goal of this policy is to:
 - Support residents and their families in their resettlement in Chicago expeditiously.
 - Be able to serve new households arriving in Chicago and waiting at police stations/airports.
- As a part of this policy, the City and State are partnering to increase support for legal immigration services and accelerate resettlement resources.



- **New arrivals who entered shelter in 2022** will receive a 60-day notice beginning 11/17/2023. There are approximately 50 people in this group.
- New arrivals who entered shelter between 1/1/2023 7/31/2023 will begin receiving 60-day notices on 12/4/2023. There are approximately 3,000 people currently in shelter who arrived in this time frame.
- New arrivals who entered shelter between 7/31/2023 11/16/2023 will begin receiving 60-day notices on 2/1/2024. There are approximately 8,800 people currently in shelter who arrived in this time frame.
- All new arrivals to shelter on or after 11/17/2023 will receive a 60day notice upon intake.

Mayor Johnson announces new church-city partnership to house migrants

The plan will shelter migrants in local churches until they find housing. It will reach 100 migrants immediately and 340 in total. More than 1,000 migrants remain at police

stations.

El Departamento de Servicios Familiares y de Apoyo (DFSS, por sus siglas en inglés) activa áreas de calentamiento en los seis centros de servicios comunitarios de la Ciudad. Los Centros de Servicios Comunitarios están abiertos de lunes a viernes, de 9 a.m. a 5 p.m.

- Las áreas de calentamiento y otras instalaciones de la Ciudad de Chicago están abiertas cuando las temperaturas son de 32 ° F o menos.
- Por las noches y los fines de semana, ciertas ubicaciones de la Biblioteca Pública de Chicago y las instalaciones del Distrito de Parques de Chicago también servirán como centros de calentamiento durante el horario comercial habitual.



- An estimated 11,000 new arrivals in Chicago are eligible for work permits.
- In collaboration with State, City, sister agencies, delegate agencies, and USCIS, new arrivals are submitting their applications for TPS or EAD.
- Ongoing workshops from November through early 2024 to capture people that are eligible for TPS and EADs
- Applicants from the 11/9 workshop have received their approvals.
- Volunteer Opportunities: TPS-EAD Volunteers





Coordinated federal advocacy with County, State, Illinois Congressional delegation, and external partners to reduce the financial and operational burdens, and to secure increased funding that will cover comprehensive sheltering and resettlement work in Illinois.

Five core asks:

- 1. Nationwide coordination of resettlement to receiving cities/States with a single federal leader,
- 2. Donated use of Federal land and buildings for sheltering throughout Illinois such as military bases and training facilities,
- 3. Flexible use of federal funding for sheltering operations and overall expenses.
- 4. Resources and technical assistance for expedited Temporary Protective Status (TPS) and employment authorization document (EAD) processing, and
- 5. Expansion of TPS and EAD for all non-citizens

Policy specific

- Waive fees for work authorization requests
- Improve backlog on asylum applications and workforce authorization request



- 1. Establish Shelter and resettlement hubs in at least two other municipalities directly supported and operated by the State
- 2. Increase Asylum Seeker Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ASERAP) to \$50M
- 3. Additional Support for Chicago Public Schools
 - Increased STLS services for all students
 - Additional resources and flexibility in licensing of Bilingual educators
 - Expedite existing capital projects and new construction for replacement purposes
- 4. Create sustainable funding stream for Chicago to cover costs from shelter to resettlement services.
